GATE FOBS AND CARDS

To the residents who have experienced sporadic problems with their pedestrian gate access cards or fobs, thank you for your patience during this trying time. If you discover that your gate card or fob is not working properly, please call or come by the office and we will resolve the problem for you.

NSCA CLUB, COMMITTEE AND PERSONAL PARTY REQUESTS FOR MPR SET-UPS

The maintenance staff provides furniture set-up for most multi-purpose room community activities and personal parties. Since the staff has pre-assigned daily duties, it is absolutely necessary that you submit a set-up diagram on the *MPR Set Up Request* form that is available at the office.

Any special instructions, as well as contact information, should be provided at least 72 hours in advance of weekday events and seven days prior to a weekend event in order to include your requirements on the daily schedule. Failure to provide this information in the required time frame or on the proper form could result in our inability to accommodate your needs.

STREET SWEEPING

Clean Street sweeps the NSCA streets on the first Monday of each month between the hours of 7:00 am and 2:00 pm. Just a reminder - you should remove your vehicles from the street during these times in order for the job to be done properly. Thanks for your cooperation.

SKATEBOARDS, RAZOR SCOOTERS, SKATES AND MOTORIZED SKATEBOARDS

Skateboarding, roller/inline skates and razor scooters are prohibited on the roads within Niguel Shores, within the Community Center complex, the Community Center parking lot and the beach parking lot. The rule does not apply on cul-de-sacs less than 500 feet long.

Skateboard ramps are not permitted to be placed or used on sidewalks or through streets, or on cul-desacs more than 500 feet long or in the Community Center complex, Community Center parking lot or the beach parking lot.

Motorized skateboards are prohibited within NSCA on all sidewalks, roadways or any other common area within Niguel Shores. The NSCA Rules make no exceptions whatsoever for motorized skateboards.

In the interest of preventing an accident, parents should warn their children not to play on their bicycles in the vicinity of the Mariner Entry gate area, around the Community Center complex, Community Center parking lot or the beach parking lot. It is especially dangerous for children to ride their bicycles (or skateboards) at the intersection of Mariner and Niguel Shores Drive. Entering vehicles do not stop at this intersection and could hit and seriously injure a child playing in the street. As dangerous as these areas are, it seems to be a daily occurrence in the late afternoons for pre-teen and young teens to play on their skateboards in and around the main entry and Community Center.

We ask that parents talk to their children about the potential risks of playing in unsafe areas.



LANDSCAPE

A reminder to each homeowner that everyone is responsible for getting rid of weeds in their driveways. Maintenance of the common area landscaping continues on schedule.



TRAFFIC AND SAFETY

- 1. Be EXTREMELY careful as you exit the community via Mariner Drive, but especially on weekday mornings as the gate officers are rejecting a high number of people trying to enter without valid authorization. To exit, they swing around behind the gatehouse and merge into the exit lane without regard to a resident who may be leaving at the same time.
- 2. Safety reminders:
- a. All bicycle riders under the age of 18 MUST wear an approved safety helmet, it is the law.
- b. When going to the beach or elsewhere about the community, remember the Vehicle Code prohibits ANYONE from riding in the back of pickup truck. This is a very dangerous practice.
- 3. Dogs off the leash: Residents and security patrol report that some people continue to walk their dogs off the leash in the community. This is a dangerous practice and against the law.

SHORES BLOTTER

A residential burglary occurs every 15 seconds. Burglaries can be prevented by:

- Locking all doors and windows before you leave or go to bed.
- Leaving lights on and a radio playing when you go out.
- Keeping your garage door closed and locked.
- Not allowing daily deliveries to accumulate while you are gone.
