The Board thanks residents for their in-put at our last Board meeting Feb.13th. The policies of Recreation, Security, Landscape and Maintenance were discussed and approved with minor changes. These policies with C.C.&R., Architectural and Communications will be printed in the Seashore News in the near future.

The S.B.A. (Small Business Adminstration) has approved a Disaster Loan for \$55,600.00. The Board at this time ordered out \$35,000.00 at 3% interest per annum for our seven slope & drainage repairs. The new S.B.A. interest rate has just been raised to 7%. Acceptance of the S.B.A. loan was a wise business transaction, since this will keep our reserves intact for any future emergencies. The payment is \$1,066.00 monthly, payable over 5 years. This money has been placed in a special interest-bearing account. Our expenses so far are the following:

NEW BOOKKEEPER HIRED

Starting February 19th, Frances Hunter assumed the duties as bookkeeper for Niguel Shores. We are very happy to have Frances, whose bookkeeping background over the years has covered retail furniture, electronic manufacturing company and most recently, a large community developer. MEMBER INFORMATION DECLARATION

Each new resident will be given a package of documents consisting of CC&R excerpts and other rules and regulations for Niguel Shores which are identified in the Member Information Declaration. This new form will be completed by all property owners the next time they are issued security passes, and by all renters. It states the conditions of agreement regarding stickers and key cards which are the property of N.S.C.A. Property owners agree to turn in all key cards and stickers upon sale of house. A deposit of \$25.00 for each set of stickers and key cards will be collected through escrow. When the real property is sold the security for each set of stickers and key cards will be returned. The deposit will be forfeited if the set of stickers and key cards is not returned. When renting, owner must turn in all gate passes before renters may be issued passes, unless previously cleared by association. Owner is responsible for collecting gate passes from renters when they move. Prior to issuing any gate passes renters must provide a \$25.00 deposit for each set of stickers and key cards which is refunded upon return. We believe this new procedure will aid more people in knowing community rules, and will improve our security control.

NOTICE OF SHUT DOWN OF POOL FOR ANNUAL REPAIRS

It's that time of the year to make annual repairs to our swimming pool. In order to keep the pool open on the week-ends, we will do the necessary repairs on Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday in two consecutive weeks, March 5,6, & 7th. and 12,13, & 14th. The pool will be closed on those days so we can replace the water which builds up a high salt content from the liquid chlorination, and perform other minor repair as needed. Your cooperation during this time will be appreciated.


Accolades to the Mom's Club, its founder, Carol Sue Mullen, and its current chiefs, Bonnie Maxey and Patty McCreary!

The Landscape and Maintenance Committee is well aware of the many problems that exist, such as street signs, lamps and replanting. These things are receiving attention on a priority basis. The drainage corrections are progressing as well and as fast as possible.

Our last two pickups totalled slightly over 14 tons and brought in \$272.32 to our community. Just think - paper which heretofore was wasted by sending it to the disposal company, is now being

for the good of our nation, helping to conserve our natural resources, and at the same time, generating funds to be spent for the general good of our community. It would take 238 trees to produce the 14 tons of paper recycled by this community in the last 4 weeks.

Now our aluminum program is getting into high gear and the bin is filling up fast each month. Keep the aluminum coming. Some of our residents are soliciting their outside friends to save papers and aluminum for them - it's all for a good cause.

The Men's Club is starting a project, headed by Dale Baltimore, to repaint all of the street signs in our community. How's that for civic dedication?

Those residents who haven't been participating in our recycling program can become involved very easily. Simply save your newspapers and other similar material and stack them at your front curb on March 12 and 26, and our recycler will come past your home and pick them up. It's that simple! Don't tie them simply stack them loosely, with a weight on top.

Normal pickup days are the <u>2nd. and 4th. Monday of each month.</u> The truck comes into our community <u>normally</u> at <u>2 p.m. or after.</u>

Aluminum can be deposited, at your convenience, into the big aluminum bin at the Community Center - next to the large trash bin. If possible, please crush beverage cans before depositing as the bin will hold much more between pickups in that way. Some 7up cans and some Budweiser beer cans are tin - not aluminum. If you have a magnet in the house, try it on the Budweiser and 7up cans. If the cans are attracted, they are tin - not aluminum. Another way to tell is to leave a can outside for a day or two and if rust shows up you have tin instead of aluminum. Animal food cans are usually tin also, and not wanted by our recycler.




ACTIVITIES OF NIGUEL SHORES MEN'S CLUB
