FROM THE HELM

I'D RATHER BE SAILING

At this time of year many of us enjoy cleaning and polishing our boats after the winter rains. Others enjoy working in their gardens or fixing up their homes. Still others take one more ski trip to the high country.

But for some of us in this particular year, Spring has proved to be a time for accelerated community activity.

For instance, the Laguna Niguel Community Council election will be held April 7-11 at the Laguna Niquel Chamber of Commerce office next to American Federal and the weekend of April 12-13 at the Monarch Bay Safeway. Candy Burroughs is safely reelected. but we should consider voting for our friend Ingrid McGuire who represents the Monarch Bay Terrace area, and we should watch for a write-in candidate from Niguel Shores. The Laguna Niguel Community Council has had an important voice in all land use decisions in Laguna Niguel and the Council will be heard again this spring.

On May 7 a meeting on the Laguna Niguel Community Service District (LN-CSD) proposal will be held by LAFCO. It is possible that Niguel Shores and many other Laguna Niguel associations will participate.

Three new members of the Niguel Shores Board of Directors will be elected at our Annual Meeting on Tuesday, May 20 at 8 p.m. Candidates names will be posted in the Seashore News next month.

Sometime in May we expect that the California Coastal Commission will hear a proposal by Stein-Brief Group to build a 300,000 square foot Commercial Center between the Monarch Bay golf course and the Safeway store. It is projected by the developer, at buildout, to provide traffic levels at Crown Valley Parkway and Pacific Coast Highway at a "C" level, which is the same as right now! The Coalition does not agree with this projection. As you know, Niguel Shores and a group of 21 other Homeowner Associations known as "Friends of the Community Coalition" are committed by Board action to reducing the total impact of this project at that Coastal Commission hearing. We do not oppose this project per se, but we do object to the developer's unrealistic projections and the extraordinary intensification in both size and impact from the original 85,000 square foot approval.

As you can see, many of us are busy these days and you can expect to hear more on all these subjects soon. Meanwhile, we solicit your attention, your comments, your votes when required, and your good wishes.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

The <u>control</u> of <u>vehicular access</u> into Niguel Shores is <u>the prime function</u> of <u>our contracted security service</u>. This Association annually spends considerable time, effort, and funds toward <u>maintaining your privacy</u>. As in any program such as this, the efforts and cooperation of the members and residents are necessary to its success.

Recently your security and I have noted actions by residents and members which are counter-productive. I would ask that each resident follow procedures set up by your Association for vehicle community access and identification.

REMINDERS

Owner <u>Yehicle</u> <u>Decals</u> must be displayed on the windshield of owner vehicles.

<u>Tenant</u> <u>Decals</u> must be displayed on the windshield of tenant vehicles.

<u>Guest Passes</u> and <u>Service Passes</u> must be current and displayed in the vehicle at all times while the vehicle is in the community.

<u>Yehicles</u> in <u>Yiolation</u> of the rules and regulations are <u>subject to tow-away</u> and/or their <u>owners being fined</u>.

<u>Key Cards</u> should not be used by anyone other than the resident/member to whom it was issued.

In addition to our contracted security, Drange County Sheriffs units enforce the California Vehicle Codes within Niguel Shores. At the request of the Association, their assistance within the community has recently increased. Safe and proper operation of your vehicle is important.

A word about the Niguel Shores <u>beach</u> <u>parking</u> lot. This facility is <u>open to</u> <u>resident/member vehicles displaying</u> <u>current. proper decals</u>, from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. There is <u>no guest</u> <u>parking</u>. As summer approaches this area will be used more regularly. Violators are again warned about "towaway and fine" remedies available to the Association.


