The Selva Road incoming gate will remain closed until the Vemco Company receives the schematics to repair the gate. Repairs for the Stonehill gate have been contracted for.

### GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

The Association received a check for \$5892.52 from Avco Community Developers this past month for water service paid by the Association during the past several years that was outside our boundaries. The two meters were transferred by Avco to the Association back in 1974 by mistake. They watered the Laguna Niguel Realty office at Pacific Coast Highway and Shoreline and also the north side of Niguel Road by the library and Sea Terrace Apartments.

The new enforcement procedures and late charge policy has greatly reduced the amount of delinquent assessments. Interest at 10 per cent per annum is charged on balances over 30 days past due. After 90 days past due a lien is recorded which includes a \$25.00 flat charge to offset Association expenses. After 5 months past due the Association will proceed with foreclosure proceedings. These procedures have cut our delinquent assessment balances by one-half. The number of properties still liened to date is 16.

Recent Board action included authorization to install new speed bumps. Two will be located at Breakers Isle, one on Atlantic north of Niguel Shores Drive, and one on Garibaldi south of Gourami Bay. The Association has repaired the damage to the asphalt pathways caused during the repair of the slope failures. We will also install a protective seal-coating on all the pathways to prevent further decay & erosion. The pathways encompass over 25,000 square feet of surface area and are located throughout the paseos from Marlinspike to Windjammer.

We are currently receiving bids from civil engineers to prepare drawings for the design of a gutter crossing at the intersection of Gourami Bay and Garibaldi. This is necessary before a cement contractor can install a gutter crossing to take water from the Villas directly out to Selva Road, by-passing Gourami Bay along its route to the catch basin located on Selva Road near La Cresta. At present, the water is causing serious damage to the street and it's a nuisance to the property owners on Gourami Bay.


Soon there will be slumpstone walls at each corner of the bridge crossing at Pacific Coast Highway. The walls were recommended by our insurance broker for increased safety measures at that location. They will match the existing walls at each bridge corner.

Sometime in May the Association will be locking the gates into the tennis courts from the parking lot. This will mean that all members and their guests will be required to enter the tennis courts by first passing through the main entrance into the community center. This will enable the Association to better control the use of the courts in the future; something we have needed for a long time. A slumpstone wall and gate will be built to close off the side entry into the community center.

The Selva gate is closed for electrical repairs. We have brought in Vemco Company, who are the manufacturers of the swinging gate at Selva. They are waiting for a copy of the electrical schematic, which they had to order from Michigan, before they could make any repairs.

# METGRAPER AND ALDRENUE RECYCLING PROGRAM

For the month of May, newspaper pickup days will be the 14th. & 28th.

The calendar indicates that May 28 is Memorial Day. Nevertheless, papers will be picked-up that date.

During the past four weeks, our newspaper salavage amounted to 24,060 pounds, or slightly over 12 tons. This was just slightly above the previous four weeks. We are happy with what is being recycled, but still we have only about 40% of our residents participating. We see papers discarded into the trash containers on Tuesdays. Even small amounts are welcome, and if every resident saved only the Wednesday "throw-away" papers and their Pennysavers, combined for the area we would have a tremendous increase in tonnage. P-L-E-A-S-E- - - don't discard ANY of this type paper. Stash it in your garage until pickup days and then place it at your curb. You'll be glad you did - and so will we !!!

Occasionally our office receives a call from a resident that papers were not picked up, although neighbors in the area were serviced. Our recycler has told us that he is prohibited by his insurance from going onto private property to pickup the papers. If the papers are placed against your garage, or some similar place, away from the curb, he cannot take them.

Also, in the past, the recycler has often picked up in the evening, or even the following morning. This is sometimes due to equipment breakdown, or rain. Lately, the truck has been entering our area promptly at 2 P.M. and if papers are put out after that time, they could be too late. Try to make 2 P.M. your deadline.

We have again been reminded that telephone books are welcome, if the pages are removed from the binding. The recycling equipment cannot bendle the glued bindings.

Now for the good news: The most recent expenditure of funds from recycling is for new bridge tables for our Community Center. The bridge group has been slowly saving entrance fees to build up enough for the needed tables. The Men's Club authorized a contribution of \$100 toward this project, so, now there are six new tables available.

Dale Baltimore and his stalwart volunteer painters from the Men's Club have been painting the perimeter fences around the Community Center, and also the brown trim of the main Community Center building, thus sprucing up the looks of the entire area. Our thanks to Dale and his helpers. Thanks to YOU for the price of the paint.

We have a new aluminum bin in place now - much larger than the old one, and painted brown to match our decor. It is stencilled "ALUMINUM RECYCLING" for easy identification. The new bin will hold a lot more aluminum that the old one, so we will have to get busy and find more aluminum salvage to fill it. Our last pickup amounted to 130 pounds and brought in \$27.30 to the fund.

For those of you who like statistics - in 14 months our salvage amounted to 371,312 pounds, (over 185 tons). This equates to 3,156 fully matured trees saved from destruction. We received \$3,312,56 from the recycler. Aluminum totalled 652 pounds and brought in \$119.76. Bank interest brought the total to \$3,496.59 for the 14-month period.

On April 3rd., John Bulleit gave an excellent slide talk on the upper Nile area of Egypt. His personal insight of this ancient country was most interesting.


On April 10th., the annual golf tournament started at San Clemente with 28 of the 34 golfers competing. On April 24th. the site was Green River GC.

# SHORES' CUISINE

A busload of residents journeyed up to Lawry's on March 30, 1979, and had a thoroughly enjoyable day. We managed to obtain some of Lawry's recipes and thought we'd share some of these with the rest of the community via this column. Bon Appetit!



1 medium onion, chopped 2 tablespoons salad oil 1 can (1 lb. 12 oz.) tomatoes

# Chilaquiles

1 package (1% oz.) Lawry's Taco Seasoning

1/2 teaspoon Lawry's Seasoned Salt 1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chiles, optional package (6½ oz.) tortilla chips

1 pound Monterey Jack cheese, grated

1 cup dairy sour cream

1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese

To make sauce: Sauté onions in 2 tablespoons salad oil until tender. Add tomatoes, Taco Seasoning Mix, Seasoned Salt and green chiles. Simmer, uncovered, 10 to 15 minutes. In a buttered, deep, 2-quart casserole, arrange 1/2 of each of the following in layers: tortilla chips, sauce and Monterey Jack cheese. Repeat layers, top with sour cream. Bake in 325°F, oven for 30 minutes. Sprinkle with Cheddar cheese and bake 10 minutes longer. Let stand 15 minutes before cutting into squares. Makes 6 to 8 servings.



# Zucchini Vinaigrette

- 1 package (0.63 oz.) Lawry's Italian Salad Dressing Mix, prepared according to package directions using white wine vinegar.
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
- 2 green onions, finely chopped
- 5 or 6 medium zucchini, unpeeled, sliced in rounds about 1/4-inch thick

Combine salad dressing and chopped vegetables; blend well. Marinate zucchini in mixture overnight. Serve as relish side dish with greens or on an antipasto platter. Makes 8 to 10 servings.



# Mexican Lasagna

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 teaspoon Lawry's Seasoned Salt
- 1 package (11/4 oz.) Lawry's Taco Seasoning Mix
- 1 cup (8 oz.) diced canned tomatoes \*
- 2 cans (8 oz. each) tomato sauce
- 1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chiles
- 8 ounces ricotta cheese
- 2 eggs
- 9 corn tortillas
- 10 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, grated

Brown ground beef until crumbly; drain fat. Add Seasoned Salt, Taco Seasoning Mix, tomatoes, tomato sauce and chiles. Simmer, uncovered, 10 minutes. Combine ricotta cheese and eggs. In bottom of 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking dish, spread 1/2 of meat mixture, top with 1/2 of tortillas, spread 1/2 ricotta cheese and egg mixture over tortillas and top with 1/2 grated Jack cheese. Repeat layers once more, ending with grated cheese. Bake in 350°F, oven for 20 to 30 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before cutting into squares. Makes 8 servings.

\*Use whole tomatoes and dice
