

2013 Budget: The Finance Committee met with the Board of Directors in a special meeting October 30 to present the 2013 budget for approval. The Finance Committee, the Association Controller Ivy Hsia and Board liaison Steve Stewart have been working on the 2013 budget since July. As part of the budget preparation, they worked with the Reserve Analyst to ensure that the Reserve Study is accurate; they met with all of the Committee Chairman and staff members to discuss their need for funds and the feasibility of their requests. After many hours of working with the numbers, they were able to propose a budget to fulfill the needs of the community and keep the assessments at their current level. The Board approved the budget on November 12. Thank you to all members of the Finance Committee, the Board of Directors and especially to Ivy for all of the hard work. It is appreciated by all.

As required by the Governing Documents, the Budget Mailing which includes many important disclosures was mailed to all NSCA members by the end of November. Please review this information and keep it with your important documents.

Guest and Party/Event List: To help with your holiday planning, here are a few reminders to prevent any unwanted issues for your guests when entering the community:

- Each guest entering the community must be on your party or event list, not just the vehicle driver. Guests not on the list will not be admitted.
- Lists of ten (10) individual guests or more must be submitted through the NSCA Management Office no less than 48 business hours before your party or event. Lists exceeding ten individuals will not be accepted at the Mariner Gate.
- All guest passes must be displayed on the vehicle dashboard so that the pass can be easily identified by the patrol officer in order to prevent unnecessary citations or vehicle tows.

Post Commander Change: At the end of November, we had a change in our Securitas on site staff. A new Post Commander was assigned to Niguel Shores, his name is James Heygster. He brings excellent experience and knowledge to this position. James has stepped right in with a friendly authority. If you get a chance, please welcome him to our community.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

ARCHITECTURE

Recently the Architecture Committee made a number of site visits in the Shores to evaluate requests for architectural property improvements. During these site visits we have noticed a number of properties that are in need of repair. Niguel Shores historically is not a community where the Architectural Committee goes out in the community to look for problems; however, during our site visits, many properties were found to be in need of painting, siding repair, concrete repair, fencing replacement and we could go on and on.

Many of our residents are not aware that home owners are responsible under the CC&R'S to maintain their property. Failure to maintain is a violation that can and will be enforced. We have an obligation to this community to maintain our property.

The Committee realizes that many properties in Niguel Shores are rental properties which require the tenants to request home repairs from the owner. If home owners are not responsive to requests, the tenant should notify the Niguel Shores office of the repair concerns. We are a 40-plus-year-old community that needs to maintain its properties to ensure that the value of individual properties not be reduced because of neglect.

MAINTENANCE

The year was 1892. Mrs. Anna Pitcher initiated an effort to mark the route of California's first highway, El Camino Real (Royal Highway or Kings Highway), the highway from San Diego to Sonoma linking 21 missions founded by Father Junipero Serra.

Mrs. A.S.C. Forbes and the California Federation of Women's Clubs adopted the initiative and decided to mark the route with distinctive bells. Mrs. Forbes designed the 85 pound cast iron bells. The bell has the dates 1796 and 1906 and A.S.C. Forbes copyright notice. The 1796 date refers to the founding of the first mission and the 1906 to the placement of the first bell. The first bell was unveiled in 1906 at the Plaza Church near Olvera Street in Los Angeles. Between the years of 1906 and 1913 the installation of 450 bells marked the route of the original highway.

Due to relocation and rerouting of the highway, most of the original 450 bells had disappeared by 1933 when the State of California took over maintenance of the bells. In 1960 the State began a restoration program, installing new bells that are fabricated using the original 1906 molds.

Dale Baltimore, founder and first president of the Niguel Shores Men's Club, owned one of the original bells. In memory of Dale and Helen Baltimore, the Baltimore family gave the bell to Niguel Shores in 1995. It was first installed by the old club house and later moved to its present location near the tennis courts.

2013 is the centennial year for the bell. There is a plaque on the supporting pipe to commemorate its first installation in 1913. After 100 years, the old bell was in need of a little refurbishment. The Maintenance Department wanted the bell to celebrate its one hundredth birthday with a fresh new look.

The bell and its support pipes were brought to the maintenance shop where several layers of paint were removed. The plaques, which were difficult to read, were acid washed and

polished several times and then waxed with a special monument wax. George Cooley even worked the small details with an electric tooth brush. Some welding repair was necessary on the support pipe. The original paint specification was researched and found to be available from Dunn-Edwards. A professional painter was hired to apply the paint.

The bell has been reinstalled by the tennis courts, looking as good as new and ready for another hundred years.

Come by and wish our community's little bit of history a happy one hundredth birthday.

TRAFFIC AND SAFETY

Happy Holidays. With significant holidays such as Diwali and Thanksgiving just behind us, we can anticipate the other festive days which are quickly approaching. Hopefully, for all of us this month proves to be the "happiest time of the year." To reduce the level of anxiety many of our guests will experience during this period, we have several suggestions. Ensure that our guest lists are updated, or for larger gatherings, the office has a list of the folks attending forty-eight hours before the event. For people that haven't been here for a while, give them specific directions on how to enter our community. For instance, if I were to query my wife's GPS for directions to our house, from anywhere outside of Dana Point, it tells me to go to the Stonehill gate. I think I would get pretty flustered if I waited for someone to open it. Other such directional systems have been reported to send travelers to the Selva and Cabrillo gates. As a disproportionate number of problems that arise in our community are the result of unruly guests, an easy tenet to remember is: if we allow someone into the community we have to assume responsibility for their conduct.

Don't Let Santa Get Ticked Off: On a real regular basis some residents, but generally guests and service providers in a hurry, have their day literally ruined by the control arms and spikes at the various entrances and exits in our community. The spikes more often as not flatten either two or all four tires of an offending vehicle (could even derail a sled). Recently, Mr. George Cooley from our staff made a presentation to our committee and explained the intricacies of the computerized control system. He also had a videotape of vehicles driving through the gates and making contact with quickly rising spikes or descending control bars. To make a long story short, we are not yet aware of an instance where the system was at fault for the flattened tires. In each instance the driver was either trying to beat the system, confused, or improperly rushing in or out. We are assured that the computerized control of the gates is actually state of the art and it appears that all contingencies have been thought out. Mr. Cooley offered several easy to remember points to pass on to ensure a trouble free entrance and exit. The bar code reader is generally effective from a distance of two to six feet, but this can vary depending upon fading of the sticker or harsh sunlight. When approaching the bar code reader, slow down and ensure the bar code was picked up (green light). Most importantly, do not tailgate. It is recommended that we maintain at least a two car distance from a vehicle in front of us. I believe that all of us will remember these simple points and we should caution our guests and service providers.

Santa to be Welcomed to a Safe Community: We recently spoke with several residents on Halyard who are pleased to report the incidents of property being stolen from parked cars and other suspicious conduct has stopped. They attribute this to a willingness of neighbors to report crimes and suspected criminal activity to our police department. It appears that both patrol and enforcement activity by our deputies has been effective. Our liaison deputy has assured us that we will receive more visible patrol and appropriate enforcement action to address the complaints of speeders and stop sign violators. Not completely stopping for a stop sign is normally a careless habit we have developed and for which we have not suffered any consequence. However, in the long run it can also result in a four-hundred plus dollar ticket and worse yet, an injury to someone. If you want to see an example of this sort of sloppy driving, watch the intersection of Periwinkle and Niguel Shores sometime. I am sure Santa will fly over this area and not take any unnecessary chances.

Looking ahead to the New Year:

2013 looks to be another fun-filled and informative year for the Club. Field trips are planned to the Plant Stand in Costa Mesa; and Greystone Manor in Los Angeles, followed by lunch at the Farmers' Market. The Club will hold its annual Plant Sale, and all members of the Shores are invited. Closing out the Club's year will be the ever popular Beach Bluff BBQ and potluck.

Another gardening myth: Piling mulch up against the trunks of trees and shrubs helps to keep them cozy warm all winter long.

Reality: Mulching in this manner is asking for trouble, because it holds moisture against the tree or shrub bark—for months at a time in our climate. Bark simply is not designed to be constantly wet; if it is, opportunistic pathogens may infect the plant. So: when applying mulch, think "doughnut," not "volcano": Keep the mulch a few inches away from the base of the shrub or tree, and pile it a few inches deep from there.

Gardener's Glossary: Humus— Decomposed organic matter used as a soil conditioner.

Note: not to be confused with the Mediterranean and Middle Eastern food, hummus, a tasty dip or spread made from cooked, mashed chickpeas (garbanzo beans) blended with tahini, olive oil, lemon juice, salt and garlic.

Both Richard and Lydia are avid tennis players, and they actually met on a tennis court in Carmel, California in 1996. It was a real love match, as they have been married for 16 years. They are one couple for whom good things seem to come in twos. This is a second marriage for both of them and each had two children from their previous marriages. In 2008 Pepperdine honored Lydia with a Distinguished Alumna Award for outstanding accomplishments in the field of education, her special service to the community, and for her personal and professional character.

She now works part-time as an educational consultant and gives presentations which cover topics of leadership, management and organizational development in higher education.

Richard has retired after a long successful career in social services, first in adult protective services and then in child protective services. He found that the last segment of his career, working with children, was the most self-fulfilling.
