S ummer time at Niguel Shores is a very busy time of year with lots of social and recreation activities, guests spending vacation time with family/friends, and of course a push to complete several large projects. The new Board of Directors wishes to thank Pat O'Brien and John Dougherty for their wisdom and service and hopefully they will take some time to relax!

As the new Board transitions responsibilities, our objectives include completing the projects and work that are underway, such as the Mariner Gate monument remodel and Mercator Slope renewal but also focus efforts and support to the Coach Light replacement project being undertaken by the Facilities Team and the Maintenance Committee.

With the 2016 budget process beginning in July with the Finance Team, the Board will work on goals and objectives in support of the various Committee recommendations which include; ongoing maintenance, updated support services and development of the very hardworking Niguel Shores staff. Landscaping

The major slope project for 2015 is the Mercator Slope, and this massive undertaking should be complete by the end of July. This project entails new irrigation, a new pump, minor slope repairs and of course new plantings to compliment the rest of Niguel Shores. Work is in the initial stages for the Cabrillo Slope which we anticipate as the major Spring 2016 project.

GM REPORT

It is that time of year again and as always the 4th of July at Niguel Shores is an amazing celebration thanks to the combined efforts of the Recreation Committee, the Men's Club and the Women's Club. On behalf of everyone, a huge thank you goes out to those outstanding volunteers for their time, energy and efforts dedicated to making their community a wonderful place to live! Without each and every one of you this would not be the huge success every year!!!

Turf Update: As many of you may remember NSCA had over 900,000 square feet of turf. Harvest, management, the Board of Directors and SCWD worked together to implement a plan and removed approximately 114,000 square feet of turf in 2013. At that time the community received \$0.30 rebate per square foot of turf removed for that project. This was good because many districts did not offer rebates for reclaimed water turf reduction projects.

In 2014, it was realized that there was still more that needed to be done. Seeing the successful results of the previous turf reduction project, it was decided to move forward with additional areas of turf reduction. After meeting with the water district the Association found that as much as \$2.00 per square foot to remove turf and replant with low water plant material could be received. In November 2014, an application was submitted to remove and replant approximately 150,000 square feet of additional turf. With the increased rebate paid by the district the cost was minimal to the association. The Association just received a rebate check in the amount of approximately \$305,000.

The water district has just released new information regarding upcoming rebates for 2015. They will no longer be offering rebates for reclaimed/recycled water users, they have implemented a maximum of 500 square foot allowance and the rebate is for \$1.00 per square foot of turf removed. These are all significantly less than what was previously allowed by the water district. Being proactive has paid off for the Association.

In addition, there were several areas that run-off was an issue. SCWD, management and Harvest worked together to install approximately 2000 MP Rotator nozzles, which put out a finger-like stream, rather than the spray of most nozzles. The cost for this project was almost \$20,000 and the Association paid nothing. SCWD continues to work with NSCA to be proactive to preserve this beautiful community and still minimize water consumption.

In closing please understand that although many people believe reclaimed/recycled water is abundant the cost is

significant. We pay almost \$4.00 per CFU used and the cost continues to rise. Reducing the amount of water used ultimately reduces the amount spent on water consumption and is a win-win for all. We are being water wise and contributing to the water conservation efforts.

Monuments: In the two years I have been here I have been working diligently with the Board of Directors, Landscape Committee and others to complete the Mariner entrance. The final step was to update the monuments. The Mariner entrance should be completed towards the middle of July with the new monuments and landscaping replaced.

Although we wanted the main community (Mariner) entrance to be updated we did not want to leave out the other entrances. We will be updating the Manta and Garibaldi entrances with stonework, new letters and the double dolphin logo. The other monuments at Cabrillo and Selva will also get new letters and the double dolphin logos. The entire project should be completed by the end of July or the first part of August.

It is hopeful that the modern pots, letters and logo will add the touch of prestige elegance that sets this community apart. We have already had several inquiries from other communities to tour our turf reduction efforts and requesting information about the new updated look of the community.

NEWS FROM OUR CITY

There is a new adventure that our city started on Friday, June 26 when a new trolley service began a round trip route through the city from Capistrano Beach to Monarch Beach. You can hop on at the corner of Selva Road and Pacific Coast Highway (PCH), either going north which will make stops at the St. Regis Hotel and the Ritz Carlton Hotel before heading south along PCH where you can jump on at Selva Road going south. This free shuttle service will also connect to Laguna Beach's trolley service at the Ritz Carlton allowing one to go from Capo Beach to Laguna Beach.

These initial shuttles will be colorfully wrapped to look like *Woodys* that we all remember from our surfing days. The trolley will be powered by alternative fuels, will be

Irrigation Update

With the turf removal complete and drought tolerate planting finished, sprinkler heads (spray and high efficiency nozzles) need to be changed to accommodate the two separate areas. Also, with 51 controllers and 65 water meters, Harvest must update the system to properly irrigate these areas.

Continuing to cause problems are contractors working on remodels, who will trench for underground lines and break irrigation wiring. Fortunately the HydroPoint satellite controlled irrigation system immediately picks up the problem area and causes an alert, which Ignacio Chavez from Harvest is informed of its location. handicap accessible, and have bike racks. Wait times will be 15 minutes or less.

For all you smartphone users real-time trolley locations and wait times can be accessed with the use of a website tracker at www.dptrolley.com

This service will operate only on the weekends from June through Labor Day, Sept. 7. As mentioned above it will make stops at our major hotels, Town Center, Doheny Park Rd. and Dana Point Harbor. Hours of operation: Fridays, 12 noon to 10:00 p.m.; Saturdays, 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.; Sundays, 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. If you find yourself with nothing to do on the weekend take the family on a ride to see the sights of Dana Point. —*Karl Kuhn*

South Coast Water District is working closely with Harvest to monitor and inspect all areas of the Landscape Renewal Plan. Nacho estimates less than one year for all the irrigation stations to be complete and reclaimed water efficiently utilized which will reduce water usage for our community.

The peak day will likely be July 4 with folks arriving early to enjoy the super delicious Men's Club breakfast that has incidentally earned an outstanding reputation up and down the coast. This will be followed by our community's annual Fourth of July parade. Even more folks will flock into the Shores to watch both old and young people march or strut their stuff in this the most colorful, patriotic and fun event in Orange County. Now we get serious, the sand castle building contest begins, along with that some heavy duty picnicking starts on the beach and bluff. Some folks will opt out of the beach activity to hang out at the pool and eat a hot dog or two. Others might enjoy a backyard barbeque. 

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
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




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
