Dear Members,

Some brief comments about ongoing projects of the Board and/or staff are as follows:

- The Association's banking and billing system (changeover) has been completed. By now, all members will have received their quarterly billing. The Board is continuing its efforts to obtain information and input concerning the <u>South Coast Water District Water Reclamation Project</u> and the feasibility of Niguel Shores using such reclaimed water for irrigation purposes. The membership can look forward to more information about this project in the near future.

RECYCLING PROGRAM

On March 23, John Leensvaart, owner of D&J Recyclers, telephoned me that he would not be able to pick up our papers door-to-door any longer. March 23 would be his last pickup. He explained that he was losing money on this type of recycling program and that he was cancelling all his similar arrangements at other locations as well.

During the past month, all of the other recyclers in Orange County have been contacted and no other firm is interested in picking up papers house-to-house. The only kind of program available is one where papers are concentrated at a central location and the recycler picks up the papers when sufficient weight has been collected to make a pickup profitable for the recycler.

We in the Men's Club are anxious to continue with this very patriotic project, and our Niguel Shores Community Association Board agrees that we should continue to salvage our paper, if at all possible.

Therefore, we have made arrangements to try out a new plan submitted by Dalton Enterprises of Yorba Linda. Mr. John Dalton, the owner, has offered to supply a new storage shed, 12'x12' in size, that will hold approximately 8 tons of paper materials. It will be located, on a 6-month trial basis, on the parking area adjacent to the service area of the Community Center, between the entrance to the maintenance section of the building and the present trash container. This is the place where we now have the aluminum salvage bin. (Of course, the aluminum salvage program will continue, but the bin will be moved to another location.)

The storage shed will be made of metal, complete with metal roof, painted to blend with our own decor, and with large double doors which can be locked at night to prevent pilfering, etc.

Our residents who participate in the paper salvage program will be asked to bring their paper to the Community Center any time between 9AM and 9PM any day of the month and stack them in the storage shed. When the shed is full of paper, Mr. Dalton will pick up the paper, weigh it and pay us at the rate of \$20 per ton. The beauty of this program is that you may again save your magazines, brochures, junk mail, telephone books, etc., thus increasing our weight and salvaging all that beautiful paper which has recently been going to the trash people.

The paper MUST BE CONTAINED. As in the past, you may use large grocery bags, cartons, or you may tie the paper with cord, but no loose paper will be accepted.

Some of our participants have already indicated that they will welcome this program because the paper can be transferred out of their garage and into a storage area at more frequent intervals, thus freeing up space previously occupied by stacked paper for as much as three weeks or more.

Please cont ue to collect and store you paper salvage for another couple of weeks, or until we notify you by signs at the entrance gates that the new program is ready. The storage shed will be furnished and delivered to us, hopefully, within the next ten days.

Thanks again to all you participants who have enthusiastically saved your paper in the past, and we hope you will continue with the program on the new plan.

New Key Cards: After completing the installation of the new Shores gate equipment and after allowing some time to work out some operational problems with the equipment, it now appears that the next phase of the security project can be implemented. 



POOL RULES

With the warm weather approaching, the Community swimming pool will become a regular visiting place for many residents. We would like to refresh your memory of the pool rules as follows. Remember, these rules apply to adults as well as children.

- 1. All persons using pool must sign in at the Community Center entrance.
- 2. Showers must be taken before entering pool.
- 3. All persons must obey rules and lifeguards!
- 4. Distracting attention of lifeguard is prohibited.
- 5. Children 12 years and under must be accompanied by an adult when no lifeguard is on duty.
- 6. Floating apparatus, glass and other objects prohibited.
- 7. Persons with any illness or sores not permitted in pool.
- 8. Absolutely no running on decks.
- 9. Horseplay and dangerous practices prohibited.
- 10. Food and chewing gum not permitted in pool area.
- 11. Swimmers must wear normal swimming attire. No "cut-offs."
- 12. Any person with hair that touches shoulders when wet must be tied back or in a bathing cap.



LIFEGUARDS

The lifeguards on duty during the Easter week are tentatively scheduled to be with us starting June 13 for the summer months. Considerable effort has been made to hire properly credentialled, business-like young people who can maintain control of the pool and supervise the use thereof in such a way as to permit all members and their guests to enjoy use of this facility. With the return of good weather and the increased use of the swimming pool and Community Center facilities, a closer control on those using the center will be maintained. The sign-in procedure will be more strictly enforced. Members are reminded to SIGN IN PROPERLY. This will help the staff and make the operation of the center more effective.

RED CROSS 'SWIM & STAY FIT" PROGRAM

"Swim and Stay Fit" is a planned activity to encourage individuals to swim regularly until a goal of 50 or more miles is reached. The swimmer progresses at his/her own pace. It should be made clear that this activity is not a race, marathon or endurance contest and is non-competitive.

The program is designed to encourage regular swimming and to improve the physical fitness of the swimmer. Any person possessing reasonable swimming ability is eligible to enroll and participate in this program.

Each mile must be recorded with the Recreation Director, Kim Gabrielson, at the end of its completion.

70 Laps=1 Mile

35 Laps=½ Mile

18 Laps= Mile

FEE: Free

REGISTRATION: Starts May 13. You may join at any time.

AGE LIMIT: None.

SWIM TEST

To be able to swim this summer, <u>if you are 12 years or under</u>, without being accompanied by an adult, you must pass the swimming test.

The swimming test will consist of:

- 1. Completing laps
- 2. Treading water for one minute
- 3. Oral quiz on the Pool Rules

Test Dates:

May 30....Saturday.....10:30AM-12:30PM June 3....Wednesday.....2-4PM June 13...Saturday.....12-2PM June 15....Monday......10AM-12PM July 1....Wednesday....3-4PM

These dates are the $\underline{\text{ONLY}}$ dates that the swimming test will be given. If you cannot make one of these dates, you $\underline{\text{MUST HAVE}}$ AN ADULT WITH YOU WHEN YOU COME TO SWIM.

Summer Junior Tennis

The summer Junior Tennis program will consist of three classes: Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced. They will run on a four-week schedule one hour a week with a fifth make-up, or review lesson, for \$20.

In the Beginning Clinic, the students will learn the basic game of tennis--starting with ground strokes, volleys, serves and overhead smashes. They will learn scoring and other court rules and regulations. The recommended ages for Beginning Tennis are 8 to 10 years.

The Intermediate Student will learn more of the same things as the Beginning Student, but will concentrate on correcting his weaknesses and on building his strengths through drills and * practice plays. It will move more towards correcting individual problem strokes. They will learn tie-breakers and move into some strategy of the game. Recommended ages are between 11-14.

Advanced classes will be based around practice drills, working on weaknesses and extensive winning strategy techniques. The advanced classes will work more on polishing the finer points of tennis. Recommended ages are 15-16 years. Ability is always most important, age is secondary.

Jr. Clinics will start Tuesday, June 23.

LADIES DAY TENNIS

New starting time-9AM

LDT continues to have fantastic turnouts but it still needs YOU there! Think these tennis clinics a lot of the gals are taking have raised everyone's game a level or two. Hang in there!!

Great seeing Marlene Smith and Hilary McGrath back on the courts again.

I've been asked for a clarification of the scoring rule when you are in a "tie" situation. It is as follows:

"Tie game of 3-3 is decided by final service going to player agreed on by opposing receivers. You do not have to alternate receivers of the final serve unless you want to."

This should be decided before you ever start to play. What court will you play--forehand or backhand? Who will lead off serving--forehand or backhand? (If the partner playing backhand starts off like a house afire--let her lead-off serving. Once established, the order of service must remain the same throughout the set.) Along these same lines, it seems ridiculous to fight your way to a tie game and then throw it away by having a weaker or more inconsistent player blow the whole thing. Is that selfish? No. When a weaker player continually loses a game for her partner, she's put under terrible pressure when thrust into that situation. Let's build confidence, not sap it. 





2 lbs. (2pts.) Ricotta Cheese
3 eggs, lightly beaten
3/4 cup sugar
1 pkg. (1 lb.,2.5oz.) cake mix with pudding*
Powdered sugar or jam (optional)

1AY 1981

Mix together first three ingredients. Prepare cake mix according to package directions and pour into a greased and floured 9"x13" pan. Carefully spoon Ricotta cheese mixture over batter. Bake 60 to 65 minutes at 350°. Cool on rack. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and jam, if desired. Cut into squares.

*Yellow or lemon-flavored cake mix with pudding works best with this recipe as you get the effect of a Ricotta layer on the bottom. Chocolate cake mix with pudding does not give the layer MAY &1 effect, but tastes very good.
