COMMUNITY CENTER RULES AND LIFEGUARD SCHEDULE

Summer is here again and the community center will again buzzing with activity. As a minder, here are a few rules refor using the community center and the lifequard schedule:

COMMUNITY CENTER

All persons using the facilities MUST sign in.

No pets allowed.

SWIMMING POOL

No one under 14 years of age allowed in pool area without parent or lifequard supervision.

Adult swim only from 12pm to 1pm daily. No children allowed in pool

area during this time.

Shower before entering the pool. Hair at or below shoulder length must be banded.

No food or gum in pool area.

No glass containers in pool

No floating apparatus or objects of any kind are permitted in pool. Swim suits must be worn in pool.

JACUZZI

No one under 18 years of age allowed in the jacuzzi area. NO EXCEPTIONS.

Shower before entering jacuzzi.

No smoking in jacuzzi area.

No food or beverages in jacuzzi area.

LIFEGUARD SCHEDULE

Lifeguard services will begin June 19 and continue through September 9. The hours are from 1pm to 6 pm Monday through Friday, and 10 am to 7 pm Saturday and Sunday. There is no lifeguard on duty from 12 pm to 1 pm daily.

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE PROJECT STATUS

Because our General Manager was from the association several weeks in April, the article on the May projects did not get written. May had the most projects to complete:

- Berkus. Remove old turf and add new plantings along west side of Niguel Shores Drive, from Dosinia to Cockleshell.
- Broadmoor. Do new design and add plants on Niguel Shores Drive from Windjammer to Windlass so that it compliments additions on Berkus side. Strip west bank on Lateen and replant to match east side of Lateen.
- Sea Terrace I. 3. Remove old plants and add new plants on Niguel Shores Drive from Capstan to Leeward to compliment additions on Berkus side.
- Sea Terrace II. Remove two alders on walkway to Manta Park and replace with two new trees that are suitable for location.
- Common Area. Install impatiens throughout community.

June, the following During projects are planned:

- Custom Homes Breakers upslope. Remove two large stands of acacia and replant areas with and add 25 Brazilian Myoporum pepper trees.
- 2. Shores Garden Lower Nauticus slope. Add 55 1-gallon plants.
- Villas. Add 25 lantana to Garibaldi side of entry.
- Beach Lot. Begin clean-out of lower beach lot and install new plants.

The Landscape Committee is about to begin preparation of the 1993 budget. If you have an area of concern that your area representative should look at and consider, please fill out a Homeowner Request Form or send a letter to the office and they will forward to your representative.
