CHANGE IN MEETING DATE

Beginning in March the Board will return to the previous meeting schedule of having one of its closed meetings on the same night as the open meeting. The next open meeting, therefore, will be at 8:00pm on Wednesday, March 20, 1985. Speaker will be Jim Smith, Vicepresident of the Stein-Brief Company, developers of Monarch Beach.

RULES

- At the open meeting on Bylaws February 13, four suggestions were made:
- 1. That section 702 be changed to require that directors must be members of the Association. This certainly seems reasonable but unfortunately the present wording (that non-members may become directors) is from the Articles of Incorporation, which are almost impossible to change and with which the Bylaws must agree. However, because of our procedure in electing directors the possibility of a non-member becoming a director is extremely remote.
- 2. That section 608 be changed to eliminate cumulative voting in the election of directors. Cumulative voting permits a member to have one vote for each directorship to be filled and to cast all of these votes for one candidate). Since this is a change in voting procedure we understand that it cannot be changed by the Board but instead requires a vote of the membership. The Board will investigate the possibility of combining such a vote with the coming election for directors.

- 3. That section 1301 be changed to include the word "papers" (which was in the previous wording) but to exclude papers which would result in an "invasion of privacy" or were of a "sensitive" nature. The Board will consider the points presented at the meeting before taking action on this section.
- 4. That section 605 be changed back to the previous wording which permitted the quorum of a "subsequent" election meeting to be 1/2 of the previous election meeting. The Board will consider this suggestion before voting.


HEADING SOUTH

The crafts Group will meet on March 14 and April 4 from 10:00 until 2:00.



3. Add Brown Sugar and cook to syrup (not too thick).


4. Add the liquors while bubbling and Flame.
