FROM THE HELM

In my first letter "From the Helm" I I drew attention to the important responsibilities which the standing committees of the Niquel Community Association perform on behalf of the day to day operation of our community. During the month September, the Tree View Blockage Committee dealt with 24 complaints and Architectural Control Committee with 10 requests construction, remodeling, or repair. Landscape and Maintenance Committees were involved throughout the with slope maintenance. and drainage landscaping problems. Final arrangements were completed for repair of the swimming pool and work on its repair and restoration has begun and should be completed by the end of October.

Negotiations involving NSCA, Avco Community Developers, and the County of Orange for repair and improvement of the seawall revetment along the Niguel Shores beach progressed to a point that permits the county and the Association to begin repair of the revetment by October 30th.

During the month, our Association management staff together with Association Board of Directors and its committees have been reviewing Association Rules and Regulations pertaining to (1) Architectural Committee Operating Procedures, (2) Fine Enforcement Procedures, (3) Use of Community facilities, (4) Vehicle Rules and Resident and Visitor Parking Areas.

The foregoing incomplete summary of some of the work performed during September by the Committees and Board of Directors of the NSCA is intended to aquaint members of our Association with tremendous work load that volunteer members of our committees and perform on behalf Association. I believe that the work load of the Committees now exceeds the capacity of the current membership of committees to deal with the these issues confronting them each month. NIGUEL SHORES PAPER SALVAGE PROJECT

This article is intended as an appeal to those residents of Niguel Shores who are not now supporting the paper salvage program, which was began here in 1978 and so far has been responsible for the salvage of 1,966 tons (3,932,000 pounds) of waste paper. Converted to number of trees saved from destruction at 19 trees per ton of paper, this equals 37,354 trees, a good sized forest.

We believe that many new residents do not know of the paper salvage program and by including their waste paper in the Tuesday trash pick-up, hundreds or perhaps thousands of pounds of paper are lost to our salvage program.

addition to newspapers, salvage magazines, brochures, catalogs. This time of year is a and JUNK MAIL. bonanza for that. With all political appeals combined with department store brochures, Christmas sale catalogs, we should be doing a tremendous business. Instead. the last few months have shown a decline.

We need the suport of <u>ALL RESIDENTS</u>, and we urgently request help from the new residents and also those who may not have become involved heretofore.

The procedure is simple. Just place your stacked papers, magazines, etc., in large grocery bags, either paper or plastic, or tie them in bundles. You may deliver the packaged papers to our storage room on the west side of the Community Center at any time the center is open, usually 9am to 9pm seven days a week.

For anyone who may be unable to deliver their papers but who still want to participate, please call Doris Patterson at 496-4620. She has volunteered for this service.

We have been asked by our salvage company to tie the handles of plastic bags together with cord to prevent the papers from sliding out.

Funds derived from the sale of paper have been used exclusively to pay for improvements in community facilities, such as the renovation of our Community Center meeting room, the small room committee meetings. used for restaurant-type kitchen equipment, playground improvement, facilities, air conditioning of our office, and many others too numerous to detail here.

We are currently receiving \$40.00 per ton of paper, averaging about 12 to 13 tons per month. Let's increase this to 20 tons by greater support from the whole community.

Don't <u>trash</u> your papers, let us <u>cash</u> them. Thank you.




