- 1. A contract to Viejo Sweeping Service for six street sweeps at \$630.00 per sweep.
- 2. Remodeling of multipurpose room kitchen--new commercial stove, hood and installation at a cost of \$4,000 which had been budgeted.
- 3. The Recreation Committee has donated \$600.00 from the Wine and Cheese-Art Faire Party.
- 4. The Men's Club has authorized the put hase of a stainless steel commercial type refrigerator, heavy duty garbage disposal and stainless steel sink from proceeds of paper drive. Thanks again for the support of this project which has been sorely needed.

5. A contract to Dick Wendt Landscape Service: Installation of pre-cut concrete vault with heavy duty steel grate, and electric pumps with automatic float switch, 1½" exit line connected to existing 3" line running down to vault in greenbelt at the end of Windjammer. Approximately 30' of trench drain to be installed collecting water to flow into vault. Cost \$2,360.00. This will help to eliminate the water on Halyard.

ALUMINUM WIRING


In case you missed it, ABC's T.V.Show, "20/20" had a report on aluminum wiring during the month of April. Aluminum wiring was used in more than two million homes built between 1965-73, including homes in Niguel Shores:

House wiring is attached to switches, outlets and fixtures by steel termination screws. The difference between

copper and aluminum wiring is that aluminum and steel have a greater difference in expansion rates than do copper and steel. As aluminum oxidizes when heated, a gap is eventually created between the wiring and termination screw, and the current must arc to make the connection. This is what causes the heat you may feel on the switch or outlet plate when it is in use. Homes with aluminum wiring carry a 50% greater chance of fire than those with copper wiring.

Correction is made by clipping back the aluminum wire and splicing in a piece of copper wire to be attached to the termination screw. The splice is attached by a pigtailing device all electricians have. Non-professionals are urged not to try to effect these repairs themselves; and improper splice is dangerous.

ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE INFORMATION

The Animal Control Division of Orange County has the authority to issue misdemeanor citations and to request a complaint by the District Attorney for violation of ordinances related to animal care and control. These laws have been implemented to protect animals and the rights of citizens. The following are summaries of some of these animal ordinances:

RESTRAINT OF DOGS (Section 4-1-45) - Dogs must be restrained on private property by a wall or fence, or by a leash not exceeding six feet in length, or be under the direct control of a competent person. No dog shall be on public property without a leash unless written permission is given by the owner or operator of the public property.

NUISANCE (Section 4-1-48) Owners are required to keep their animals from making any excessive noise which would be disturbing to their neighbors.

<u>DOG LICENSE REQUIRED</u> (Section 4-1-70) All dogs four (4) months of age or older are required to have a valid dog license.

WEARING OF DOG LICENSE TAG REQUIRED (Section 4-1-71) All dogs required to be licensed must wear the dog license tag except when confined on the owners' premises.

SECURITY LIES

If you are having difficulty reaching the Security Guard by phone during the hours of 4 P.M. and 7 P.M., please remember that this is the peak rush hour of incoming traffic. Residents calling in guests should make their calls to the guard before 4 P.M. or after 7 P.M. The Security Guards primary duty during this period of time will be to handle traffic entering the gate so PLAN AHEAD.

Once again we remind you to \dim your lights when approaching the guard station and by all means SLOW DOWN.

We are still having instances where residents and/or guests have been considerably less than courteous to the gate guards. If anyone has a complaint concerning the rules or the guard, that complaint should be directed to the General Manager. There so excuse for crudeness or vulgarity towards a guard who is attempting to carry our the rules given him by the community!!!

The pickup of April 28 was understandably small because we had rain that day and many of our residents prudently held their papers up for the next pickup.

Aluminum collecting for April amounted to 189 pounds at \$.305 per pound, or \$57.65.

The Men's Club has authorized the expenditure of up to \$1,500 to assist our Niguel Shores Association with improvement of our kitchen facilities at the Community Center. This amount is to be used to purchase a stainless steel commercial type refrigerator, with a lock, replacing the residential type refrigerator now in use.

In addition, they have authorized additional funds to install a new stainless steel restaurant type sink, and a new garbage disposal.

Originally there was \$4000 placed in the 1980 budget for this kitchen work but it turned out to be insufficient for a first class job. Hence, the Men's Club came to the rescue with funds from our paper recycling project, and the whole community again benefits from this wonderful program. In addition, there was \$600.00 available from profits made on previous recreation programs such as the "Art Faire-Wine and Cheese Party" last year.

The work on the kitchen will include the installation of a large commercial type stove with two ovens and a large griddle in addition to four gas burners and a stainless steel hood and exhaust fan.

The Men's Club also authorized the expenditure of \$100 to assist the Mom's Club with the purchase of a 16 mm movie projector which recently became available, almost new, at a bargain price of \$400.00. The original cost was almost \$900.00 and the projector is still under warranty period. This will certainly help with the recreation of our youth groups, as well as various other clubs.

From the above report, those of you who have been contributing your papers faithfully each month can see some of the results of your good works. Others who have not been involved so far may see the wisdom of joining us in this patriotic effort to recycle paper and aluminum materials.
