owned their own sailboat for 20 plus years and they are experienced sailors. About a year ago a good friend called and told him that he and his wife had just purchased a 58-foot sailboat, *La Zuccherina*. They were planning to sail from San Francisco to Florida by way of the Panama Canal and invited him to go along with them. The plan was that they would set out from San Francisco with a stop in Dana Point pick up Bob and then travel on to Florida. The trip would take approximately 60 days.

It was, according to Bob, "the trip of a lifetime", and although he was concerned about being gone for that long a period, Rebecca was supportive and so Bob agreed. It was a trip that would take them from Dana Point down Mexico's Pacific coast, into El Salvador, Costa Rica, then through the Panama Canal, into Honduras, Havana, Key West, Florida and finally arriving in Punta Gorda, Florida.

Approximately 60 days at sea! Up to this point, the longest trip he had been on was a 20-day sail. However, he was optimistic and looked forward to the adventure.

Another sailing buddy, Rick, had agreed to go along as well. It was a tough time of the year to be gone for both Bob and Rick, it meant leaving their wives and families over the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, however, this was a trip Bob had always wanted to do, and you know one of those Bucket List trips. So after a couple days of final preparations and some repair work on the boat's alternator, they set sail from Dana Point on November 13th, with a


plan to arrive in Punta Gorda about January 12, 2016.

The La Zuccherina's first stop was Ensenada, Mexico. This was an important stop because it was where they would pick up their necessary documents allowing them to sail in Mexican waters. They had sailed all night to get to Ensenada and just as they were approaching the harbor, they spotted what appeared to be a Police Boat headed directly for them. The boat turned out to be the Mexican Navy; they were armed with machine guns and wearing full body armor, a little intimidating to say the least. Several Navy crewmembers actually boarded the La Zuccherina and demanded to see each crewmember's documentation, which they had not yet obtained. It took a bit of scrambling, however, they were able to satisfy the Navy Patrol. It crossed their minds that the Navy's reaction was a bit of an "over kill", but as they later found out, this was in fact the morning of the terrorist attacks in Paris and needless

to say all military were on high alert. Once everyone was able to present the required passports they were allowed to continue into the port of Ensenada. While in Ensenada the crew had a chance to re-connect with a longtime friend, Pete, who has been living on his boat in Ensenada for the past several years, Pete by the way, is 90 years old and still enjoying a sailors life down in Ensenada, Mexico.

Their next destination was Magdalena Bay, which was 460 miles away on the western coast of Mexico. The voyage to "Mag Bay" turned out to be a bit more adventurous than anticipated, as they encountered 45-50 knot winds and "GIANT" waves. This caused them to change course and seek a safe haven at the closest land they could find, which was San Quintin in Baja, Mexico. The boat had sustained some minor damage, which required them to stay put in for a few days. Back on course, they continued their journey,

finally making it to "Mag Bay" four days later. Once they arrived, however, they noticed that the boat's batteries were not holding a charge and that the alternator was not working at all! They needed to get to Cabo San Lucas to get help in repairing these problems; however, they had to depend primarily on the wind to take them the 160 miles to Cabo. Once in Cabo, they were able to stock up on supplies and get some help with replacing the dead battery and repairing the alternator. Hurricane Sandy, meanwhile seemed to be headed directly for Cabo, giving them some serious rain and big swells, but veered off Cabo's course allowing them to be free to set sail for



Weather and boat repairs warranted that they stay in Cabo longer than anticipated, however, by about day 19 now of their trip they were leaving Cabo and heading to Bahia Navidad, a two or three day trip south. Once they arrived in Bahia Navidad, a beautiful resort, they noticed an old familiar problem had reappeared, you guessed it, the alternator had stopped working. They found another mechanic to try to help with the alternator and hopefully be their final fix. The following morning, with the newly repaired alternator, they were off and running, or so they thought, the *La Zuccherina* suddenly came to an abrupt stop; they had run aground into a sandbar. Unfortunately,

their timing was especially bad, because there was no hope of going anywhere until high tide, which was about 6 hours later. After a great lunch and taking some consolation in learning that many sailors had encountered the same sandbar, they were off again.

Hoping all their problems were behind them, they had a smooth night of sailing and woke up to a beautiful show of dolphins, but also, a loud strange sound coming from the engine and a large oil slick behind the boat. The transmission had imploded and it looked like their troubles were not over yet. Checking their charts, they saw that the closest bay was near the small village of Caleta de Compos. To complicate matters, there was zero wind, so they had to resort to running the engine for just a few moments at a time. Upon arrival in the tiny bay, their worries were far from over. Caleta de Compos, was a bit of a scary place, known for drug cartel murders and they were the only boat in the bay. After a less than restful night they found a local fisherman who took them into town where they hoped to get some help with the engine. Unfortunately, the most they were able to come up with in the tiny village was some transmission oil which they hoped would keep them going until they reached their next destination of Ixtapa.

They set off the next day just before sunset, hoping for favorable winds, since they could not use the engine. The winds were very light, just barely enough to keep them moving and they felt they were going nowhere fast. The boat's captain finally decided to run the engine for short 15-minute intervals, while he positioned himself in the engine room and hosed down the engine. After several days of drifting at sea with no motor and almost no winds they finally made it to the Ixtapa Marina. They were praying for a permanent fix for their engine problems and everyone in need of a refreshing swim. As noted earlier, the crew was just not catching a break, as they were about to go for that

swim, they spotted the warming signs CROCODILES!! NO SWIMMING!!

After several days in Ixtapa, they learned that the parts needed to repair the boat would take at least a week. Both Bob and fellow crewmember Rick had to think seriously about their future on this trip. Ixtapa was the only port with an international airport for many miles and the chance of getting to Panama before year's end did not look good. So, sadly, Bob's Bucket List trip had to come to an end. As he retells the events of the trip, he has no regrets. He experienced some wonderful sights, whales at 25 feet from the boat, hundreds of dolphins putting on a show, fresh sushi almost daily, lots of adventures and misadventures along the way.

The owners of La Zuccherina were able to travel a bit further, replacing first the alternator and eventually the transmission; however, once they arrived at Panama, they too decided to take a break from the trip. They packed their bags, found a dock at a local marina and left La Zuccherina in Panama. They headed home to Florida, this time by airplane! They plan to regroup later this year and sail the boat back to Florida. As for Bob, he still loves sailing and isn't taking anything off that Bucket List!! —Patti Staudenbaur

On May 17th, registration will begin at 6:00 pm in the Community Center and the Annual Meeting is scheduled to begin at 7:00 pm. A few things to remember when voting:

- Only individuals listed as the legal owners of the property (members) may vote
- Each property gets three votes (three Board seats open), and
- You must sign the outside envelope in order for your vote to be valid

Your vote is very important and must be received to establish quorum. The ballot must be received by the Inspector of Elections by May 16, 2016 (or you can bring it to the annual meeting) to be counted towards quorum.

INTERNS:

We are currently using two interns from the UCI Extension program. These students are working on two different projects for the Association. Deepika Kalaignan is from India and investigating options for data storage. We are required by law to maintain many documents and have numerous boxes in various locations. We would like to

streamline this by scanning these boxes of documents and storing those that need to be stored. The other intern is Cansel (Jon) Uzun from Turkey. Jon is working with George on street sign options. We have tried to figure out ways to use our unique signs, but have them lit up so they show up at night. Jon will be investigating alternatives and presenting them in the near future. As you may have seen, we have begun construction on the renovation of the Cabrillo slope. This is the slope that runs between Cabrillo Isle and Breaker's Isle streets. Harvest started demolition the middle of April and if all things work out this should take about 90 to 120 days to complete. As with all slopes it is a process, but will be nice when it is all cleaned up and planted.

10 Tips to Making Sure Your Contractor Measures Up from the Contractors State License Board

As the weather gets warmer and the days get longer, the urge to make home improvements increases. With that comes the task of selecting a contractor to assist with larger projects (once you've received AC approval, of course!). The following tips in helping to select a contractor were published by the Contractors State License Board website (www.cslb.ca.gov).

- 1. Hire only state-licensed contractors.
- **2.** Check a contractor's license number online at www. cslb.ca.gov or by calling (800) 321-2752.
- **3.** Get at least three bids.
- **4.** Get three references from each bidder and review past work in person.
- **5.** Make sure all project expectations are in writing and only sign the contract if you completely understand the terms.
- **6.** Confirm that the contractor has workers' compensation insurance for employees.
- 7. Never pay more than 10% down or \$1000, whichever is

less. Don't pay in cash.

- **8.** Don't let payments get ahead of the work.
- **9.** Keep a job file of all papers relating to your project, including all payments.
- **10.** Don't make the final payment until you're satisfied with the job.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

I realize you couldn't possibly give me 100% credit for the brilliant and informative articles I submit monthly for the *SeaShore News*, BUT, I'm OK with that IF you read them and pay heed to the tips, suggestions, and very valid direction each provides to keep us safe and aware of possible threats that we face from both natural and man-made dangers.

On April 2, The Orange County Register published an article entitled "FAMILY 911—In case of Emergency, create a security plan to protect and find your loved ones." The article suggests the critical need of what we need to know about the whereabouts of our family members when a

natural disaster or violent event occurs. On an average day, our children are at school or day care, and Mom and Dad are at work, at home, or running errands. During or after a crisis, parents often rush to their kids' schools to retrieve them. The 911 emergency phone lines are probably tied up and cellphones calls might not go through. Things can, OR WILL, be chaotic.

San Bernadino, Sandy Hook, an Earthquake, (how about Japan or Ecuador in mid-April?), power outages, or many other unexpected events that DO HAPPEN. Just watch the evening news almost everyday. PREPARATION is a powerful way to help squelch those fears. Create a communication plan and discuss it with your kids (and extended family) several times a year.

Parents should (MUST) learn about their school's disaster-response plans, as well as how to create a plan where each family member understands how to follow a predetermined plan of contacting one another and having them know where to go until an all clear is issued.

Social media (Facebook, Twitter) provide real-time updates. Here are a few tips to make sure you have your act together if and when unexpected events happen:

- Include your kids in the emergency-planning process. Shop for your emergency-supply kit with them and make sure they know where the kits are stored.
- Learn about emergency and evacuation plans for schools, day care providers, and workplaces.
- Make sure your kids' school emergency contact cards are updated.
- Go to ready.gov/kit to learn what to equip in your inhouse emergency resources.

This list of EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS goes well beyond the tips we've suggested above for protecting your loved ones. Do yourself a favor and make your own list of contact numbers, supplies, create a family understanding of what to do if various events occur, and be confident you have a least taken these precautionary steps to protect your family.

These steps apply to not only families residing in our community but to couples whose children are grown and no longer living at home, and single individuals living alone. Customize your own plan and list of what to do in an emergency. We are one big family in NIGUEL SHORES. Let's make sure we all take care of one another.

MEN'S CLUB

April provided us a look into the mind of an artist and a less enjoyable look at the hard decisions of managing water during drought.

Our first guest speaker, Robert Richert, gave us an exhilarating look through A Window Into the Artist's Creative Mind. Robert majored in Scientific Illustration after serving in Viet Nam and learned how to apply that knowledge and discipline to the creation of art. Thirty-four years later, he reveals that emotion combined with talent and technique, enables him to interpret the beauty of Nature. His preference is to work in the studio using his own photos for reference, rather than paint on site outdoors. Rather than interpreting a scene literally, he frequently combines multiple elements of different photos (and artistic license) to give his paintings rich detail and exciting composition. As he executes his intricate works, he said he feels like an ant as he works and reworks each minute detail. We viewers were visually delighted as Robert showed us how his paintings evolve during each step. As the elements of composition, color, value (light and dark) and texture are added, the process reminded me of a time-lapse photo of a flower blossom opening. (http://www.richertart.com/html/soy 01.html)

We were particularly impressed as he shared how an object can be added to a scene that will stop the eye or direct the viewer in a way critical to enjoying the scene. A final highlight was his emotional story of one of his commissioned works that was destroyed when the owner's home burned. Robert painted them a near duplicate, but his real reward was the gratitude of the couple that now had a new foundation for their memories.

Our speakers on April 19 were our own Rick Erkenoff and Bill Green, plus Andrew Burnhart, the General Manager of the South Coast Water District. In addition to being in the Men's Club, Rick is vice president and Bill is a director on the South Coast Water District Board. We were fortunate to get a well-informed overview of the drought that we are having in California, the actions being considered by the board to provide a stable supply in the future, and the Board's rationale for upcoming water increases.

Currently, we are supplied with 90% of our water from the Colorado River Aqueduct. What about all of the water in Northern California? Fifty percent of it flows out under the Golden Gate, 40% is for agricultural use, and about 5% is available for use in the northern and 5% for the southern part of the state (additionally, southern California is on a 20% state allocation from the northern water supply). The hard facts are: we have about 7 days of water supply in nearby storage and we depend on the Colorado River. One long-term solution to this risky situation might be the proposed Doheny Ocean Desalination facility that could supply 15 million gallons a day. The Board believes the Doheny Project could be producing water as early as 2019.

Now that we are assured that the Board is forward looking and planning for the future, what about this rumored rate increase? That news is less comforting. In short, the Board has proposed a new rate structure that is based on taxing each water meter to pay for fixed costs of the operation, and paying for variable costs by setting rates for actual water used. This kind of rate structure is particularly stressing on HOAs like Niguel Shores who have invested in recycled- water irrigation, because we have a large number (66) of recycled water meters. The Cost of Service and Rate Study being prepared for the Board recommends a new \$1375 charge per 2" Recycle Water Meter on the Tax Bill. The Board's proposal is that the SCWD customers have been subsidizing the Fix Cost of Recycle Water and only charging 90% of Potable Water rates, however due to the San Juan Capistrano lawsuit government agencies can no longer subsidize rates and must charge the actual cost of water production and delivery. There is some possibility to reduce (not offset) this impact because the Niguel Shores Manager's office is working with the Board to find a way to reduce the number of meters and help find an equitable solution for the recycled-water cost increases.

GARDEN CLUB

El Nino did arrive as predicted and has helped improve the drought situation in California but we are not out of the woods yet. Water conservation is still important to maintain and our community has received many accolades for its efforts. One interesting way to tap into further water savings in the garden is to deliver water directly to the roots. This can be accomplished by the use of the Olla, or terra cotta pot, an ancient form of localized plant irrigation. The Ollas are positioned in the ground, with just the narrow neck being visible. Water is refilled every 5 to 10 days. Once the nearby plants are established, their roots will grow towards the water source, and over time, the roots attach themselves outside of the Olla and draw water as they need. These Ollas can be purchased through a water conserving business called: Growoya.com.

Now that you have learned a way to conserve water, you can proceed happily to beautify your garden with new plants. Fortunately for you, you do not have to leave the community. The Garden Club will be holding its **Annual Plant Sale** on May 7, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Entry fee- \$ 1.00 per person. Great selection of plants and gardening items that you can choose from. 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
