### **BOARD ACTIONS FOR** JUNE

✓ Accepted the yearly slope survey report, dated 4/4/97, from Converse Consultants. The report is compiled every year and pertains only to the slopes NSCA is required to maintain.

✓ Denied four requests for waiver of late charges

and approved one request.

✓ Authorized staff to set-up a kid's summer program beginning June 30 and concluding August 8, provided the entire program is selfrequires at least This funded. families/individuals willing to contribute to the cost.

✓ Accepted the tennis sub-committee's request to amend the tennis court rules, allow Margaret McGrath to offer a children's tennis instruction program, and allow the tennis courts to be used for a social tennis tournament on August 10. A copy of amended Tennis Court Rule 5107 is attached to this copy of the Seashore News for your rules copy.

✓ Authorized staff to reimburse a homeowner, up to \$2,600, for driveway replacement. Damage was caused by tree roots from a tree within a landscaped easement, which is the responsibility

of NSCA.

✓ Authorized staff to have Securtec set up the mariner gate phone to have message service through Pacific Bell. Cost will be paid by the Association, \$31.95 per month.

✓ Authorized staff to use Anchor Paving to perform miscellaneous asphalt street repair. Cost

not to exceed \$5,000.

✓ Authorized staff to purchase two additional table and chair sets, with umbrellas, for the pool area. Cost not to exceed \$1,600.

✓ Authorized staff to issue a fine to a homeowner because child refused to follow directions not to skateboard at the Community Center.

✓ Appointed George Williams to the Landscape Committee as the representative for the Atlantic Garden Homes and appointed Beverly Grace to the Traffic & Safety Committee.

✓ Accepted changes to the Communication Committee Rules 5201 to 5251. The amended Rules are attached to this issue of the Seashore News for your records.

✓ Authorized staff to use Wendt Landscape Service to install multiple drain pits on two slopes the Association is responsible to maintain. The work was recommended by and is to be supervised by Converse Consultants.




### **WOMENS CLUB**

The wave portion of the statue had been cast in bronze and looks very good. Manta Court resident, Chris Griffitts of Griffcon Construction, is preparing for the construction of the concrete base.

Niguel Shores landscape contractor, Dick Wendt, is excavating for the foundation. The work is well underway and if all goes as planned, the unveiling will occur at the Community Center at 9:15 am on the Fourth of July.

### MAJOR ASPHALT REPAIRS FOR THE VILLAS & SEA TERRACE II

Staff is in the final process of negotiating with Oliver-Mahon Company to perform asphalt repairs, then an asphalt overlay of all the streets within this area of the community. Upon final contract language being agreed upon, a notice will be mailed to all residents in the Villas and Sea Terrace II providing an expected schedule for work. It may be possible for the work to begin toward the end of July. It is expected the work will take approximately two weeks to complete.

### **SHORES BLOTTER**

Reports from Securtec patrols for the past month in Niguel Shores assembled by the Traffic and Safety Committee.

### THE SHORES BLOTTER

- 1) May 15- Officers noted that the new sign in the tetherball area was vandalized. Someone had removed the letters NO from the sign and it appeared that skateboarding was allowed in the area.
- 2) May 18- There was a report of a broken water pipe on Windjammer. The NSCA office called the water district and they took action.
- 3) May 27- Officers observed a man trimming a tree on Marlinspike.

They explained to the condo owner that he was not permitted to trim trees without authorization and he was given the phone number of the NSCA office.

4) June 1- A car on Verrazzano Bay was broken into. Owner was advised to contact the sheriff.

Numerous citations for parking violations were given out during the month and several repeat offenders had cars impounded. Residents are advised to review NSCA Parking Rules.

### SECURTEC DISTRICT PATROL TO OPERATE MARINER GATE

As a reminder, Securtec will begin manning Mariner gate as of Monday, June 30. Securtec will have contract responsibility to man the gate and provide patrol service. To report problems within the common areas, not on private property, you can report them to Mariner gate or use the 800 phone number distributed last year. If patrol is working at the time of the call, he will be dispatched by radio to check out the problem. If patrol is not working, the call will be held until a patrol person is on duty. As has been stated many times, serious problems or emergencies should be directly reported to the O.C. Sheriff's or to 911.

Securtec has had discussions with the Traffic & Safety Committee, then the Board, on how to improve the situation involving the phone at Mariner gate. It has been agreed that as of July 1, when the sentry is too busy processing vehicles through the gate, residents will be able to leave a message through a phone mailbox at Pacific Bell. When the sentry has time, he will obtain the messages left on the system and write out guest passes. IT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO CALL AT LEAST ONE HOUR BEFORE YOU EXPECT YOUR GUEST OR SERVICE CONTRACTOR. If at all possible, call the night before, after 7:30 pm, when activity is slow.

The Board is willing to try this type of system to alleviate residents' frustration when the phone cannot be answered because the sentry is busy. Another advantage to the message system, you should not receive a busy signal when you call. All calls should go directly into the message system, even if ten residents are calling at the same time or the sentry is on a call. If the sentry cannot pick the phone up in four rings, your call will be automatically transferred to the message system. Please SPEAK clearly and leave your name/NSCA street, then your guest's/service contractor's name, fully spelling the name. The Board and the Traffic & Safety Committee will be monitoring how Securtec is operating this system to insure it operates efficiently.

The Traffic & Safety Committee is interested in resident comments, both pro and con, after the first month this system is used. Please provide written comments to the office and they will be forwarded to the Committee.

### TRAFFIC & SAFETY COMMITTEE

- 1. A proposal has been made to increase the number of persons on the Committee. At present there are four members, one of whom is on the Board. Beverly Grace, a former member of the L.A.P.D. was introduced. The Board will take action at their meeting.
- 2. Approximately 240 surveys were returned. The results are:

  Card Entry System at the beach 160 35

  Opening of Stonehill Gate 127 51

  Neighborhood Watch 171 2

  The deadline to turn in the survey will be first of July. Based on the survey, the Committee will make recommendations to the Board.
- 3. More information will be forthcoming from City Hall in regard to Neighborhood Watch.
- 4. The chain link/wrought iron fence was approved and will be installed. The committee chair will contact the County for its responsibility regarding light repairs and fence repair on the beach ramp.
- 5. Complaints of the Mariner Gate operation were discussed. The Board has asked for a vehicle count at the Mariner Gate.

# MINOR ASPHALT REPAIRS TO OCCUR WITH MAIN PORTION OF THE COMMUNITY

The Board has approved the use of Anchor Paving to make repairs to several asphalt streets. This work may be completed by the time this newsletter is distributed. Areas that have severe deterioration were selected. The work should not affect anyone from having access to their driveway for a lengthy time period. It is possible several residents may be inconvenienced for several hours.

### FOR YOUR INFORMATION

There have been a number of coyote sightings in Niguel Shores. Several pets have been killed, and recently one was seriously injured before the owner was able to scare the animal into leaving the yard. Smaller animals are at risk and vigilance is necessary.

### BEACH BLUFF FENCE AND GATES TO BE INSTALLED

Staff and the Board have completed negotiations with Saddleback Ornamental Iron to construct a new six-foot wrought iron fence with several new gates. This new fence will be installed along the beach ramp access road. Its purpose is to keep the public off the community's common area. It is expected this portion of the fence project will be started in mid-July. A-1 Fence Company has installed a section of six feet high chainlink fencing along the concrete drain channel above the lower portion of the beach access ramp. When the project is completely done, individuals will not be able to go up or down the common slope above the beach access road.

The Board has not officially approved an automatic locking device for the new pedestrian gate. If the Board does approve one, it will most likely be either a numeric key pad or a key card reader. As part of the construction, Staff is arranging for the installation of power and a light for the gate.

Both the Board and Traffic & Safety Committee feel this is a worthy project and hope homeowners agree.

### GARIBALDI & MANTA GATES TO HAVE SPEED BUMPS INSTALLED

The Board of Directors has met with the gate equipment contractor to discuss complaints from homeowners involving vehicles entering by tailgating through.

Homeowners are going to have to understand, there is no system that will prevent this from occurring.

The Board has agreed to take the following steps:

- 1. Two speed bumps will be installed on the entry side of both gates. The bumps will be around each kiosk.
- 2. Once the speed bumps are installed, the closing of the gates will be reviewed for faster timing. Other equipment adjustments will also

occur.

The bumps are to keep vehicles from getting a quick jump to tail gate. If these measures are ineffective, the Board will consider the installation of a barrier gate arm in front of the gates. The arm will assist in controlling the number of vehicles passing through the gates.

### STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

The schedule date for street sweeping this month is Monday, July 7.

You are requested to have your vehicles off the streets and out of the parking bays. This will allow the sweeper to do a better job.

### **7:97** Use of Tennis Courts (6-2-97)

- The tennis courts are a community asset. It is expected that they will be used with reasonable care and with consideration for others who use them.
- 2. Court reservations may be made at the Community Center office in person or by phone no sooner than 7:00 PM two days before the playing date. A reservation for Wednesday, for example, can be made any time after 7:00 PM on Monday.
- 3. Reservations are made on a first come, first served basis.
- 4. Reservations on weekdays are made for one hour on the hour. Reservations on week-ends and holidays may be made for one and one half hours for doubles and forty five minutes for singles. Two players in a doubles group may jointly sign up for two hours on week days.
- 5. Doubles play is recommended whenever possible and is the preferred form of play on week-ends.
- 6. Court 1, the racking court, is available for reservation from 8:00 am to 9:00 am on week days and from 8:00 am to 9:30 am on week-ends.
- 7. The Tennis Professional has first call on the use of Court 1 on Mondays and Fridays from 9:00 AM to Noon and on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 2:00 PM to 5:00 PM. All other time on the racking court is available for thirty minute periods on a first come, first served basis with sign up required on the daily n-in sheet.
- 8. Courts must be relinquished when scheduled times are up and someone is waiting for the court.
- 9. The following holidays are scheduled in the same manner as week-ends: New Years Day, Presidents Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and the day after. The Center is closed on Christmas.
- 10. Only current residents may make court reservations and they can make only one reservation on any single day.
- 11. If a court is not occupied within ten minutes after the scheduled time, it is automatically opened until the next scheduled time on a first come, first served basis for any waiting players.
- 12. A player who fails to appear after reserving a court, or who doesn't call or come to the office to cancel the reservation, may lose the privilege of making reservations for up to one month.
- 13. Players who have made reservations are required to sign in on the tennis reservation sheet noting the time and initialing in the space provided. Failure to sign may result in forfeiting the court.
- 14. All players are expected to conform to tennis etiquette at all times and to observe the posted tennis rules.
- ... Players are expected to wear appropriate tennis clothing. Tennis shoes or the equivalent are required.
- 16. Children under 12 years of age are not permitted on the courts unless accompanied and supervised by an adult.

- 17. Food and beverages are not permitted on the tennis courts. Bottled water is permitted.
- 18. The tennis courts are to be used for tennis only. Other games, skates, in-line skates or skateboards are not permitted.
- 19. The Tennis Sub-Committee of the Recreation Committee is responsible for communicating with the General Manager regarding tennis court conditions, problems and tennis activities. Tournaments, Exhibitions and other Association approved tennis activities are scheduled through the General Manager.
- 20. Tennis Clinics, group instruction and organized play must be approved in advance by the General Manager. These activities must be open to all residents. Individual residents may use their scheduled time for individual playing lessons.
- 21. Players will be held responsible for any damaged they cause to the courts.

### **5201** Purpose of the Communication Committee (06-18-97)

eashore News, as a means of keeping residents well informed of community activities, both recreational and administrative, and to encourage active participation in such activities.

The secondary purpose is to increase communications to the membership by producing an information guide and flyers, or by utilizing other approved media vehicles when available.

### **5202 Duties of the Committee** (06-18-97)

The committee meets once a month, after the deadline on the 17th of each month (See Rule 5223.) to discuss committee business and to approve/disapprove submissions to the Seashore News.

### **5203** Organization of the Committee (06-18-97)

The committee is composed of members of Niguel Shores Community Association. A Board member shall be assigned as liaison. The number of members is determined by the Chairperson but shall be no fewer than three. A quorum consists of a majority of the members of the committee.

### **5204** Qualifications for Membership (06-30-92)

To qualify for membership, a person must be a member of the Niguel Shores Community Association and should have some experience in the field of journalism, teaching, English literature or graphic arts, should be familiar with the basic rules of grammar and punctuation and should be a good speller. An aptitude for writing would also be useful.

### 15 Appointment to the Communication Committee (06-18-97)

based on Board policy, the committee Chairpersons is appointed by the Board of Directors. Other members of the committee are nominated from volunteers or chosen by invitation by majority vote of the committee and shall be subject to confirmation by the Board of Directors.

### **5221 POLICY** (06-18-97)

The Seashore News shall not be used as an instrument for promoting the point of view of individuals or organizations expressing a preference regarding political, religious, ethnic, or racial issues.

### **5222 News Articles, Announcements and Reports** (06-18-97)

News articles, announcements and reports are limited to: those of the NSCA Board; NSCA Club announcements and reports; news of community activities; manager reports; and items of interest about Dana Niguel Branch Library. Articles may be submitted only by residents or owners, on forms supplied by the office and are limited to 250 words. See Rule 5221.

Submissions must include the writer's name and telephone number. Typewritten material is preferred, but an item that is handwriting is acceptable if it is neat and legible. The committee members read each item to assure that the subject is acceptable, the language is clear and grammatically correct and that it does not exceed the 250 word limitation. An attempt will be made to discuss questionable articles with the writers before approval.

### **5223** Deadline for Submissions (06-18-97)

intended that the Seashore News be distributed on or before the first of each month. Therefore, the submission deadline is the 17th of the proceeding month. Late submissions will be accepted only if the chairmperson determines that the article is important and that it will not delay publication.

### **5224 Voice of the People** (06-18-97)

Letters to "Voice of the People" are restricted to residents and owners of Niguel Shores property on subject of general interest to the community. Writers may submit letters for consideration for publication with the understanding that opinions contained in letters that are published are those of the writers, not necessarily of the committee. Letters which, in the opinion of the committee or Board of Directors, may invade the privacy of other individuals, subject the Association to potential liability, or otherwise be in bad taste, will not be published. The writers' address and phone number must accompany their letters and only the names of authors will be published with their letters. Letters are limited to 200 words. See 5221.

### **5225 Neighborhood Ads** (06-18-97)

Only residents or owners of Niguel Shores property may submit ads for publication in the Seashore News. No ads are allowed which offer any type of service. No one may act as agent for another person or company. No commercial products may be advertised.

#### CATEGORIES OF ACCEPTABLE ADS:

- 1. Personal goods held for personal use (not commercial products).
- 2. Real property including rental of same.
- 3. Personal announcements -- in accordance with Rule 5221.

Length of ads is limited to 30 words including phone number. There is a charge for ads perferably check payable to NSCA. See office for current advertising rate. All ads must be submitted on or with a <u>signed form</u> supplied by the office. All ads are read and approved or disapproved by the committee.

### **5227 Production** (06-18-97)

Submissions intended for publication are edited and proofread by the committee and finished copy is then prepared by staff. Copies of the Seashore News are printed commercially and are collated and stapled by NSCA volunteers.

#### **5228 Distribution** (06-18-97)

The Niguel Shores area is divided into nine districts and the Seashore News is delivered to an area coordinator in each district who maintains a team to deliver the Seashore News to each house, and if possible, out of sight from the street. Postal laws prevent placing unmailed issues of the Seashore News in mailboxes. Extra copies are mialed to homeowenrs living outside Niguel Shores; the remiaing issues are kept in the office for approximately a month.

No other material shall be distributed with the Seashore News except with the approval of the Board.

#### **5229 Files** (06-18-97)

The staff maintains a file for three months of the original articles submitted by contributors. One copy of each issues of the Seashore News shall be kept in a permanent file in the Niguel Shores office. Extra copies of back issues will be disposed of after three months.

### **5241 Bulletin Board Ads** (06-18-97)

A bulletin board, maintained by the staff is available without charge to residents and owners for advertising their personal and real property, business or services. Ads are to be written on 3x5 cards available in office. Business cards may be attached. All 3x5 cards must included the name and phone number of the resident. Display of ads is limited to one month. Extension will be granted <u>upon request</u> if space is available.

### **5242 Poster Boards** (06-18-97)

The poster boards in approved locations are available to NSCA committees and organizations without charge to publicize activities and events. They are not available to individuals or private groups. The office staff will supply poster materials, and may help with the preparation of posters on request. They will also approve/disapprove posters and coordinate posting dates in case of conflict.

### **5243** Handbook (06-18-97)

The NSCA handbook, "Your Information Guide", provides information for owners and residents on the personal and financial responsibilities of residency in Niguel Shores. The committee is responsible for the preparation of the contents and physical make-up of the Guide. An area map is included as well as a directory of emergency services, utilities, schools, etc. Current copies are presented to all new owners or residents of Niguel Shores without charge as they register. The Guide is distributed without charge to present owners or residents only upon request.

### **5251 Budget** (06-18-97)

The Communication Committee and office staff prepare an estimate of yearly costs they reccomend be included in the proposed budget for the publication of the Seashore News which must be approved, afterreview by the Finance Committee, by the Board of Directors.
