FROM THE HELM

MARCH 1983

Occasionally, when your Board, Staff and dedicated Committee Members have received some unfavorable criticism, and it is time to write the column "From the Helm", the thought occurs - "The Helm with it". But too many good things have been and are being done and it is time to accentuate the positive. For instance:

- 1. The Small Business Administration Loan originated in 1979 in the amount of \$44000 was paid off in December 1982.
- 2. Many drainage problems have been successfully completed and others are in process. Note the improvements on Windlass, Brigantine, Windjammer, Magellan, Windward, Moonsail, Seaward Isle, Garibaldi and Amundsen Bay. Other areas will be worked in the near future, with the intent to eliminate all standing water in the Community.
- 3. Community lights are now being cleaned at four month intervals. You may check at the Office for the schedule in your area.
- 4. In the future, broken glass in our lights will be replaced by the unbreakable plastic, Lexan.
- 5. Neon lights will be tested to determine if their proper design will retain the beauty of our Carriage lights and therefore be acceptable to our Members. Note that we are still in need of some Member knowledgeable in lighting to be Chairman of our Ad Hoc Lighting Committee.
- 6. Walt Brugger and his Ad Hoc Swimming Pool Committee have found that the ground water level at the Pool is very close to the surface. It is hoped the level will decrease in the summer. If not, then pumps will be used to lower the level so that the Pool can be drained and repaired.
- 7. Location and design of a building for storage of newspapers and other items is a hot item. After two designs by Norm Pomeroy and one by Don Anderson, Norm's third may take the jackpot. This proposes a 12' X 28' by 3' high slumpstone building in the grassy area to right of sidewalk which is to the right of the present storage shed. The 28' dimension would parallel the sidewalk so that the open doors would not be objectionable from Niguel Shores Drive. Newspapers plus landscape devices and materials would be stored here. Another slumpstone building

behind and to 'ft of the existing trash closure is proposed for storage of ffice Files and Records.


- 8. The 1982 audit is in process by Taylor, Inouye and Co. under the supervision of our Finance Committee and particularly our Frank Taylor.
- 9. A new record player has been purchased for use in the Multi-Purpose Room as recommended by the Recreation Committee.
- 10. The Board expects to transfer our Checking Funds from Bank of Orange County to our local Monarch Bank, hopefully by April 1, 1983.

Other items will be discussed in future issues of the News. Meanwhile, the Board appreciates the effective work being done by all our staff - Office and Maintenance - Our Contractors and those dedicated Committee Members.

SECURITY - TOW AWAY & FINES: For those residents who feel this Association is not enforcing the Rules & Regulations, let me say that over the past months a number of "non-believers" cars were towed away at considerable expense to the violator.

Our Security Patrol is giving warnings and violations. Repeat violators are subject to Fines and/or Tow Aways. A WARNING TO THE WISE IS SUFFICIENT!!

ANIMAL CONTROL

RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors does hereby adopt certain sections of the Orange County Health, Sanitation and Animal Regulations, sumarized as follows:

Title 4, Division 1, Article 2, Sections 4-1-45, 4-1-48, 4-1-49, 4-1-50; Article 3, Section 4-1-60; Article 4, Sections 4-1-70, 4-1-71, 4-1-72:

- 1. All dogs shall be restrained by a fence, wall, substantial chain or leash not exceeding six feet.
- 2. No person shall keep any animal on his or her property which by sound or cry shall disturb the peace and comfort of his neighbors.
- 3. No person shall permit any animal under his control, care or custody to trespass upon any private property of another without the consent of such person.
- 4. No person having control, care or custody of any dog shall permit such dog to defecate or urinate upon a public sidewalk or parkway or on any County park or beach.
- 5. It is specifically provided in these Rules and Regulations, while not a part of the County Regulations, that no person having control, care or custody of a dog shall permit such dog to defecate upon any portion of the Common Areas or facilities of this Association. Should, however, defecation occur, all evidence of such shall immediately be removed by the person having control, care or custody of said dog.
- 6. All dogs shall be vaccinated against rabies.
- 7. All dogs four months of age or older shall be licensed, such license to be renewed per County requirements.
- 8. All dogs required to be licensed shall wear the current license tag.

9. Violations of these rules and regulations may result in a fine, as set forth in the Penalties, Fines and Fees Rules and Regulations.

SUGGESTED PROCEDURES FOR ANIMAL CONTROL

The Board of Directors has adopted certain portions of the Orange County Animal Regulations as a part of the Association Rules and Regulations, and has established a policy of fines for violations of these Rules and Regulations. However, the Association is not in a position to physically restrain or control animals, and the Board recommends the following steps to members who experience problems caused by uncontrolled animals:

- 1. If you observe dogs or other animals running loose in the Community, contact Orange County Animal Control, 634-7219, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. weekdays. After 5:00 p.m. and on weekends, for emergency situations only (i.e. vicious, dangerous, or injured animals), contact the Sheriff's Department, at 770-6011. The Sheriff's Dept. will not accept complaints regarding strays, barking dogs or other nuisance complaints.
- 2. Neither the Sheriff's Dept. nor Animal Control will pick up uncaged wild animals, such as skunks, opossums, etc.

 Skunk traps are available at the Association office for your use.
- 3. When notifying Animal Control, you must provide a complete description of the animal and location, and if known, the name and address of the owner of the animal.
- 4. Complaints regarding barking dogs, etc., should first be brought to the attention of the owner. If no cooperation is received, complaints may then be filed with the Animal Control Operations Officer. Complaints must be filed in person, at 561 City Drive, City of Orange (Garden Grove Freeway, City Drive exit across the street from The City shopping center). If, after investigation, the complaint is deemed valid, a warning is issued to the owner of the animal. If the situation is not resolved within a specified period of time, an action at law is filed by the County against the owner, and a court date is set.
 - The Animal Control department has advised us that the more people filing complaints against one specific individual and willing to appear in court as witness, and the more specific and detailed the complaints, the stronger the case. Before filing a complaint, contact your neighbors to see if they are willing to join in the complaint.

Also notify the Association office, in writing, of the complaint, so that a file may be kept on the offending party and, if necessary, fines may be levied for the violation in accordance with the Penalties, Fines and Feed Rules and Regulations.

RLCYCLING PROGRAM

The paper and aluminum recycling program for 1982 showed an improvement over 1981, both in volume recycled and in revenue received from sales.








Looking Ahead: The April meeting will be the installation of your new officers. Join us for a "Special" and maybe you'll be the lucky person to take home an attractive door prize.



"FIRST CENTURY MARK"


