
Please note the Board meetings for the coming year will be the second Wednesday of each month with General Session to be held at 6:00 p.m.

Website and Board Information: The website is a great place to find just what you are looking for and Board information is no exception. The agenda, board actions, notice for meetings, election information, and more are all posted conveniently on the website. If you are looking for other information and don't see it on the website, let the management office know. We may be able to help you with your search.

Assessment Payments: Assessments are due the first day of the quarter or January 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1. These assessments are not late until the 30th of that same month so please remember to plan accordingly. If the 30th falls on a weekend and the payment does not get posted by the Association bank until the next business day, it will be considered late and will have a late charge applied. To prevent this from happening it would be a good idea to schedule your payment a few days prior to the 30th to avoid late fees. This year April 30 landed on a Sunday and it seemed to be a big issue for several people this past month.

Important Rule Reminders as Summer Begins:

■ Enforcing Beach Parking — Guests Parked at The Beach Lot — Please make sure that your guests have



- their passes properly displayed on the vehicle dashboard and that they are parked within the designated upper parking tier, as posted, when visiting the beach bluff. Guest vehicles found without a properly displayed pass are subject to tow one hour after a citation is issued.
- **Pool Monitor** From Memorial Day through Labor Day, a pool monitor will monitor access and enforce the rules and regulations at the community center. The Association does not provide Lifeguards, so persons using the pool and spa do so at their own risk. Your guests must be accompanied by the resident to be allowed to use the common area amenities, so make sure you are with them. Some of the pool and spa rules are posted, but they are also available in the office and on the website.
- No Bluff Monitor There will not be a bluff monitor this year, but there are several cameras that show all activity on and around the beach bluff so make sure you comply with the rules of the beach bluff. There are rules posted at the bluff and they are also available on the website for your convenience. Please take a moment to review the rules and avoid any unnecessary obstacles when enjoying this amenity.

FLAG DAY

On June 14 our nation celebrates Flag Day to honor the flag and traditions of this great country. While some native born citizens may be too busy in their daily lives to take a moment to reflect on this day, there will be others around our nation who will place their right hand over their heart and silently whisper the national anthem in grateful tribute. These are the people who recently experienced the exciting ceremony of becoming citizens, and for them Old Glory's red, white, and blue represents their acceptance as new Americans.

Let me give you a brief description of what the Citizenship Ceremony was like for a good friend who recently went through that nervous but joyous event.

After notification from the Immigration and Naturalization Department that she had passed the test to become an American citizen, my friend received a formal announcement to attend the swearing-in ceremony at the Los Angeles Convention Center, with her arrival required by 7:30 a.m.

On the appointed day, she waited in a long line to show her announcement letter and legal identification, and to turn in her green card. Then she entered the main arena to be seated among the 3000 people there from 135 countries waiting to be sworn-in. Of special notice were the five uniformed military serviceman sitting in the front row, their significance revealed later to the crowd (and also at the end of this article). My friend's family and all other guests were directed to the upper level of the arena to watch from there.

When the ceremony began, all the arena lights were dimmed except for a spotlight on the American Flag on the front stage. Everyone rose, placed their right hand over their heart, and pledged allegiance to the United States of America. Then the lights came on to rousing cheers and thunderous clapping from the assembled audience who all sang our national anthem together.

The most memorable moment for the 3000 new citizens was receiving their citizenship documents. Though it took



some time to pass out the materials and congratulate each recipient, the crowd was eager, respectful, and grateful. At the end, my friend and her proud family beamed as they returned to their car for the long drive home through the streets and freeways of her new country.

I found this special ceremony to be a fitting story as our nation celebrates Flag Day this month. On a personal note the story means a lot to me because, like my friend and maybe like your own family members, my immigrant parents from Germany were so proud when they received their American citizenship.

I end this article by mentioning two very different places where you will see our American flag flying on Flag Day. The first, very nearby, is the Carlsbad Flower Fields just down the 5 Freeway, where a huge carpet of red, white, and blue flowers is planted in the stars and stripes of our flag to honor this nation. The second, at the National Cemetery in Washington, D.C., is the centerpiece of a sculpture depicting the very famous raising of the American flag at the battle of Iwo Jima during World War II when five Marines raised the flag over Mt. Suribachi. Now it's our turn. Display your flag proudly on June 14.

MAINTENANCE

Among the items of NSCA infrastructure that require maintenance attention are the HOA's many fences. Our proximity to the ocean creates a challenging environment for upkeep on these. Projects are underway to repair/replace two relatively large fence segments because of rusting.

One project involves the fence along Ports O' Call separating NSCA from PCH. This fence has sections of masonry wall along with sections of iron fence. There are twelve iron fencing sections in this wall. While the masonry portions are in reasonably good condition, about seven of the iron fencing sections are severely rusted and must be replaced. The other portions need to be painted. The Maintenance Department has solicited proposals for this work from several vendors. A winning vendor will be soon selected, and the restoration will be completed this summer.

The second project is for the fence that separates the lower part of the bluff park from the beach. Here, there has been extensive rusting, and the fence must be replaced. This involves about 140 feet of fence. The Maintenance Department solicited bids from several vendors and a decision was made to install a fence of a colored vinyl material. This project will be finished in the next few months.

These two projects are representative of the maintenance efforts required to maintain NSCA infrastructure.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

TRAFFIC AND SAFETY

Neighborhood Electric Vehicles (NEVs) and Golf Carts

With the warm weather upon us, a lot of folks will be cleaning and charging their Golf Carts or Neighborhood Electric Vehicles to transport friends and family to the beach, pool, or neighbors' homes within the community.

Note: Technically, all vehicles operating in the Shores are considered Neighborhood Electric Vehicles or NEVs. The legal restrictions on carts used for golf are slightly different.

To minimize any confusion while using these vehicles in our community, we have a few reminders: All NEVs and/or Golf Carts have to be registered with the office and should bear a registration decal. An extra benefit of this is that it allows the vehicle to park in the Resident Only parking lot at the Bluff. The driver of any vehicle must have a driver's license, and is responsible for the safety of all passengers. All rules of the vehicle code apply to safe operation of these vehicles.

It happens every year that children somehow wind up driving these vehicles, sometimes even without adult supervision. This simply is not safe and could have very negative consequences both here and with the DMV.

Emergency Vehicles

The Orange County Fire Authority and the Dana Point Municipal Code mandate that parking is not allowed on culde-sac streets and one-way-streets that are less than 28 feet in width. The reason is that such parking restricts emergency vehicle access and/or reduces the ability to respond to a critical situation promptly.

Almost everyone residing on these narrow streets will appreciate this mandate and park in garages or designated parking stalls only. Unfortunately, guests sometimes park curbside on these streets, unaware of the consequences of

doing this. Sometimes the host may forget to remind guests to park elsewhere, so the guest winds up receiving a citation.

We all should be aware that curbside parking on a relatively narrow street (28 feet or less) can likely impede the movement of an emergency vehicle and we should look for alternative parking. We are not asking folks to carry a measuring tape, but to utilize good judgement.

Parking Fines

Recently there was some apparent confusion about fines for parking violations. Should anyone wish to know further, please contact the office and they will be glad to explain the written policy. Basically, violators must pay fines after the fourth violation in a calendar year. Even after that, the fines for repeated violators are relatively nominal but imposed as a deterrent.

WOMEN'S CLUB

The May Luncheon at the Clubhouse was a festive occasion with bouquets for all the mothers, the introduction of two new members, Stephanie Prince and Julie Skillman, and the election of our new slate of officers for next year: President, Lydia Reese; Co-Vice Presidents, Terry Link and Maria Elena Banks; Secretary, Bunny Mahoney; Treasurer, Cathy Tyson.

Our special guests included Dana Point Mayor Debra Lewis and Marla Miller, our Niguel Shores General Manager. The day's distinguished speakers were Ursula Luna-Reynosa, Director of Dana Point's Community Development Department; Kelly Reenders, Dana Point Economic Development Manager; and Russ Chilton, Dana Point Chief of Police.

Ursula and Kelly presented an overview of the city's demographics and discussed plans for Dana Point's future development including both residential and commercial space. Slides of architectural renderings for the Doheny Village Project illustrated a complete redevelopment with

residential units, industrial/market space, and a thoroughfare with roundabouts replacing the current traffic snarls along Camino Capistrano. They pointed out that tourism is our biggest industry and the city is looking at proposals for more hotel rooms in areas of the Headlands, Cannons, Green Lantern, and Harbor Drive.

Police Chief Chilton mentioned how fortunate we are to live in Dana Point, rated one of the top ten coastal communities

according to a recent article in Coastal Living magazine. Regarding crime, the Chief reminded us that 58% of thefts occur in UNLOCKED vehicles. He mentioned that Niguel Shores is visited by police for more false burglar alarms than for any other reason.

As our outside activity this month, San Clemente Villas is providing lunch and a tour of their independent and assisted living facilities on Tuesday, June

6. The Villas shuttle will be available for 12 people, and carpools are also being arranged. Sign up in the NSCA Office.

To end the club year, our annual Tea and Installation of Officers will be held on Thursday, June 8 in the Clubhouse. Remember to bring your own fancy tea cup, wear a pretty hat if you like, and come to enjoy all the sweet and savory delights of a formal tea hosted by our Women's Club Board.

Our Scholarship Committee was pleased to receive applications from 14 very worthy graduating high school seniors. The scholarships were announced on May 18 with winners invited to attend the June 6 Men's Club meeting. Congratulations to William Rosenthal and Jazi Jon, both of Dana Hills High School, who will each receive \$1,000 toward their college expenses.

At our breakfast meeting on April 18, Orange County Sheriff Sandra Hutchens gave a captivating overview of her 38 years in law enforcement. Since 2008 Sheriff Hutchens has led one of the nation's most demanding law enforcement organizations, providing protection for unincorporated Orange County plus 13 cities (including Dana Point), the Orange County Transportation Authority, John Wayne Airport, the OC Harbor Patrol, marine firefighting, coastline search and rescue, jails with 6000 inmates, a crime lab, and court services. By the way, she is also the coroner!

Hutchins first assignment as an officer with the Los Angeles Police Department was as a Deputy in the jail system. She says the inmates at that time were 30% felons and 70% misdemeanors; however, today 80% are felons! Crediting technology as an important crime fighting tool, the sheriff praised her DNA investigation team for their work combating the increasing number of property crimes. Her strategy is to "catch one burglar and prevent 100 burglaries." With cyber-crime representing the "new wave"

of crimes, she reminds us that no member of her police force will ever email or call asking for donations, so don't fall for those easy-to-prevent scams. On battling terrorism, she praised cooperation with the Joint Terrorism Task Force and asked us all to be vigilant and report suspicious things. Drugs brought out the sheriff's most somber concerns, with heroin representing the next addiction step after prescription drugs, and marijuana impair-

ment being a significant legal problem as well.

Once before, we described Sheriff Hutchens as having the right combination of steel and compassion for the job. Now we add a wealth of experience to those accolades.

At our May 2 meeting, we heard from writer and therapist Leonard Szymczak who spoke on constructive ways to deal with negativism and conflict in personal relationships. He advised everyone to listen, be appreciative, focus on the positive, be aware of emotional triggers, avoid blaming, stay calm, provide help or service if needed, offer caring gestures and affection. All these ideas appear with relevant examples in Szymczak's new book coauthored with attorney Mari Frank, Fighting for Love: Turn Conflict into Intimacy.

To honor Mother's Day we presented the ladies in our lives with red roses of appreciation at our May 16 breakfast. Financial Advisor James Fullenkamp presented valuable insights on estate planning and record keeping. He advised us to have all personal and professional information in a retrievable, well understood format in case of emergencies or passing of family members. He suggested organizing the following documents into one folder or notebook: Marriage papers, divorce papers, life insurance policies, individual retirement accounts, 401 accounts, pension documents, personal and family medical history, durable health-care power of attorney, authorization to release healthcare information, living will, donot-resuscitate order, housing, land and cemetery deeds and escrow mortgage accounts. Other helpful documents would be proof of loans made and debts owed, vehicle titles, stock certificates, savings bonds and brokerage accounts, partnership and corporate operating agreements, tax returns, annuity contracts, list of bank accounts, list of all user names and passwords, list of safe-deposit boxes and, finally, a will and trust documents.

I'm encouraged when I see the young men around me growing into responsible fathers, brothers, uncles, cousins and friends who are sensitive to today's equality issues, involved in the lives of their children, interested in bettering the world through peace and justice, and unafraid to show compassion for the human condition. They are forging a new male role model through their good example—but I hope they are still opening doors for others, as did the gentlemen before them.

To all the fathers, uncles, brothers, friends, and single-moms who fill the important role of Dad this Father's Day: I hope you continue to set an example of love, strength, kindness, courtesy, and integrity for those who look up to you. Without realizing it, you just might be leaving an important imprint on someone's life. Happy Father's Day. Relax, enjoy, and keep up your good work.

His father and mother opened Rumari in Laguna Beach in 1989, and his brother owns and operates a Crivello's in Huntington Beach. Sebastian has brought the family tradition of fine food to San Juan Capistrano in a friendly relaxed local restaurant.

Upon arrival guests are served a tasty grilled baguette toast with oil and vinegar while making their dinner selections. Some of the favorite dishes are Spaghetti and Meatballs, Eggplant Parmigiana, Meat Lasagna and Linguine Frutti di Mare. I personally enjoyed the Chicken and Veal Piccatas. Also, when available, the Lollipop Lamb Chops are to die for, as well as the Calamari Piccata.

The Chicken and Veal entrees come with sautéed vegetables or pasta of your choice, and you can add their Classic Caesar Salad with homemade croutons for \$3. The Chicken entrées are \$18; Veal Entrees are \$23. Pasta dishes are available with sauce of your choice and average \$13 to \$20. Specials are between \$20 to \$30. For dessert I recommend the Tiramasu or Chocolate Blackout Cake.

Happy Hour is from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Wine is \$5 per glass and there are a variety of happy hour appetizers. Cypress Grove, their house wine, is a very good value at \$17.00 per bottle. Corkage fee, if you bring your own, is \$15.

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
