FROM THE HELM

Last fall, the Board of Directors, after a good deal of spirited discussion, adopted a Mission Statement. Our purpose was to put on paper a definition of the job this Board, and hopefully future Boards, should be doing. We've said our job is:

- To maintain and further develop the Niguel Shores community as a desirable and enjoyable residence for individuals and families of all ages.
- —To provide reasonable amenities commensurate with dues levied, and fiscal responsibility for the present and the future.
- —To create a safe environment through adherence to our Bylaws, CC&Rs, and Rules and Regulations that will provide a quality community for our residents.
- —To foster open communication among residents, staff, committees and the Board.

With this statement in mind, we're asking you to give us comments and suggestions so this Board and future Boards can do a better job. Attached to this issue of the Seashore News is a questionnaire. Please fill it out and return it to the office. You can attach additional pages if you need to. There is no due date. It is open-ended. Let us hear from you anytime.

Based on the reserve study that was done last year, we are projecting forty-nine projects to be completed in the next five years. Dick Mackaig, our Chief Financial Officer, has done a cash flow analysis through the year 2003. We know that we will have the money to do each of these projects and we know now that our reserves will be adequate for projects beyond 2003.

During the next five years we'll be re-paving the rest of the community and rebuilding three vehicle gates. The Mariner Gate is the first of these projects, and is on schedule. We know there is some inconvenience involved in each of these projects. But in every case, it is a major rebuilding of the infrastructure that has served us well for twenty-five years or more and the results should serve the community for another twenty-five years. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

JANUARY BOARD ACTIONS

- ✓ Authorized staff to reimburse a homeowner for repairs to a sewer line because roots from trees, which the Association is responsible for, penetrated the line and caused a blockage. Cost is \$1,823.75.
- ✓ Authorized staff to reimburse a homeowner for sewer line cleaning, costing \$114. Trees for which the Association is responsible are suspected of invading the line.
- ✓ Appointed Barbara Crist to the *ad-hoc* Communication Improvement Committee between staff, homeowners, the Board and the various committees.
- ✓ Authorized staff to reimburse a homeowner \$89 for sewer line cleaning because a tree for which the association is responsible, invaded the line.
- ✓ Appointed the following homeowners to the Nominating Committee: Jack Christiansen, Art Peever, Peter Rask, Robin Roehlk and Patty Therolf. Don Johnston was previously appointed as committee chair.
- ✓ Accepted the contract with Duggan Construction, amounting to \$176,853 for renovating Mariner Gate. Contract is to start January 11, and hopefully conclude March 19.
- ✓ Authorized staff to reimburse a homeowner for vehicle damage at the Manta Gate, amounting to \$475.67.

- ✓ Directed staff to provide the monthly vandalism report to the Traffic & Safety Committee for inclusion in their monthly Seashore News article.
- ✓ Authorized staff to make arrangements with Lincoln Security Service to increase patrols for the period January 18 through February 5, at an increased cost of \$675 per week. This will occur while Mariner Gate is closed for renovations.

TIME TO REMOVE HOLIDAY DECORATIONS

Homeowners and residents are asked to remove holiday decorations by the first week of February. As of February 8, our maintenance staff will inspect the community and will report any remaining items which would constitute an architectural violation. The Association and your surrounding neighbors will appreciate your timely decoration removal.

THE IMPORTANCE OF CHIMNEY CAPS

Homeowners who have not installed a chimney cap should consider doing this to prevent burning embers from being blown onto your own roof and/or surrounding roofs. Seek Architectural Control Committee approval prior to installation.

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE UPDATE

There were six homeowner requests in January. One was referred to Tree View Blockage. The others are complete or are being scheduled into the system.

Most of the turf has now been de-thatched. Where it is spongy when you walk, there is kikuyu grass underneath and rooted in the soil. These roots are rhizomes and grow long and deep into the soil. Kikuyu grass is almost impossible to get rid of.

Some homeowners report problems with water from association sprinklers getting on their glass fences or windows. In some areas, if the wind blows at all, the glass is at risk for water spots. The gardeners cannot change the watering because of the other plants and related problems in these areas. Members of the committee suggest homeowners try applying RainX made by Penzoil (or a similar product) on glass area so water will not stay on the glass. The application is supposed to be good for four to six months. This might be worth trying on skylights. Actually, it was developed for windshields in automobiles.

The planting schedule for 1999 will begin shortly. The basic schedule is done area by area, and is rotated differently each year.

TRAFFIC & SAFETY COMMITTEE

- 1. Mariner Gate update: Work on the Mariner Gate has begun. Construction will take approximately three months to complete and the gate may be closed up to three weeks. There are incentives for the contractors to finish on time and likewise, penalties for unwarranted delays.
- 2. Cabrillo Isle Gate update: A second architect is drawing up plans which will be posted at the Community Center. Hearings will also be held before anything is approved.
- 3. Pedestrian Gate update: The gate at the beach should be up and working shortly.
- 4. The Breakers Isle Gate was damaged from someone swinging on it. The Committee would like to find out who did this latest vandalism.
- 5. A sub-committee is redesigning the day passes. Lincoln Security Service furnished the committee with samples from other communities. We would like to differentiate between "no-call" and other guests. We are also looking at changing the access system at the Mariner Gate and are looking at other communities in nearby areas.
- 6. There have been complaints that there is no room for visitor parking in some of the Bay streets because residents are parking their cars there, sometimes even overnight. It was agreed that we would give out a certain pass to those cars that have been granted waivers

for any reason, and ticket the others. Residents are encouraged to report offending vehicles. Complaints have also been received about residents using garages for storage rather than for vehicles. We will investigate complaints each month.

- 7. We discussed placement of the speed indicator trailer and would like residents to make requests to the committee. Forms are in the office.
- 8. We are pleased that the reward for information about vandals was raised to \$500.


SHORES BLOTTER

MARINER GATE UPDATE

As you read this, the new Mariner Gate

installation is progressing well. We expect to have the entrance at Mariner Drive functioning again with temporary facilities on Friday, February 5. At that time we will return to normal call-in procedures for guests and service providers. The Selva Gate will be restored to its previous operation. Because of expected construction congestion on Mariner Drive at that time, some inconvenience and delay is

anticipated. Residents having gate cards and decals are encouraged to use the Selva, Cabrillo and Ports O'Call entrances to gain faster access to the community.

We expect the entire project to be completed by March 19, weather cooperating. New entrance landscaping will be undertaken shortly thereafter. You may have noted from the plans which were displayed at the Community Center, we will have new entry gates and traffic lanes which will make entry more streamlined and relieve traffic congestion between lanes during entry. Owners and residents will be able to use their present gate cards to raise the residents access gate when entering on Mariner Drive, thus eliminating the need to wait for the guard to wave them through. new arrangement will also make identification of visitors more complete and timely.

The Traffic and Safety Committee has recommended, and the Board has approved, a new procedure for identifying residents and owners who wish to have their guests admitted to the community by phone call. This involves a PERSONAL IDENTIFICATION "CODE", (PIC) given by the Owner, Resident or Tenant at the time of requesting admission of a guest. It's quite a simple procedure that adds only your PIC to the usual information you provide when calling the gate. Many of you have already selected your PIC when filling out a new Owner/Tenant Information Declaration when you requested a pedestrian gate access device. The code you selected is being entered into our new computer program which will be available to the Mariner Gate guard. Those wishing to select a PIC may do so by providing the Office with a new Owner/Tenant Information Declaration. Please remember when the new Mariner Gate is completed and open you WILL NEED A PIC to give to the gate guard when requesting your guests be admitted. Don't get caught short. If you don't have one, get a PIC as soon as possible!

Moreover, I am vehemently opposed to any more butchery of these beautiful trees, and specifically to the trees at the bottom end of Atlantic Avenue, where I live.

There is a rumor afoot nameless persons living higher up the slope, behind the rec center, have complained about the pine trees because of so-called "view blockage", and that is the main reason this "trimming" operation has been mounted. Carol and I have checked the various view angles from these streets, including our own, and have come to the objective conclusion that if there are views being blocked by these particular trees, then they are of ugly flat tar and gravel rooftops and that the trees should be fertilized, if anything! In our own particular case these trees in fact block from above the marvelous view of the Re-Max office building on the corner of PCH & Niguel Road. Pray tell, Mr. President, what would these people rather look at - lovely green verdant trees - or inappropriate commercial development infringing on our residential ambiance?!

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS PLAN

About 50 people of Niguel Shores attended the lecture and visual presentation of Mark Johnson, Emergency Response Director for the City of Dana Point, on the evening of January 13.

He explained that earthquakes are our most probable type of disaster and outlined what kinds of problems people in our area would likely have and what should be done in preparation.

Pat Long, one of our own residents, showed us examples of pre-packaged food and water and even a blanket that are small enough to be kept in a car. Pat says these kinds of items can be purchased from a manufacturer named Survivor Industry and will keep for three to five years, but more on that later.

ONLY one hundred and fifty-five households in Niguel Shores have turned in their Disaster Forms to this date. If you have mislaid or lost your forms, replacements are available at the office which is where to turn them in when completed. Please respond. Help might be needed by you when you least expect it.






