

REYISED NSCA RULES

Attached to this month's Seashore News is a copy of the revised NSCA Rules Series 9301 pertaining to Records Access/Rewards. The revised Series 9301 replaces the previous Series 9301, 9302 and 9303. Please replace your old page with this new revision in your copy of the Rules and Regulations for your reference.

SERVICE PASSES

Service passes will change color effective July 1. The new service passes will be white. The current, pink service passes will remain valid until July 11 to enable all residents employing service personnel to obtain new passes at their convenience.

ADULT SWIM

The swimming pool is reserved for adults only swimming from 7 am to 9 am as the "Early Bird Swim". An additional adult swim period is scheduled for 12:30 pm to 1:30 pm.

COMMUNITY CENTER HOURS

Summer hours are now in effect at the Community Center. The facilities are open from 9 am to $10 \, \mathrm{pm}$.

CSD PROPOSAL

On June 4 LAFCO (Local Agency Formation Commission) met to decide on the boundaries of the proposed Laguna Niguel Community Service District. The Supervisors had suggested that all of County Services Area 3 (Ocean Highway 5) be included plus the communities of Monarch Bay, Ridge and Dana Woods. These three communities had asked to be excluded from the proposed district as had 30% of the voters in the southern half of CSA 3. This southern proup indicated in a petition (signed by 2180 voters -- 759 from Niguel Shores) that they would prefer to be in a separate South Laguna Niguel Community Services District.

At the June meeting the Commission ignored the exclusion request of the residents in the southern part of CSA 3, but did agree to exclude the three communities which were not part of CSA 3.

The November ballot proposal will, therefore, apparently ask whether or not the whole of CSA 3 shall become a community services district.

SPECIAL TREE PROJECT

The Board of Directors has modified and approved a plan recommended by the Landscape Committee for special treatment of the eucalyptus trees along Atlantic and Ports O' Call. Some of the trees will be cut very low (three to five feet above ground level) order to encourage multiple branching patterns. As they grow back, they will trimmed so that they can attractive, and yet easily maintained a height compatible with ocean It is felt that this drastic treatment will enhance the above as the trees will no longer look like "poles" after trimming. This same treatment was given to several eucalyptus near the tennis courts and they are now attractive trees year-round.




SUNDAY TENNIS SOCIAL

BEACH ACTIVITIES







SWIM TEST

IF YOU ARE TWELVE (12) YEARS OF AGE OR YOUNGER, AND WISH TO SWIM THIS SUMMER WITHOUT BEING ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT, YOU MUST PASS THE SWIMMING TEST.

THE SWIMMING TEST WILL REQUIRE:

- 1: COMPLETE TWO LAPS WITHOUT STOPPING.
- 2: TREAD WATER FOR ONE MINUTE.
- 3: ORAL QUIZ ON POOL RULES.

PROCEDURES FOR TAKING THE SWIM TEST:

- 1. Get test form from the office.
- 2. Give form to Life Guard and take the performance test.
- Have parent(s) sign the form.
- 4. Return the form to the office for their Swimming Card.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Children 5 years and under must be accompanied by an adult at all times.
- Children 6 to 12 years of age must pass a swim test to swim alone or else be accompanied by an adult (18 years or older).

PRIVATE LESSONS: - 5 Months to 3 years

GUPPIES: - ages 3 to 4 years

Children afraid to put their face in the water, and those who do not know how to swim comprise this group. We will teach these youngsters to float on their front and back, how to rest in deep water, to be water safe (the ability to get themselves to the edge of the pool if they fall in) and to demonstrate the basic elements of the back, and crawl strokes.

PRE-BEGINNERS: - ages 4 to 7

For children who are not afraid to put their face in the water. These youngsters may have had some prior swimming instruction. We will teach them to swim in deep water, and will emphasize front and back floating with kick and gliding, entry into deep water, survival floating in deep water, and the crawl stroke.

BEGINNERS: - ages 5 to 7

For children who can satisfactorily swim the crawl stroke (free style), can float on front and back and can swim in deep water. We will teach these children to rhythm breath while swimming with the crawl stroke, introduce the back stroke, diving, and preparation for advanced beginners.

ADVANCED BEGINNERS: - ages 7 and up

This class is for children who have a good free style (crawl stroke) with breathing. In this class we will teach the student to dive, improve breathing, and improve the mechanics of the strokes taught in previous levels. Emphasis will be placed on water safety with some introduction to elementary lifesaving, treading water, bobbing, and survival floating.

INTERMEDIATES: - ages 10 and up

Swimmers must be able to swim a near perfect free style (crawl stroke) with rhythm breathing for 25 yards. In this class the child will improve on their back, side, and will be introduced to the breast and butterfly strokes. An emphasis will be placed on building endurance in the water.

SWIMMERS: - ages 12 and up

The swimmer must be able to perform the free style, back, side, elementary back, and breast strokes in acceptable form. This class will emphasize further improvement in the mechanics of these strokes, the butterfly stroke, and the building of endurance in swimming. The students will be introduced to basic lifesaving procedures as well.

JUNIOR LIFESAVING: - Students must be 16 years of age, and an excellent swimmer in all strokes to pass the course.

Youngsters 14 and up are encouraged to take the course which will introduce them to the skills necessary to become a Junior Lifeguard, and understand the necessary skills involved in lifesaving.

9301 Inspection of Records (6-5-86)

- (a) Subject to the provisions of the California Corporations Code, section 8330 et sec., the accounting books and records and minutes of proceedings of the Members and the Board and committees of the Board shall be open to inspection upon the written demand on the Association of any Member at any reasonable time, for a purpose reasonably related to such person's interest as a Member.
- (b) Other documents, records and papers of the Association may be inspected upon the written request of any member of the Association and with the prior approval of the Board of Directors. Such approval shall be at the sole discretion of the Board of Directors and upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Directors deems to be in the best interests of the Association.

9401 Reward Fund (2-1-85)

A fund shall be established from which rewards will be paid to those persons providing information (1) leading to the arrest of anyone who is later convicted of vandalizing and/or willful destruction or damage of any Association property or (2) leading to the apprehension of persons who later make full restitution for any such damage.

9402 Reward Fund Administration (2-1-85)

The fund will be administered by the Reward Fund Committee composed of the Chairman of the Security Committee, the Board Member who is liaison to the Security Committee, and the General Manager.
