THE GREAT RIP OFF

THE PROPOSED WATER RATE INCREASE COULD COST YOUR ASSOCIATION

\$18,000 A YEAR

The South Coast Water District is proposing rate increases which would have a mojor cost impact on your Association. Homeowner Bill Merrithew, who has broad knowledge in this area, has analyzed the proposed increase on behalf of the Board The Board of Directors and believes it is unfair and illogical. completely concurs with Bill's analysis.

Would you believe that most of the proposed increase the Association would have to pay IS NOT BASED ON WATER USAGE

but on a so-called "Capacity Charge"?

The Niguel Shores Community Association, under the proposed plan, would pay 50% of the ENTIRE rate increase of the Water District, or roughly \$18,000, which would mean a \$21 per year increase in each homeowners Association dues.

Your Board has met with members of the Board and staff of the Water District and they have promised to "review" their proposal and "get back to us".

If the efforts of your Board fail to resolve the situation, we will need your help! The date for final enactment of rates is now scheduled for the evening of May 12, 1976. The people of Niguel Shores represent 22% of the voters in the South Coast Water District and we may have to show up on May 12th as individuals and show our concern. Please keep the date open.

Your Board will keep you posted.

MUST BE REGISTERED

. SCUBA CLASS

This 30 hour scuba program is designed to give the ultimate in ocean orientation of scuba instruction. The beginning student learns the basic techniques of skin and scuba diving.

Upon completion of this course you will feel confident diving under normal diving conditions. You will receive a Basic Scuba Certification Card. Your certification card can be from the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI), National Association of Underwater Instructors (NAUI) or the Los Angeles County Underwater Unit.

Cost of the course is \$45.00 which includes six 3 hour pool lecture sessions, three ocean trips (5 dives) and the use

of the tank and regulator during pool sessions.

To take the course you should have your own mask, fins, and snorkel. If you don't have them, do not buy any equipment until after the first session when different types of equipment will be available to try out.




PET ROCK HEALTH CARE TIPS AND FIRST AID

- 1. Over-population is your responsibility. Don't let your pet rocks have unwanted pebbles. Know and understand mating habits of rocks.
- 2. Don't let moss grow on lee side. Give your rocks lots of rolling exercises. Remember that rolling stones gather no moss.
- 3. Rocks get seasick, too. Keep them out of boats and ships. It is good advice not to rock the boat.
- 4. Emergency service available 24 hours. Many areas have emergency clinics now operating at night and on weekends. Rocks now can be treated around the clock.
- 5. Rocks are sensitive! Do not allow them out in the sun, especially near the beaches. They are allergic to sand and to sand's side effects.
- 6. Calm rocks are healthy rocks. Rocks work better with background sounds so play plenty of rock music for them.
- 7. Keep rocks out of the streets. A firm hold on the leash will prevent rocky roads in your community.
- 8. Rocks should be kept at home. Wandering or flying rocks can cause problems with your neighbors-do not throw rocks at any time.
- 9. Be firm in your training. Train your rocks early to obey commands. Use the Gibraltar system. They respect strength.
- 10. Good mental health is good physical health. Rock n' roll exercises will keep the body firm and the skin clear. Sick rocks are no fun.
