Happy New Year to one and all! How many of you made New Year's resolutions? How many of them are still in force?

As I write this chapter of the monthly update, it's not even Christmas yet! But knowing my own foibles, I keep my vows short. And as concerns Niguel Shores, my resolve is to make the next five months in office productive and rewarding in the sense of accomplishment.

Toward that goal, the Board has reviewed the situation at Mariner gate. Many of our residents complain that they are not being recognized quickly enough by the duty officer to gain entry, that near misses have occurred when visitors forge ahead without consideration for decaled vehicles who have the right-of-way once they have been flagged through. This is a busy entrance and we're about to take steps to alleviate some of the congestion.

We have approved a phase-in system of more reliable entrance control, the first of which will be the installation of a manual gate arm in the visitors' lane, positioned at the gate house and controlled by the duty officer. The gate arm will remain down until the visitor's credentials have been checked, and guest or service pass issued. Then the duty officer will raise the arm when the resident lane is clear. Although there may be delays in processing the various visitors, it will reinforce our regulations concerning entry and should preclude the visitor approaching the intersection with Niguel Shores Dr. before the coast is clear.

The second addition to the entry will be the installation of a key card reader for use by the residents in the decal lane, the same system we use at Selva, Garibaldi and all other un-manned gates. In the case of Mariner, however, it will be possible for the duty officer to activate the gate in the event a resident with a properly decaled vehicle is unable to use his card for whatever reason.

We believe these improvements are warranted, but we shall also welcome your thinking on the subject. Time will be allotted at the January 19th Board meeting (8 pm) for your comments on these access controls which are due for installation in February and March.

In December's Seashore News, we alerted you to the necessity of checking the spark arresters on your chimney, making sure they are intact and will prevent sparks flying in the high winds. If you burn wood in your fireplace, this is a must.

Two other maintenance items should be attended to as well, considering the potential rains ahead of us.

- 1) Clean your roof gutters and downspouts, and make sure there are no leaks at the gutter seams.
- 2) Trim overgrown trees and shrubs on your property which rub against the house or that of a neighbor's house. These can damage siding in a storm as well as clog drains; also, if they're high enough to rub against the roof line, they can damage shingles.

CHANGES COMING TO MARINER GATE

The Board of Directors and the Traffic and Safety Committee have reviewed several proposals involving Mariner gate. The purpose of these suggestions is to improve the operation of the gate and the service of the duty officer.

The Board has directed management to start implementing several of the proposals. Below are the items, along with the proposed month use will start:

- 1. JANUARY add additional pavement markings leading to Mariner gate.
- 2. FEBRUARY installation of a manual gate arm across the visitor entry lane. The duty officer will raise and lower this arm to control entering traffic from the visitor lane. Some of you have been in several near accidents when passing the visitor lane. The arm will not be raised by the duty officer until resident traffic has cleared.

An article will be placed in the Seashore News introducing the current assigned AmSec staff.

3. MARCH - activation of the key card reader. Residents using the decal entry lane will have to use their key card to open the gate for entry. This is the process used at all the other gates for entry to Niguel Shores. This will help to keep unauthorized vehicles from entering when the duty officer is busy answering the phone and/or dealing with an arriving visitor.

Look for additional information and possible rule changes in the next several issues of the Seashore News.

DECEMBER BOARD ACTIONS

1. Authorized management to proceed with implementing the following at Mariner gate. Cost not to exceed \$2000 without Board approval: 1). Activate key card reader for resident use. 2). Construct manual gate arm for use by duty officer to control visitor lane. 3). Add additional pavement markings leading to gate house to differentiate visitor and resident lanes.

- 2. Authorized management to reimburse homeowner for costs incurred to clear sewer line clogged by common area tree roots.
- 3. Authorized management to replace the gravity teeth system at Selva exit with a spring loaded system that is used at all other exit gates. Cost not to exceed \$1500 without Board approval.
- 4. Authorized management to extend the contract with AmSec International to March 31, 1994, at the current cost.

REQUIRED ROOFING SUBMITTAL TO THE ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

All roofing submittals for materials other than wood shingles/shakes must have either a brochure showing the color chip or an actual piece of the roofing material submitted. Be sure you obtain from the NSCA office the required form that must also be submitted.

Please refer to the Architectural Rules for additional guidance.

CHANGES IN STREET SWEEPING PROGRAM

Beginning this month, Wendt Landscaping will begin sweeping our streets. They have purchased a large, new machine that should do a very good job. If possible, you are requested to have vehicles off the street on these days.

The schedule will be the same as before, on the second Friday of each month. However, it may take two days instead of one. It has been agreed that for January, they will clean the community on the following schedule:

THURSDAY, JANUARY 13

Sea Terrace II, Villas, Shores Garden Homes, Custom Homes and Breakers Isle.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 14

Broadmoor, Berkus, Sea Terrace I, and Atlantic Garden Homes.

Please refer to future issues of the Seashore News for the schedule.

The Board and management feel this change in contractors will benefit the community. We should receive better quality of sweeping and at a lower overall cost. Unlike our last contract, the common area parking areas will be swept each month.

The office has received complaints from residents over the last year about the quality of sweeping. Residents should understand that the sweeper does not clean/remove dirt/mud. It picks up loose debris such as, paper, leaves, cans, bottles, etc. It is management's position that if the sweeper removes 80% to 90% of the loose material it has done a very good job.

It is management's hope and that of Wendt Landscaping that most homeowners will be pleased with the change.

STREET REPAIRS TO BE DONE IN JANUARY

In the December issue of the Seashore News, an article appeared informing residents that street repairs would occur. This project had to be put off until January.

As was stated last month, when the Community Center parking lot is scheduled for sealing, signs will be put up in advance notifying residents. We still expect the lot to be closed for two to three days.


