FROM THE HELM

THE RIGHTS OF SPRING

Your attention is directed to the Voice of the People section of today's Seashore News. There you will find a rather passionate letter written by seven friends of mine who feel that the "democratic electoral process" and a "democratic administration" are somenow missing from the current Board's action. I suggest you read their letter carefully for what it does not say, as well as for what it does say.

For instance, the letter does not say that members have the right of petition for their own candidates. plus the right to name other candidates at the Annual Meeting, itself. Further, our By Laws REQUIRE that the Nominating Committee "shall make as nominations for election to the Board of Directors as it shall in its discretion determine, but not <u>less</u> than the number of vacancies that are to be filled. Such nominations may be made from among Members or non-members." This year the Board agreed with the Nominating Committee recommendation to put forward names of members to fill the three vacancies. fourth interested candidate is now a renter. and for that reason was not nominated.

To be frank, it has become extremely difficult to find candidates for the Board who are cualified. have interest in the job. and can give the amount of time necessary to serve in a demanding and time-consuming position. I suggest that those individuals who signed this letter now step forward and either announce their own candidacy or out forward the name of other candidates as the By Laws provide. Such responsible action would indeed generate considerable interest in our continuing democratic process in Niguel Shores and might even help us achieve a cuorum at our Annual Meeting. Achievement of such a quorum, as each of the writers of the letter knows full well from personal experience, is often difficult to obtain as it has been difficult this year to find qualified candidates for the Board of Directors.

We hope to see <u>all</u> of you at the Annual Meeting on Tuesday. May 20, ready to support the candidate of your choice after helping us achieve a duorum consisting of 50% of our membership, as required by our By Laws.

CREDIT WHERE DUE

This is my last report since it's time for a new cast of characters to take over affairs of the Niguel Shores Board of Directors. I would like to leave you with a special note of appreciation to Norm Pomeroy, Bill Henderson, Frank Taylor, and Ralph Bartolme who have shared with me the pleasures and penalties of office.

Although we have debated issues, sometimes notly, decisions were arrived at by democratic process after thorough discussion. We took our responsibilities seriously and stood together once a hard decision was reached, however popular or unpopular. I respect each gentleman and thank him for his work.

My thanks also to each of our energetic committees who have been exceptionally helpful to this Board.

Dick Smiley continues to provice the energy we need to lead a good staff, to improve routine work, and to jump into action when required.

Niguel Shores has major problems to be met in coming months. Without cuestion, the new Board will continue to manage our community affairs with care and integrity, no matter who is elected.

Awarded revised street sweeping contract to Orange Sweeping Service to sweep the streets three times in a two-month period.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

In the interest of returning the Niguel Shores Community Association to a democratic electoral process. protest the policy of expediency accoted by the NSCA Board in 1985 and Counter to the Rules Regulations. they instructed the Nominating Committee to secure one candidate for each vacancy on Board. The names of these candidates. thus selected. were presented to the Board for confirmation, and their names orinted on the ballots you will receive. This reduces the votino procedure on May 20 to rubber stamping the Board-confirmed slate candidates.

Not intending any unfavorable inference toward those who have graciously agreed to be candidates, we nevertheless are deeply concerned that this policy may in the future seriously impair the democratic administration of the Association. The Board will be able to pick those candidates who will continue their policies on issues.

We suggest that as many of you as can, withold voting by proxy, then come to the Annual Meeting on May 20, 1985, and vote your ballots based on the candidates already selected and possible other candidates. We believe that any candidates would appreciate being elected on their merits rather than by default.

WARM WEATHER WATERING

As the warm season approaches, our need for watering the landscape grows. Niguel Shores uses reclaimed water for its common area landscape. Rules governing the use of reclaimed water state that systems should not be run during daylight hours unless someone is present to monitor them. Of course we will be doing this as we need to check and repair daily. However, if you should see any common area irrigation running and there appears to be no workman in the area, please report it to the office immediately.

Timers will be set to water lawns daily when necessary. Our shrub areas and slopes will seldom, if ever, need daily water. A large number of our irrigation timers have "dual programs" allowing for a different schedule for areas having different needs. Do not be overly concerned if you notice your lawn was watered and the flower becs are dry. Shrub and slope systems should usually run no more than two or three times per week at most, sometimes weekly or less.

WOMENS GOLF ASSOCIATION



<u>COMMITTEES AT WORK</u>

An Association of homeoowners such as ours must, of necessity, depend on the extensive use of committees to ennance the quality of life available to its members and their families. One such committee is the Communication Committee, which has the responsibility of putting out the monthly issue of the Seashore News. The Committee . establishes the deadline for articles one month ahead of time. Usually that date is the 19th or 20th of the month. On the day following the deadline, the Committee pathers for its main monthly meeting. After dispensing with a few points of business, the members read each article submitteo. All articles are reviewed by all five members. Any changes in grammar or context are agreed to by all, while the author's intent is judiciously protected. Members of the Committee are Edie Newton, Marge Randall, Jackie Maier, Mickey McLaughlin, Dorothy Ann Terry Scott, and Dick McLaughlin, MacNair, Chairman.

The job doesn't end with the article review meeting. Approved articles are given to our new Administrative Secretary, Kim Tate, who uses the word processor to type the stories. Two members of the Committee then proof read all copy before it is "pasted up", a process of placing the articles with illustrations on each page. We gratefully accept the help of Dick Smiley at this point, as he has had considerable experience in that process.

Thirteen hundred copies are then run, 963 for the homes in our community, 300 for mail-out to absentee owners, and the remainder for over-the-counter handouts.

Collating and delivery of the paper are the final steps. Jack Horne is in charge of the collating phase. He enlists about 12 to 15 volunteers, usually at 11:00 am on the last cay of the month. These volunteers hand

collate and staple the pages in about an hour. Jack then turns the copies over to Joe Lewis, who sorts out 10 different sacks and takes them to the area coordinators, who, in turn, deliver them to block chairpersons for distribution to the homes.

The whole effort is really a model of cooperative action. We salute all who are a part of it.

Other major committees will be featured in coming issues of the Seashore News.
