FROM THE HELM

This month's message From the Helm has one straightforward and simple request: Will anyone and everyone who has not yet filled out your EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS REGISTRATION FORM please do so! It is a simple form (not like the first one) which requires only your name, address, who lives at your address, if you have any special needs and the name of an outside contact person.

The idea that there might be an emergency of such magnitude that disaster preparedness would come into play is not something that any of us like to think about; but the newspapers of the last month have been filled with happenings that were unexpected or if expected had poorly prepared plans. Fortunately here in Southern California there is little chance of hurricanes. Hurricane Floyd moving up the east coast in September prompted the authorities to request massive evacuations of people - evacuations which resulted in unbelievable traffic delays of as much as ten hours on a two-hour trip to safety.

Earthquakes, on the other hand, are quite common here. They occur without warning but they can be expected. Since the early 1800's when records were initially kept, major earthquakes have been occurring with regularity throughout California. In fact, United States Geological Survey studies indicate that over the

last 1,400 or 1,500 years major earthquakes have occurred on the southern portion of the San Andreas fault about every 150 years. The last occurrence was in 1857. Yes, the famous San Francisco earthquake (on the northern portion of the San Andreas fault) was 93 years ago, but since then we have had temblors of Richter magnitude 6 or greater in every portion of the state. My old seismology professor Charlie Richter used to say, "If you live in California and haven't been in a major earthquake, just wait, you will be."

The key is not to worry, not to panic, but to be sufficiently concerned to put by enough water and food supplies to last through any interruptions in services and local store availability of materials. By completing your Emergency Preparedness Registration form you will be reminding yourself to be ready.

- ✓ Authorized staff to pursue common area rabbit control from a monthly service to quarterly service. Cost for once per quarter service \$400.

- ✓ Appointed Keith Carlson to the Finance Committee.
- ✓ Set the Board priority project list for 1999 2000.
- ✓ Authorized the purchase of supplies for Emergency Preparedness, up to \$1,200, per the list provided by Gerlinde Duffy.
- ✓ Authorized staff to alter the automatic opening of the Mariner Dr. locking pedestrian gates to Monday through Friday, 7:00 am to 8:30 am. This time frame will allow kids going to the bus stop on Mariner Dr. to leave without using a proximity device and allow resident's domestic workers to enter.
- ✓ Authorized staff to purchase a new network computer system from Dell Computer Corporation.
- ✓ Authorized staff to inform Architect Marshall Ininns to create construction drawings for the posted preliminary plan involving the Ports' O Call/Cabrillo Isle gate. Further, upon future completion of the gate renovations, the gate will be known as the Cabrillo Gate.
- ✓ Authorized staff to inform Architect Marshall Ininns the Board wants to start the planning process to renovate the Selva gate.

- ✓ Decided to replace the remaining wrought iron fence panels along Ports O'Call, when needed, with new wrought iron instead of slumpstone, to cut costs.
- ✓ Chose to table decision on who and when to award contract to construct new monument markers at entry to Mariner Dr. Board shall wait until later this year to review funding sources.

TRAFFIC & SAFETY COMMITTEE

- 1. Computer Generated Passes: The Committee adopted a system for generating passes by computer at the Mariner Drive gate. This will assists in identifying and keeping track of all persons receiving passes. This should speed up entry.
- 2. **Stonehill Pedestrian Gate:** The keypad number for the new pedestrian gate at Stonehill has been changed and will be posted for one month on the inner gate wall. The present code is 9712 until October 5, then it will be changed to 6285.
- 3. **Personal Identification Code:** Residents will be notified that a date will be set for mandatory use of the personal identification code (PIC) when calling in guests at the Mariner Gate.
- 4. Future Planning for Access to the Community: The members of the Traffic and Safety Committee are being asked to make recommendations for the future in regard to

recommendations for the future in regard to access to the community. This will cover all gates.

- 5. Lincoln Security Service: Residents are asked to make any complaints about Lincoln personnel to the NSCA office, not to the sentries. Lincoln has been asked to notify the sentries at Mariner Drive gate to release the sheriff's phone number to anyone requesting it.
- 6. **Speed Trailer:** Lincoln will move the trailer to the next site as scheduled by the committee. We have receive word that it does alert drivers to their speed within the community.
- 7. **Vandalism Report:** There was no vandalism reported in August.

8. **Emergency Preparedness:** The emergency supplies for the community will be kept at the community center. There will be a meeting of all block captains and street leaders, possibly in November.

"The Real Issue"

The decision on the Ports O' Call/Cabrillo entrance, to remove the Guard House and put in the least expensive gate plan is short sighted and entirely misses the point. Long range beatification of the Shores is an investment, not an expense. Since gates are only replaced every 25 years or so, any reserve requirement would have had to be minimal.

The real issue is prudent financial decisions that safeguard and maximize property values. Every home owner in the Shores or their heirs will sooner or later sell their home. For most of us, this is our single biggest asset. The images projected to the real estate buying public is often crucial as to whether the seller gets top dollar or it is discounted because it is not perceived to be as good as its neighbors. The Cabrillo Gate is crucial because of its very visible location next to the Ritz Cove, The Ritz Carlton, and the new upscale 2 Ritz Carlton Drive, all of which have invested to maximize their image and property values.

The Board should be obliged to protect the investment in all our homes by including an attractive guard house.
