A Progress Report (A reward of fifty cents to anyone who can come up with a more appropriate, snappier opening)

The <u>Gate Committee recommendation</u>. Mrs. Jane Lutz, chairperson, presented the committee's recommendation for the improvement of the gate system. Salient points are:

- 1. A pilot installation at the Selva Gate of a motorized metal barricade in the exit and entrance lanes, together with necessary detectors and loops.
- 2. A programmable card reader and programmer.
- 3. Additional readers for other gates.

4. 3,000 key cards.

Among the questions raised, was whether it might be more effective to place the equipment at the Shores Gate. The matter will be discussed at the December meeting. The committee and Mrs. Lutz were commended for the work they have done.

Reclaimed Water. The Board is studying the feasibility of using reclaimed water for landscape irrigation and has signified its interest to the South Coast Water District by signing a non-binding letter of intent to purchase the water.

<u>Dog Bites</u>. A resident has given the Board written notice of being bitten by an unleashed dog. Investigation indicates that this same dog allegedly has also bitten three children. The Board and General Manager are proceeding with appropriate action.

Recreation Classes. On the recommendation of the Recreation Committee, a motion including the following points was passed:

1. New classes to have a 80/20 fee split--80% to the instructor and 20% to the community.

2. Classes will have a predetermined minimum and maximum number of participants.

3. Residents will have first consideration in signing up for new classes.

4. Guests are allowed to take classes only if accompanied by sponsoring resident to each class.

5. The 20% revenue split will go into the Recreation Committee fund to be used for community functions and activities.

6. Sign-ups and pre-registration will be handled through the office; however, checks will be payable to the instructor and collected through the office prior to the first class meeting time.

Additional Personnel and Office Equipment were authorized in a motion which approved of an administrative assistant, an additional typewriter, desks and chairs, and office recarpeting.

Slope Repair Progress continues. Completed are: Flying Jib, Moonsail, Shackleton Isle. Niguel Shores Drive (two locations) and the Windward Slope are underway.

The Swimming Pool continues to show signs of deterioration. On the recommendation of the General Manager, the Board authorized additional investigation of the condition, so that it may determine what action is indicated.

Approved by the Board were:

1. A "transfer fee" increase to \$75.

2. A resolution allowing deferment of a vote involving a "significant policy change or expenditure of non-budget funds of over \$1,000 to a subsequent meeting."

AVCO has declined our request that they landscape their property at Pacific Coast Highway and Niguel Road.

#### RECYCLING PROGRAM

DECEMBER pickup dates for newspapers, magazines, books, brochures, junk mail, and old telephone books will be:

DECEMBER 8 and DECEMBER 22 (second and fourth Mondays)

There will be a three week interval between the second December pickup and the first pickup for January. The first pickup in January 1981, will be: JANUARY 13.

Results since our last report in the November bulletin were: October 27 13,560 lbs @ \$25 ton - \$169.50 November 10 15,900 lbs @ \$25 5on - 198.75 29,460

Aluminum salvage for October was

159 lbs at \$ .27 lb - \$42.93

Total income from salvage operations was: \$411.18 for the period.

Currently we are working on a program with the Community Association whereby we will use salvage funds to assist in the cost of roofing over parts of the Community Center main building which have heretofore been covered only with cloth. maintenace area at the rear of the general purpose room is open to the elements and would benefit greatly from having a solid roof overhead. The same applies to the area at the end of the office section, where the ping pong tables are now located. Also, areas over the office doorways and the walkway between the office and the restroom areas are under consideration. matters will be worked out with the Association management, and we will use salvage funds to assist with this project, thereby enabling them to expand the project beyond what would be possible on presently budgeted funds.

Your past participation in this salvage project has made it possible for us to offer this financial assistance to our Association, encouraging them to proceed with certain needed projects which otherwise may have been postponed or not done at all.

Please keep up the good work--stash your salvageable paper until pickup day and place it at your front curb by 12 noon, and our recycler will do the rest. The entire community shares in the utilization of funds derived from this patriotic project, and think of the thousands of trees saved from destruction at the rate of 17 trees to a ton of new paper. Also, remember that 19 beverage cans weigh about one pound, worth \$ .27, and, also, that aluminum resalvages at about 95% reusable aluminum.

It's a good feeling to know that we are doing our part for ecology and saving natural resources that would otherwise be used as fill by our SOLAG TRASH people and covered with earth.

Three Arch Bay Community has followed our example and have set up a program of salvage similar to ours. They have come to us for advice and assistance in establishing their program. you see, good things have a way of spreading and increasing their benefits to all.

Ah, the weather is starting to get nippy and it's so

great having a cozy fire in the fireplace.

It is great but let's also consider the hazards and the precautions we must take. We should be concerned about the fact that we have had a long dry spell and every home in our area has a very dry wood shingle roof. One hot spark from a careless resident could set the whole area on fire. With the holidays, people often utilize the fireplace to burn gift wrappings, party discards and old green and we strongly recommend that everyohome have a SPARK ARRESTOR. They can be bought or easily made with a small gauge screen placed on top of each chimney.


In addition, adequate ventilation is important to prevent the buildup of carbon monoxide from home fires. Wood smoke and fumes can also cause allergic symptoms in some people, and burning newspapers and magazines printed with black ink can release large amounts of lead in the air. Use kindling

instead.

Always make sure the damper is opened before lighting a fire and have the flue checked periodically to be sure it's free of accumulations of tar.

We all want everyone's holidays to be happy so why not take these suggestions.

The rainy season will be here before we know it and as mentioned in the Seashore News in our March 1980 issue, we'd like to remind owners of Garden Homes with flat roofs of the maintenance procedure.

Flat roofs require maintenance and should be checked annually. Maintenance should be directed to the joints of the sheet metal gravel stop, sheet metal flashing at the edge of the roof and to the roof-to-wall flashing joints. Usually no maintenance is required in the dield of the roof except for pipe and vent flashings. Most joint and seam openings will occur at the gravel stop and roof-to-wall flashings. Check around roof jacks, pipe and vent flashings as well as furnace flues and other roof penetration flashings.

These recommendations were given to us by Avco's

Customer Service Department.

More from the "Code":

- Any call must be made instantaneously; otherwise, 10. the ball is presumed good and still in play. "Instantaneously" means that the call is made beeither an opponent has a chance to hit the return or the return has gone out of play.
- The instantaneous call will eliminate the twochance option that some players practice. To illustrate, C is advancing to the net for an easy putaway when he sees a ball rolling towards him. He continues his advance and hits the shot, only to have it fly over the baseline. C then makes a claim for a let, which is obviously not valid. C could have had a let when he first saw the ball rolling towards him, but when he saw it and continued on to hit the easy shot, he forfeited his right to a let. He took his chance to win or lose, and he is not entitled to a second one.
- Another situation eliminated by the instantaneous 12. call requirement is that where a player returns a ball over the net, at the same time yelling, "I don't know." This sort of ball constitutes a puzzle which should not be thrown at any opponent.


