CITY COUNCIL CANDIDATES HERE ON MAY 19

Niguel Shores has invited all candidates for City Council to appear twice on Tuesday, May 19. Each has promised to attend.

All six candidates will be featured speakers at the regular Mens Club breakfast in the morning.

At 8 pm that evening, as part of our Niguel Shores Annual Meeting (while votes are being counted for our own Board of Directors), each candidate for Dana Point City Council will speak in turn.

Incumbents Judy Curreri and Bill Bamattre are running for another term and they are being opposed by Ernie Nelson, William L. Ossenmacher, John D. Bowler, and Christopher L. Booker. Mr. Booker lives on Gourami Bay in Niguel Shores. Each candidate has been asked to speak for three minutes, although there may be a time for a question and answer period, depending on priorities of our Annual Meeting.

Please meet the City Council candidates as part of our Annual Meeting, 8 pm, Tuesday, May 19. Their appearance is a non-partisan public service provided to the community by the Board of Directors of Niguel Shores.

In all probability one or more individuals with such inclinations enters our "guarded" community each day to seek out an opportunity.

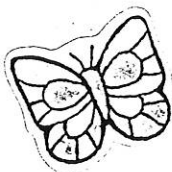
What is truly dangerous are the owners and renters within the Shores who are uncaring or unconcerned.

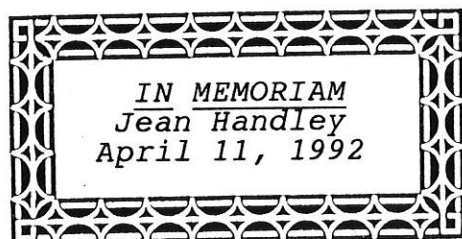

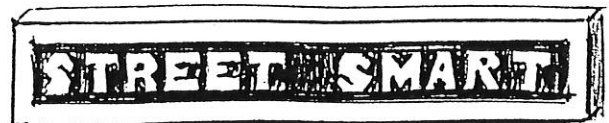

(05-01-92)*2301 Accounts Unpaid for 30 Days (04-01-92)*

Members whose accounts have a balance outstanding of 30 days or more are assessed a late charge of 10% or \$10.00, whichever is greater, plus interest figured at 10% per year. Reminder billings are sent by computer service.

2302 Accounts Unpaid for 60 Days (10-05-88)

Members whose accounts are 60 days delinquent are noticed by registered mail that if payment in full is not received within 15 days, a lien will be filed against the property.

2303 Accounts Unpaid for 75 Days (10-05-88)

Members with delinquent accounts of 75 days are lienied. Members are assessed a charge for lien filing and administrative costs (minimum charge \$50.00).

2304 Accounts Unpaid for 90 Days (10-05-88)

Members whose accounts are 90 days delinquent are referred to the Board of Directors for suspension of Association voting rights and use of common area/facility privileges, (including participation in committees, clubs and organized community events) which includes use by the member, his guests and tenants, pursuant to suspension procedures.





2305 Accounts Unpaid for 90 Days (10-05-88)

Members whose accounts are 90 days delinquent are sent to the Association's attorney for collection action, which includes filing a Notice of Default. Members are assessed a minimum fee of \$350.00 for attorney fees.

2306 Accounts Unpaid for 120 Days (02-01-85)

Failure to cure a delinquency of more than 120 days may result in foreclosure proceedings against the property.
