NEW PROCEDURE FOR CONTACTING THE ASSOCIATION'S PATROL SERVICE

Please review another article in this issue of the Seashore News as to why the Board of Directors had to hire a new contractor to operate Mariner gate. On August 1st, Region One Security will be operating Mariner gate and Securtee District Patrol will supply the daily patrol service.

As stated in past articles, the purpose of the patrol is to monitor the Association's common area, enforce the association's parking rules and respond to after hours entry gate problems.. It is not their responsibility to respond to problems within or around a resident's home. Please call the Sheriff's Department when the problem involves your home or safety.

If you need to report an immediate problem and request the patrol service to respond, please contact Securtee District Patrol directly by calling the following phone number and advising their Irvine dispatch center:


At the top of this issue of the Seashore News is a phone sticker with Securtec's phone number. Please attach it to the phone you use most often. Additional stickers are in the NSCA office for those residents wishing to have additional copies.

For many years, residents have been able to contact Mariner gate to request the patrol service. With the change in contract, residents who call Mariner gate to request the patrol service will be advised to call the 800 phone number above. Currently, during summer hours, the patrol service operates from 10am to 2am each and every day. To better facilitate contact with the patrol, and to lessen any communication problems that could occur, all calls to Securtec will be logged in on their computer. The NSCA Board of Directors or Traffic & Safety Committee can receive, if necessary, a copy of the report to monitor activity and response.

After logging in the call, Securtec will immediately contact the patrol personnel by radio to pass on the resident's reported concern/problem.

NEW CONTRACTOR TO **OPERATE** MARINER GATE

Near the end of June, our General Manager was notified by the owner of Securtec District Patrol that he had decided to take his company in a different direction and that he was cancelling all of his gate station accounts. His company is going to remain in the patrol business.

Over the last several weeks, bids were obtained by the General Manager for the portion of the contract dealing with the operation of Mariner gate. The Board received three written bids from the five bid packages The bids were reviewed by Board members Don Johnston and George Williams, who also conducted the interviews of the three companies.

After review and discussion about the interviews conducted, the Board chose to offer the contract to the "small" company, Region One Services, Inc. It was felt that they would provide good resident public relations and their cost was in line with the current budget. Several references provided by Region One were excellent.

The Board has also decided to remain with Securtee for the patrol portion of the service. The current daily coverage will not change.

It is hoped that several of the existing Securtec personnel will move over to Region One and remain at Mariner gate. This will assist with a smoother transition and lessen training time.




