Dear Homeowner,

The Seashore News is one of the best ways we have to bring you information on matters which affect you and matters of interest. I urge you to read it. For example, some of the following items will affect most residents:

COMMITTEE CHAIRMEN-Two of our Committee Chairmen, Carole Daly, Recreation, and Myron Wasson, Landscaping and Maintenance, have submitted their resignations for personal reasons. We will miss them. Thank you, Carole and Myron, for all that you have done to help the Community.

Dorothy Dudley and Ellen Hanna have been appointed Co-Chairmen of the Recreation Committee, and Director John Bulleit will act as Chairman of the Landscaping and Maintenance Committee on a temporary basis.

SLOPE DRAINS—A number of private lots in our Community have drains which were installed to take excess water from those lots down a slope to the street or to property below. The entrances or openings to these drains are located in the rear or side yards. The owners of the lots which have this type drain have the responsibility to see that the openings to the drain on their property is unobstructed at all times and that water from the surrounding area can flow freely to the drain.

OWNERS OF PROPERTY WITH SLOPE DRAINS ARE REQUESTED TO CHECK THEIR DRAINS AND DO WHAT IS NECESSARY TO ASSURE THAT THE OPENINGS ARE UNOBSTRUCTED AND THAT WATER WILL FLOW FREELY FROM THE ADJACENT PROPERTY TO THE DRAINS. IF THIS IS NOT DONE BY THE OWNERS BEFORE DECEMBER 1, 1978, THE ASSOCIATION, IN ORDER TO PREVENT POSSIBLE DAMAGE TO COMMON PROPERTY, WILL UNDERTAKE TO CORRECT THE PROBLEM AND INVOICE THE PROPERTY OWNER FOR ALL COSTS.

ADMITTANCE OF REALIZORS—It has been customary to admit non-resident realtors through the manned gates if they display a real estate agency card. At the request of the Security Committee, the Board of Directors has decided to discontinue this practice. In the future non-resident realtors will not be admitted through the manned gates unless a property owner has called or written the guard and authorized admittance.

OFFICE REORGANIZATION

With the opening of Niguel Shores new office addition in October of this year, it became necessary to reorganize our offices. The new office addition consists of two offices and a conference room for business meetings of the Board of Directors and Association Committees. The other offices will be used by the General Manager, Roger Wilson, and the association secretary, Silvia Moreno who was recently hired to fill this new position. She will be the secretary for the General Manager, handle incoming calls, typing the Seashore News, and many other duties.

The existing offices will provide space for our Office Manager Bookkeeper, Kathy Abbatecola, and the Community Center Coordinator, Cathy Quijano. As Community Center Coordinator, Cathy will have increased responsibilities in coordinating all the Community Center functions, assisting the Reccreation Committee plan social activities, and supervise association sponsored recreation programs and contract classes throughout the year. She will be available to handle all questions and problems relating to your needs at the Community Center and Recreation activities. Kathy Abbatecola will continue to handle all bookkeeping responsibilities, issue key cards and security stickers, and many other business related duties as in the past.

We have a very small office staff, but you should know our goal is to provide you with the best Community Center services we possibly can We hope you visit the Community Center more in the future and find your visit more enjoyable than ever before.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS UNDERWAY

Slope Repair-Starting the first week in November, H & H Grading, Inc. will begin work repairing the slope failures in seven areas caused during the heavy rains last winter. They will be using bulldozers, backhoe equipment and dump trucks to do the repairs. The repairs will be done on sections of the following slopes: Moonsail, Windward, Flying Jib, Niguel Shores Dr., and Niguel Road. We must ask for your cooperation in parking your cars, and your guests cars away from the work areas during construction. It is important to say that the repairs are being fixed according to the design and specifications of Leighton and Associates a well known local soil engineering and geology firm.

Slurry Seal the Streets-During the month of November, Niguel Shores will be slurry sealing all the streets in the community, with the exception of the Villas. The slurry seal is an asphalt slurry mixture made from a closely graded fine aggregate, emulsified asphalt and water, all carefully calibrated and mixed to form a mortar-like compound. The slurry acts as a preservative and seals the streets prohibiting moisture to sink down into the asphalt Which would cause cracking, depressions, and other damage to the streets. You will be notified in advance when your street will be slurried. We will provide you with instructions on where to park your cars and the hours the streets will be closed prior to starting. So, be watching for our notices regarding this project and look out for traffic control signs and barricades that will be used.

RESOLUTION: MOTOR VEHICLE PARKING

Whereas, Article IX, Sec. 8 of the Niguel Shores Community Association Declaration of CC&R's states that "No mobilehome, boat, truck or trailer of any kind shall be... parked...on any property or street within Niguel Shores in such manner as to be visible from any neighboring property..."; and

Whereas, enforcement personnel requires clearly stated standards to implement effective enforcement of the existing CC&R provisions; it is therefore

RESOLVED, that:

A compact van (e.g. Chevy-Van, Ford Econoline, Dodge Tradesman, Volkswagon, etc.) will be allowed to be visibly parked provided it does not exceed 135 inch wheelbase or 80" overall height (including roof-mounted appurtenances). These standards are applicable to vans with interiors converted to minimotor homes.

A pickup, or a utility vehicle (e.g. Jeep, Bronco, Blazer, Scout) will be allowed to be visibly parked provided it does not exceed 135" wheelbase nor 80" overall heighth; and further provided that any body or shell mounted behind the cab does not extend more than 6 inches above the chassis manufacturer's original roof-line specification of the cab; and further provided that the vehicle has no unsightly external rigging (e.g. a power winch).

(Wheel base is measured from the center of the front wheel to the center of the rear wheel. "Compact van", "pickup" and "utility" vehicle terminology is intended to conform with established automotive industry usage of these categorical terms).

Application for temporary exemption may be made to the Association office for a guest-vehicle, or a member-owned vehicle being loaded or unloaded, or requiring emergency service.

Subject to the foregoing standards, no mobile home, motor home, motor bus, truck, van, camper, any other type of vehicle employing a truck chasis, nor any semitrailer, trailer or boat shall be parked, stored, maintained, constructed or repaired on any property or street within Niguel Shores in such manner as to be visible from any neighboring property.

Violations will be dealt with in accordance with CC&R enforcement procedure, which may culminate in tow-away or other legal action following notification from the Association's attorney.

Niguel Shores Community Associations Notice of Animal Control Procedure

In order to reduce the amount of nuisance and damage done to property and persons in Niguel Shores relating to animals violating ordinances established by the County of Orange and enforced by the Orange County Animal Control Office, the Association recommends the following steps to each property owner or member who experiences the problems caused by uncontrolled animals:

- 1) Notify the Orange County Animal Control Office when you observe dogs or other animals running loose in the community. Call 634-7301 between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M. any day of the week, hours after 5 P.M. call the Sheriff at 834-3000. Their field services staff has animal control trucks available from 7:30 A.M. to 10 P.M. and after 10 P.M. for emergency situations only. Whenever you contact the Animal Control Office about a complaint, they need the following information, if available:
 - A. Description of Animal
 - B. Times of day animal is sighted
 - C. Locations observed
 - D. If known, name and address of the owner
- 2) Notify the Association in writing of your complaint with the same information so that we may keep a file on the offender (This information will remain confidential).
- If the problem is not corrected or if the problem pertains specifically to uncontrolled barking dogs or other animals disturbing the peace, you must contact the Operations Officer who handles all of these problems. The Operations Officer is available Monday through Friday from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M. As a last resort, you may file a request for criminal complaint at the Animal Control Office in person at 561 City Drive, City of Orange, 92668 (Garden Grove Freeway--City Drive Exit -- across the street from the City Shopping Center). After you file a complaint, the County notifies the owner that they have 5 days to abate the nuisance caused by their animal or the County will take the owner to court. Normally the County requires two witnesses before they will take someone to court.

The Association will provide any owner with knowledge of other written complaints about an uncontrolled animal which has been filed with us. Also, the Association intends to take action unilaterally against animals running loose or causing increased maintenance in common areas where this is observed by the staff.

The purpose for handling this situation in this manner is for the following reasons:

1) You are paying property taxes for professional animal control.

2) Your community Association does not have money budgeted nor is it equipped to effectively respond to Animal Control related problems.

3) Orange County, after they have done a Preliminary investigation, if requested to do so, will take the offender to Court.

COMPREHENSIVE LANDSCAPE

Starting early this month, we will begin treating our mosquito breeding areas, on a monthly basis. This is a new program we're beginning and we hope it will be effective.

We are continuing our efforts in gopher and squirrel control. The burrows these animals create can form channels for water run-off and cause serious erosion problems. We have many traps set throughout our community, and are continually checking them and resetting or moving them. We have good success with gophers but the squirrels are much more difficult to catch. Several areas in our community have been recently replanted, and we would ask your help in keeping children (and adults) off them. The bank up from Cabrillo in the Shores area has recently been planted, as have the Marlin-spike Dr. area and a section of new lawn along Niguel Shores Road. We might add that any traffic on the banks, and this is happening in several areas, is to be discouraged as it leads to continued erosion and causes expensive repair.

As we get into fall, we find our bermuda grass and crab grass infestations going dormant. The crab grass will disappear and be taken over this winter by our cool season grasses, blue grass and perennial rye. We will be applying pre-emergents in the spring to stop the new crab grass seeds from sprouting and applying crab grass killer to these plants that do come up.

SECURITY COMMITTEE

First and foremost, we would like to remind you again to keep your car doors and windows locked at all times and certainly not to leave anything of value in sight. Unfortunately, several ladies have had their purses stolen out of their cars at the beach parking lot while enjoying a stroll on the beach. Sad, but true!

Do not hesitate to call the Sheriff's Department (ZEnith 7-9999 toll free) if you notice anything unusual in your neighborhood or in the community. They have a "sympathetic ear" and frequently the complaint or information you provide may be the missing link in helping them tie "loose ends" of a particular problem situation together. If you are wondering about calling the Sheriff about a particular situation — don't ponder — do it!!! Also, it is essential that the Sheriff be notified if your decal or key card is stolen. A formal report of the theft will then be filled out. Also, immediately thereafter, inform the Community Center office of same at 493-0122.

Anyone wishing to contact the Security Committee Chairman can do so by calling the Community Center office and stating his/her name, address, phone number, problem and time of occurrence. This information will be forwarded to him via his file in the office and proper and speedy follow-up undertaken.

Another reminder - it is each and every resident's responsibility to inform the appropriate guard gate, including guests, service personnel and the NEW requirement for admitting realtors. The guards are authorized to allow entry into the community only if the name of the "guest" is on file with the guard for the particular day in question; otherwise he/she will be turned away.

Owners, whose homes are for sale, but, who are not on the premises during regular working hours or are out-of town owners must file a letter with the Community Center business office authorizing realtors to come into the community to show their home. A copy of this letter will also be given to the guards so that the realtors may gain admittance. This is for your protection and in no way interferes with the ability to sell your home. The other guard-gated communities along the coastal area allow realtors in by appointment only (other than on "caravan day"), and as we all know, people manage to buy and sell homes in those communities. Afterall, we're not meant to be a cruise-through community or a place of recreation on days off for those few who take advantage of their realtor status! The above procedure has been approved by the Board of Directors and will be implemented. Cooperation on the part of all residents will help make life more palatable for the guards, and in turn, offer us all better security, which the majority of us want.

LAS VEGAS TRIP



NIGUEL SHORES NEWSPAPER RECYCLING PROGRAM

NEWSPAPER PICK-UP DAYS IN NOVEMBER: 13th. & 27th.

Our pick-up of October 9th. was only 10,190 pounds. Many schools in the area are having paper drives, and although we are glad that the papers are being recycled, we hope that it won't have a permanent effect upon our own program.

Since February 6th. our total tonnage of paper recycled for eight months amounts to 213,320 pounds, or almost 107 tons. On the basis of 17 trees required to make a ton of newsprint, that's 1,819 trees saved from destruction. During that period we have raised \$2,074.76 to be used for betterment of our Community Center.

EXPENDED so far for Community improvement:

- (1) \$200 toward the piano for the Recreation and general purpose room at the Center.
- (2) \$187 Potted plantes for the Community Center
- (3) \$1000 pledged to complete the acoustic treatment of the Community Center general purpose room.
- (4) \$300 pledged for two picnic tables and 2 barbecue units for Community Center Park and Playground area.
- (5) Other miscellaneous pledged and expended-\$300.

Our recycler has asked that we remind our residents again - no slick magazines - no plastic bags - no string - and please - discontinue using grocery bags, (they can't be recycled and must be removed before using their contents). The Pennysaver and similar brochures are OK. Just stack the paper under a weight, or use a carton.

Starting about November 17 we will have our aluminum receptacle installed next to the Community Center Trash bin, and you can start bringing aluminum to be recycled. All aluminum beverage cans, pie pans, cake pans and even TV dinner trays are recycable. However, please avoid TIN CANS, or other non aluminum metals. If in doubt, try a magnet on it. If the magnet picks it up - it's not aluminum.

By the way - Budweiser beer has been coming in Tin Cans lately. They have no seams and look like aluminum, but are NOT acceptable. Try the magnet test on them before including them with your aluminum salvage.

In the meantime - keep those newspapers coming and save your aluminum. STASH THEM-DON'T TRASH THEM
