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Spa Handrail Covers: The pool and spa had new handrail covers installed when the pool opened in March of 2017. These covers provide those using the pool or spa the ability to grip the rail, allowing them safe entrance and preventing a potential injury from a hand slipping on the rail. At the end of



June someone decided to rip one of the spa handrail covers. We are replacing this one, but since this is an added expense to the Association, if this continues to be an issue, we may have to eliminate the covers altogether. Please know the covers are for everyone's benefit so try to avoid damaging them in the future.

Beach Bluff Tables: If you have been to the Bluff lately you have probably seen the new redwood picnic tables that were purchased by the Maintenance Committee. These are beautiful and should be enjoyed for many years to come. While the new redwood tables are anchored down, there are other tables that are portable and can be moved around and placed for friends to gather and enjoy. Please make sure that when you are moving tables at the Bluff that you do not put the tables on the sidewalk, but rather keep them in the grass areas. Many people walk down there along the sidewalk for the stability of the path. If we move tables blocking the sidewalk some individuals have a tough time walking in the grass area. Thank you for your consideration with this matter.

Fabulous 4th of July Celebration: When I first came to work at Niguel Shores I can remember people talking about the 4th of July Celebration and making statements that it is the most amazing event of the year. MAINTENANCE

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

WOW, is it August already? Although there's still plenty of summer and fall to enjoy, don't forget to keep in mind the precautions for hot weather, sunburn, beach and pool safety, crazy traffic, and so forth.

AND, I hate to remind you, as if you didn't know already, but back-to-school is just around the corner. In addition to getting supplies and some new duds for your book worms, why don't you make sure to update all the contact information you need for their schools, and if they are old enough to have cell phones, any numbers they should have for emergency contacts. If they need to have an annual check-up at the doctor's office now's the time to make that appointment. AND, don't forget to be extra careful driving as kids, big and little, aren't always mindful of traffic.

I'm big on making lists and checking them twice, so why not check out the items I've listed below and make sure you have them on hand for any emergencies, even including the BIG ONE!

Knowing how to treat minor injuries can make a difference in an emergency. You may consider taking a first aid class, but simply having the following things can help you stop bleeding, prevent infection and assist in decontamination. Taking an American Heart Association class in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and automated external defibrillator (AED) would be a great idea, too.

Try to have these on hand:

- adhesive bandages in a variety of sizes
- scissors
- tweezers
- sterile dressings to stop bleeding
- cleansing agent/soap and antibiotic towelettes
- antibiotic ointment
- burn ointment
- two pairs of Latex or other sterile gloves
- eye wash solution to flush the eyes or as a general decontaminant
- thermometer
- aspirin or non-aspirin pain reliever
- antacid

This list can certainly be expanded, but you should, at least, have the basics, not only in your home but in your family's cars/SUVs, too. For the vehicles I would also include flashlights, water, always a cell phone and charger, fire extinguisher, flares or reflective triangle. The list gets expanded if you travel to remote areas for hiking, camping, and skiing.

Think this is too much work or effort? The good news is you can find ready-made kits for home and auto online or at Costco, Home Depot, REI, and other retailers. Hard to challenge having these Emergency Preparedness items on hand when it comes to the safety of family and others, whether at home or on the road.

(Note: We'll revisit another checklist for Earthquake Preparedness in an upcoming article.)

TRAFFIC AND SAFETY COMMITTEE **Guests:**

On occasion, we have misunderstandings involving guests and folks purporting to be guests with our screening personnel at the front gate. While our patrol officers seldom have difficulty with regular residents, most of the conflict involves people not on a current guest list or guests attempting to bring in their own guests. The attitude of these folks ranges sometimes from just plain rude to belligerent.

We can all minimize most potential conflict by keeping our guest list current. If we need to make a last-minute add-on we have to appreciate that our gate system is a bit slow and it may take up to twenty minutes or more to reflect an update at the gate computer. A phone call to the

gate house can be effective, but on occasion the attendant is busy and doesn't have the time to pick up the phone. To ensure everything goes smoothly I have often personally gone to the gate and informed them of the add-on.

Remember, hosts are responsible for the conduct of guests, and that includes all parking citations the guest might receive. Some guests seemingly abuse the system and may continue to do so unless the specific host takes charge and explains our rules and/or removes the offender from their guest list. Otherwise the fines could prove to be very expensive.

Right-now I am thinking of those guests that don't check in with their hosts and drive to the lower parking lot at the Bluff where parking is reserved for residents only. Those citations and fines will add up quickly.

Audio and Video Recording:

A brief reminder, should you suddenly discover that one of your guests embarrassed you and your family at the gate, you may review the extra-clear audio and video recording of the incident with staff.

Celebrating Niguel Shores Women

Niguel Shores Women's Club (NSWC) would like to invite our women residents to join us at our luncheon meetings which will resume in September and continue monthly to the Annual Tea in June.

We meet the second Thursday of the month from Noon to 2:00 p.m. to share tasty salads and desserts, conduct brief business, and enjoy the day's featured program or event. Our programs differ each month with invited luncheon speakers to keep us informed on current topics. We also hold a winter Holiday Party, present a spring Fashion Show, host a biannual Home Tour, and serve hot dogs to the community on the Fourth of July. The only commitment for members is to bring a salad every other month they attend the luncheon meetings. Beyond that, they can enjoy the fun, bonding, laughter and participation in club activities to whatever degree they are able—one gathering, once a month, with delicious food and a lively program included!

As the current president of NSWC, I would like to share with you more about who we are as a group. I have been very impressed with our membership from the diversity of ages, careers, family backgrounds and high achievements club members have obtained.

> This past February, our members were asked to complete a survey which would help to more fully educate ourselves on the make up of our club. We have 130 members. Of those, 62 responded to the survey (a 47% response rate!). In summary, allow me to introduce you to NSWC:

- Our ages range from 41 to 99 years young. The majority of women are Caucasian, with a few Hispanic, Asian and Native American. The highest percentage of women are married while others are either widowed and/or responded single. There was one "not sure," so I hope this is figured out in the near future.
- 8 members responded they have 1 child; 25 indicated they have 2 children; 13 have 3 children; 9 have 4 children; 3 have 5 children; and 1 member has 6 children.
- Having 2 grandchildren received the highest response (10 members) but there were those who had 3 to 7 grandchildren (4 or more members in each of those categories). The range of responses for the number of great grandchildren ran from 1 up to 10!
- In achieving higher educational goals, we have 13 Associate Degrees, 27 Bachelors, 21 Masters, 3 Doctorates, 1 Post-Doctorate and 23 professional degrees/certificates.
- Career/occupation areas broke down into the following:

ARTS: Art Director, Choral Director, Church Organist, Classical Singer, Fashion Designer, Script Supervisor, and Screen Writer.

BUSINESS: Accountant, Assistant Business Manager Sports

Illustrated, Business Manager, Chief Financial Officer, Entrepreneur, Medical Sales, Retail Sales, Customer Service, Vice President Sales, Vice President Stock Exchange, Wholesale Lending.

EDUCATION: K-12 Teacher, Department Chair, Counselor, Librarian, Principal, College Professor, Community College President.

HEALTH CARE: Nursing, Radiological Technician, Psychologist, Marriage and Family Counselor.

LEGAL: Lawyer, Legal Secretary, and Trust Advisor.

REAL ESTATE: Real Estate Broker/Agent, Property Manager.

TRAVEL: Flight Attendant, Travel Advisor/Manager.

WELL-BEING: Spiritual Director, Health Coach, Homemaker.

- Forty-three members are retired, 4 work full-time, 11 work part-time.
- Hobbies range from academic (reading, writing poetry/short stories/novels, learning languages, genealogy, publications) to art and handiwork (painting, photography, knitting, crafts, fine art).
- Members enjoy participating in games, music and theater, traveling, playing the stock market, remodeling and—of course—shopping!
- The majority are very health conscious and enjoy the outdoors via golf, walking, running, skiing, biking, hiking, dancing fishing, yoga, swimming, paddle boarding boating, tennis, and gardening.
- Over half of the members are involved in community and/or religious service.
- In addition, the recognition and awards of members are very impressive. These range from Exceptional Young American, NS Volunteer of the Year, Outstanding Employee, Woman of the Year for Leukemia, President of Foundation, Golden Apple Lifetime Teaching Award, Real Estate Award, Founders Plus Achievement Award, Top 50 Women Business Owner, being honored at the White House by President Reagan as an Outstanding Hispanic Community Leader, Award for Excellence in Teaching, Orange County Human Relations Award.
- Accomplishments include leadership positions on boards and foundations, Founding Member of Segerstrom Center for the Arts, and Founding Member of Dana Point Historic Society. They also include hiking Half Dome in Yosemite, climbing Mt. Whitney (twice), Speed Skater, Hospital Volunteer, and—most importantly—having raised "happy, well-adjusted and educated children."
- Members have lived in Niguel Shores from 1 year to 45 years.


We are a high energy, fun loving, caring group of women who enjoy each other's company, give back to the community, honor and value the past, celebrate the moment, and have hope for the future.

We have been impressed with the quality of recipients of our scholarships, such as the recent Jazi Jon and Michael




Rosenthal, who not only have superlative grades and accomplishments but are delightful young mend as well.

PageTurners Celebrates Twenty-Sixth Anniversary

Hope Luedeke, a founding member of PageTurners, recently shared a bit of the group's history, recalling the early days this way:

"My neighbor on Vista D'Onde, Barbara Crist, came to me one day during the summer of 1991 and asked what I thought about forming a book club. She and Marian Pearl had been discussing it and I thought it was a great idea so we set about finding others who would be interested. Margaret Brugger was part of that first group, along with about a dozen others—all wonderful, interesting ladies.

"Barbara picked the first book that she would discuss and I took the second. Back then a committee did the research and chose the books from members' suggestions. At first we chose seven books—three non-fiction and four fiction and met to discuss one each month. Later we increased our

monthly meetings to eight times per year.

"The leader would focus first on the background of the writer, which explained a lot about where the author was coming from when the book was written. Research wasn't easy back then and was usually based on information found in the library reference section. We often used guidelines for discussion, especially the five basics that Barbara felt were so important:

character, plot, location, theme, and style. As it turned out, we had a good group!"

Adding to Hope's description, we note that from its beginning PageTurners met in members' homes, but eventually the group became so popular that living rooms grew crowded on meeting days. When members decided that getting up and down from the floor was not their favorite aerobic activity, the difficult decision was made to split the group. Since 2012 one group has continued to meet on Monday mornings while two other groups gather Monday or Thursday afternoons.

The Monday morning group chooses its titles several times a year from current and classic works. Someone from the group usually presents information on the chosen title and author for the month, and everyone enjoys an active discussion at a member's home.

The Monday and Thursday afternoon groups both read the same titles, which are chosen annually by a nominating and voting process. Members from each afternoon group propose a list of nine titles to create a combined list of eighteen titles. Then everyone votes for nine books from the combined list. After the votes are tallied, the excitement builds over which books made the final cut. The results are revealed at an afternoon gathering of both

groups in June. There's something for everyone among the chosen books, as the list ranges from such classics as The American by Henry James to best sellers like A Gentleman from Moscow both in the same year. The books not chosen become a perfect

> source of independent reading as well.

> If you are interested in knowing what books PageTurners have read since 1991, click PageTurners -Past Selections on the Clubs menu of the Niguel Shores website, www.niguelshores. org. You will see that we have read 227 titles since the inception of the group! Feel free to start at the beginning and catch up!

Twice a year the afternoon groups have a joint

Tea and Cookie get-together and a "White Elephant" used book exchange, which usually includes a lot of friendly stealing when one member picks a book from the exchange table that someone else had been eyeing.

PageTurners' topics may range from the literary merits and flaws of a work to the larger theme a book presents or the personal life lessons learned. Our discussions are even livelier when we have friendly disagreements—a reason why this quote by Edmund Wilson is so appropriate: "No two persons ever read the same book."

NEW GOLF RULES FOR SENIORS (CONTINUED)

Rule 4.c.7(h)—If a putt passes over a hole without dropping, it is deemed to have dropped. The law of gravity supersedes the Rules of Golf.

Rule 5.—Putts that stop close enough to the cup that they could be blown in, may be blown in. This does not apply to balls more than three inches from the hole. No one wants to make a travesty of the game.

Rule 6.a.9(k)—There is no penalty for so-called "out of bounds." If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior golfer deserves an apology, not a penalty.

Rule 7.g.15(z)—There is no penalty for a ball in a water hazard, as golf balls should float. Senior golfers should not be penalized for manufacturers' shortcomings.

Rule 8.k.9(s)—Advertisements claim that golf scores can be improved by purchasing new golf equipment. Since this is financially impractical for many senior golfers, one-half stroke per hole may be subtracted for using old equipment.

Please advise all your senior friends of these important rule changes.

CUISINE CORNER

Villa Roma Restaurant, Market, and Deli

Villa Roma Argentinean/Italian restaurant is nestled in the La Paz Shopping Village on La Paz Road in Laguna Hills. Its im-

mediate neighbors include an excellent German bakery, The Heidelberg; one of South County's better mom and pop Japanese restaurants, Kappo Hana; a very good Mexican restaurant, Cecilia's; a decent fast food restaurant, Hot Off the Grill; and an outstanding, four to five-star restaurant, Ironwood.

Despite all the competition nearby, Villa Roma thrives. The three owners operate a formal restaurant on one side of the building, plus a market and deli on the other. The main restaurant offers excellent food, a casually sophisticated ambiance, and live evening entertainment of the Lawrence Welk type.

We dine at Villa Roma's main restaurant a few times a year, but we visit the small market and delicatessen right next

door on a regular basis because of its relaxed old-world atmosphere, shared kitchen, and similar menu to the more formal mother restaurant. Our visitors from out of the area normally ask to eat at the "Argentine" restaurant, referring to the market. As it is very family friendly, especially during the holiday season, we may find ourselves there several times a week.

This little market oozes atmosphere and good food. They carry a variety of fresh breads, cookies and baked pastries, plus plenty of packaged foods from Italy, Spain and South America. The frozen food section contains "Spanish" delicacies such as empanadas and pies. In the delicatessen, they offer a good selection of Italian and Spanish cold cuts selling for less than in most other stores. They also stock a small selection of South American beers and sodas (Inca Cola is a different treat).

I'd be remiss if I didn't mention the market's wines. Argentina is proud to be the fifth largest producer of wine in the world, and this is reflected in the abundance of Argentinian wines on the store's shelves. Of course, much of it is Malbec whose hint of red plum flavor and dark rich colors is especially complimentary to the red meat and Italian food Argentinians enjoy.

Sitting at one of the market's dozen or so tables, you see the deli displays, smell the aroma of meats and sauces, and hear Spanish, English and Italian being spoken. If you close your eyes you easily picture yourself in a friendly eatery in South America, Spain or Italy. Then comes the hard part deciding whether to order Italian food or the beef Argentinians are famous for.

The market's friendly serving staff will gladly explain the nuances of the various dishes. You might begin with an empanada with chimichurri sauce. Should you crave wine with your meal, you can order it by the glass or simply pick a well-priced bottle from the shelf for a four-dollar corkage fee. Since my wife's favorite food is Italian, she always orders that. Most others alternate between beef and Italian. You can't go wrong either way. The sauces on the pasta dishes are extremely good. Comments from east coast Italian inlaws about the Gnocchi indicate that it's the best they've had. The antipasto is authentic and only includes meats, cheese,

sardines and olives, no lettuce. People I know rave about the shrimp scampi and sea food linguini. Almost forgot to mention the pizza, which is always popular with a lot of the folks at the nearby tables. The only complaint I've heard is that it is too cheesy. Just shows that you can't please everyone.

As you might expect, this restaurant does an exceptional job grilling beef. They offer a wide range of steaks and other beef cuts. The two most popular are the Entrana (Skirt Steak) and Vacio (Flap Meat). Combined with a little Chimichurri sauce these are as tasty as you can get. If you choose, you may upgrade the cut of meat to a rib-eye or filet mignon. The beef is normally served with roasted or fried potatoes. A hint here: If you can handle it, try garlic fries.

Some folks with big appetites may wish to split a Parrilla Para Dos (Grill for Two). This is a sampler brought to the table on a hot grill. It includes a good variety of meats and sausages that can fill even the hungriest two people. As you look around at neighboring tables you will note that this dish is quite popular. Two of my sons feel this is the best item on the menu.

In conclusion, the main Villa Roma restaurant is good, but the neighboring market is highly recommended for a unique dining experience.
