BOARD POSTPONES CC&R BALLOT VOTE

On Wednesday, March 24, the Board of Directors issued a letter to all homeowners advising that they have postponed the CC&R amendment ballot. This letter was mailed first class to all homeowners. Attached to this issue of the Seashore News is a copy of the letter in case you did not receive it.

BOARD ACTIONS

- 1. Accepted Les Olander's resignation from the Architectural Control Committee.
- 2. Accepted written bid for \$2500 from Converse Consultants to investigate common area slope at 33771 Brigantine Drive. Homeowner claims slope is moving and ruining his wall.
- 3. Authorized management to notify residents that they can receive discounts at Vista Paint, same as Dunn-Edwards (see enclosed article).
- 4. Accepted bid from Brongo Construction for \$7770 to prepare Tot Lot for installation of new equipment and to return after installation to lay new wood chips around equipment.
- 5. Accepted Nominating Committee's recommendations for 1993 Annual Election: Don Beaver, Warren (Jack) Broering, and George Williams (see enclosed resumes).

- 6. Authorized manager to attend two-day class to Long Beach State for computer network software. Cost of class \$195.
- 7. Authorized management to proceed with draining pool in May and refilling. Water has not been changed in five years. At time pool area is closed, pool deck will also be repaired.
- 8. Authorized Norm Pomeroy and Dorothy Foth to proceed with forming a committee to plan for refurbishment of the MPR.
- 9. Authorized Maintenance Committee to install one or two street signs on mushroom light poles as a test. Committee and Board to review after completion.

NEXT OPEN MEETING FOR COMMITTEE REPORTS WEDNESDAY, APRIL 21, 1993 8:00 PM On March 17 our paper recycler called me to report that he would no longer purchase miscellaneous paper. He will pick up our current load but it will be the last one as he and three other recyclers say there is no profit in it any longer.

Reluctantly, I have concluded that the time has come to discontinue our program and join with the City of Dana Point in recycling through the use of Solag Disposal Company and their blue bins recently distributed throughout the City.

Therefore, effective immediately, our storage shed for paper will be closed and used by our maintenance department for storage. We ask our residents to continue their recycling as requested by the City of Dana Point.

Our program was started in 1978 and has resulted in the salvage of more than 3,000 tons of paper which did not reach a landfill, and in addition provided this community with close to \$80,000 to use for the benefit of all residents. Many projects have been funded when the money was not available in the general budget.

We now have over \$11,000 in reserve which we are planning to use for further refurbishing of our community meeting room with joint funding by the Niguel Shores Board.

The recycle program has been a pet project of mine since 1978 and I regret the necessity to discontinue it at this time. Should the market for this type of material improve at some future date, it is possible that we could re-establish the program. The members of Niguel Shores Mens Club and I thank all of our past supporters and contributors for their efforts in making our recycle program a success.

K. Russell Paslaqua Former Project Manager At its March 10 meeting, the committee received a report on the location of horseshoes, croquet and badminton facilities. It was noted that these playing areas will not reduce any grass playing area. Information about checking out equipment for the activities will be available in the office as soon as the playing areas are ready.

Arrangements for a 1993 lecture series were discussed. It is hoped that two lectures can be presented, one on the impact of the North American Trade Treaty on our area and the other on birds in our community.

At the time this report was prepared, arrangements had been made with a contractor to remove the old equipment in the children's playground (Tot Lot) and to lower the surface in preparation for placing twelve inches of a wood chip material under the replacement equipment. It is expected that another contractor will install the new equipment which has already been purchased. If all goes well, the new equipment, including a new "Big Toy" will be in place and ready for use by the end of March.

The committee is trying to recruit new members. It meets monthly on the second Wednesday at 2 pm in the Rec Center Committee meeting room. Anyone interested in attending a meeting will be welcome.

STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

The scheduled date for street sweeping this month is Friday, April 9. This date is also indicated on the attached calendar. If at all possible, you are requested to have your vehicles off the street on this date to allow the street sweeper to do a thorough job.

BE SURE THAT YOUR TRASH CONTAIN-ERS ARE NOT VISIBLE FROM THE STREET AFTER YOU PUT THEM AWAY. As of March 8, management began sending violation letters to those homeowners who are violating the rules. Those who are flagrant about violations will also be referred to the City's Code Enforcement division.

Residents are subject to fines assessed by both the Association and the City for not putting away containers or putting them out too early.

Please cooperate so that this action is not necessary! Your Board of Directors and neighbors will appreciate it!!

HOMEOWNER PAINT/MATERIAL DISCOUNTS AVAILABLE

Some time ago, the Association notified homeowners that Dunn Edwards Paints was offering a discount on paint and sundries using a special account number obtained from the NSCA office. This is still in effect.

LANDSCAPE PROJECTS FOR APRIL

- 1. Several projects scheduled for March may have to be rescheduled for April.
- 2. Villas Remove acacia at end of Porto Fino and Porto Cristo, then replant with oleanders and ground cover. There will also be the addition of a color bed in the turf area at the corner of Via Del Cielo and Via Capri.
- 3. Garden Homes Color beds will be added in center island to Bluehill, Timor, Colima and Atlantic Avenue. These will match the other existing color beds throughout this area.



- 4. Custom Homes All shrubs along upslope of Magellan Isle will be cut down to grade. New low growing Myoporum Pacificum will be planted along with some "color" shrubs like Radiation Lantana. The Brazilian Peppers will be thinned out and cut into tree shapes.
- 5. Common Area All of the winter color will be removed and new impatiens planted.

The color that has been planted the last several times has not done well. A plant expert was brought in and his report stated that the soil was contaminated with several fungi. Wendt Landscaping has followed the expert's advice on eradication of the fungi. We all hope that this year's impatiens will look spectacular throughout the community.

1-6 pm Monday through Friday 10-12 and 1-6 Saturday and Sunday

All children between 6 and 14 years who wish to swim without adult supervision will be required to pass a swim test. The requirement for passing this test is completion of two laps and treading water for one full minute. A permission form must be filled out and returned to the lifeguard BEFORE a swim test will be given.

As a reminder, adult swim is from 7-9 am and 12-1 every day. Also, NO ONE under 18 years is allowed in or in the area of the jacuzzi.


MENS GOLF CLUB

Subj: Cancellation of CC&R Slope Amendment Balloting Process, Distributed February 26, 1993

Dear Homeowner:

At the Open Membership Forum portion of the Board of Directors meeting of March 17, 1993, held to discuss the proposed CC&R slope maintenance amendments, many homeowners attended to discuss their questions and concerns. It was generally felt that the balloting on the amendments should be postponed to allow for more time to discuss the issues and present the pros and cons to the membership.

In view of the many concerns expressed by the members present at the meeting, and others who have communicated with the Board before and after the meeting, and the expressed concerns of many members that they had not been given adequate notice of the Boards' intention before it approved the ballot for distribution to the membership; and, further, because the decision to distribute the ballot by the Board was not made at a meeting of the Board of Directors open to the general membership, the Board has determined that the better interests of the Association and the community will be served by canceling the balloting on the proposed amendments at this time to allow further time for consideration of this issue.

Therefore, the Board has voted to cancel the balloting on the proposed slope amendments and to thereby terminate the pending balloting process. Accordingly, no further ballots should be returned to the Association, as it will no longer be accepting ballots.
