SUBJECT: COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION PROPOSED RE-LANDSCAPING PROCEDURES

Date: Tuesday, January 8, 1980, 8 P.M. - Multi-Purpose Room, Community Center

Of special interest to all property owners residing in the community, an important meeting in the Multi-Purpose Room at the Community Center has been scheduled on January 8, 1980 at 8 P.M. so that the Community Association can present a program on both enforcing the CC & R's regarding trees creating view blockage, tree removal due to sidewalks, curbs, driveways, streets, walkways damage caused by tree roots and a general plan on removing selected trees and replacement thereof with the types of landscaping as necessary throughout the community. In addition, there exists a potential liability for trees or bushes falling across highways or private property including residences. This meeting is of vital importance to all and we urge all residents to attend so that they can hear first hand our problems, recommended solutions and forthcoming plans. We need your input, either "pro" or "con" on this vital subject.

As you know, our master CC & R's (Article VII, Section I, beginning on Page 19, Line 31, and quoted herein "In any event, the Architectural Committee shall have the right to require any Member to remove, trim, top, or prune any shrub, tree, or hedge which such committee reasonably believes impedes the view of any Lot.") prohibits unreasonable view blockages. In addition, the Architectural Review Committee is specifically empowered to require the trimming or removal of trees or other plantings which the Architectural Review Committee believes interfer with views in an unreasonable manner; a provision which has recently been upheld by a court decision. The word "unreasonable" is purposely not defined in the CC & R's in order to allow some discretion in the implementation and enforcement of the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. The Architectural Review Committee has published rules and regulations to limit building heights, lateral view obstructions, etc. With regard to trees and other plantings, the Architectural Review Committee previously approved procedures are reproduced below for your information and a new Landscape and Maintenance Committee Re-Landscaping Procedure is proposed.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE'S PROCEDURE FOR VIEW BLOCKAGE ELIMINATION

COMMON AREAS:

- 1. Trees and other plantings in common areas are to be spaced and kept trimmed so that residents' views are not unreasonably obstructed and avoid any "hedge" effect. On slope areas where continuous trimming is required to eliminate unreasonable view blockage, removal will be in order.
- 2. Trees along Atlantic Drive, Niguel Shores Drive, Mariner Drive, Leeward Drive, Periwinkle Drive, Windward Drive, and Ports of Call are to be preserved wherever possible, with removal permitted only with specific (tree by tree) consent of a majority of the Architectural Review Committee.

ALL OTHER AREAS:

- 1. Trees on private property at pad level are limited to the height of the building, unless higher growth does not result in view blockage.
- 2. Trees on slopes and elsewhere must be properly trimmed and spaced to eliminate any "hedge" effect. The exception will be, where height limitations are acceptable, the privacy of residents at the lower level will be protected. In no cases will a tree be allowed to grow to a height in excess of the height of the bank or slope unless spacing and/or trimming up from the bottom of the tree will alleviate the view obstruction on a reasonable basis. Where trimming does not provide reasonable relief, the subject property owner will be required to remove these trees.
- 3. In areas where a lateral view obstruction is involved, plantings at pad level are to be limited to a height of 3' (three feet), or no higher than side yard fencing or walls at the view end of the house, exceptions must be submitted to and approved by the Architectural Review Committee.

LANDSCAPE AND MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE GENERAL RE-LANDSCAPING PROCEDURE:

- 1. Re-landscaping requirements will be coordinated with the activity of the Architectural and other committees and be accomplished in an expeditious manner.
- 2. Each area of the community will be viewed as a unit and re-landscaped in accordance with specific plans developed by the Landscape and Maintenance Committee in consultation with the landscaping contractor. Each area will also be viewed as a component of the total community in order that a total environment of continuity will be maintained.
- 3. Replacement of trees removed will be made, as necessary, with plantings selected to require minimum maintenance and view obstruction, yet continue the attractive appearance of Niguel Shores. Representatives of such plantings are Carrotwood trees, Oleander trees, Bottlebrush and Brazilian Pepper trees. Slope considerations will include Oleander, Escallonia, and Xylosma. Ground covers available for selection include Hann's Ivy, Honeysuckle, Coyote Bush, Tacoma Capensis (orange flower) and Ceanothus Horizontalic (blue flower). The above are representative and not a complete listing of all choices available.
- 4. Landscaping and Maintenance Committee will continue its responsibilities with tree problems resulting in damage (actual or potential) to streets, driveways, sidewalks, curbs and other community improvements. Any re-landscaping required will be carried out within the policy guidelines enumerated above.

FROM THE HELM

Dear Residents:

The Board has approved the following:

- 1. The budget for 1980 will be \$949,020.00. The assessment will be \$82.50 per house per month, payable quarterly at \$247.50 effective January, 1980.
- 2. Three contracts were awarded Comprehensive Landscaping per Converse, Ward, Davis and Dixon specification and recommendation. Converse approved one change at the toe of Windjammer slope, a 4-inch line (instead of 3-inch) to run into existing vault and 8-inch line to Atlantic to a storm drain. The contracts were the following:
 - a. Install French drain at the toe of Nauticus slope along Niguel Shores Drive. This drain has just been completed.
 - b. Install French drain and two vaults with pumps at the toe of Windjammer slope.
 - c. Install French drain at Breakers Isle.

3. Security

- a. The issuance of decals will be limited to 4 consecutive weekends.

 Absentee owners have been notified by mail. A \$15.00 late charge
 per vehicle for issuance of stickers will be assessed unless prior
 written arrangements are made through N.S.C.A. Office at 33654 Niguel
 Shores Road and approved by the General Manager before the 4-week
 period has ended.
- b. All renters will be charged \$25.00 per set for each sticker or sticker and key card, refundable on return of each item.
- c. Non-resident owners whose property is rented to others will be limited to no more than two stickers.
- 4. The purchase of an artificial Christmas tree for which the Men's Club will pay half. Thanks again for the outstanding support the Men's Club has given to N.S.C.A.

The next monthly Board meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 8, at 8 P.M. in the multi-purpose room of the Community Center. The agenda will include approval of minutes of the previous meeting, Board business and actions, General Manager's report, Committee reports and an open session. Homeowners input will be encouraged. At this meeting the committees will be presenting a tree removal and replacement policy.

TAKE THE NECESSARY PRECAUTIONS

With wood stoves and fireplaces enjoying a revival, several long forgotton hazards have been introduced into our modern homes. Of prime concern in our area is the fact that we have had long hot dry spells and every home in our area has a very very dry wood shingle roof. One hot spark from a careless resident could set the whole area on fire. During and after the Christmas holiday season, people utilizing fireplaces to burn gift wrappings, Christmas trees and old greens have caused many serious fires when they failed to take or make adequate arrangements. Burning of this material without a spark arrestor installed could result in sparks flying from chimneys. Actually, every home should have a spark arrestor on the chimney and they can be bought or made from fine gauge galvanized wire mesh.... and fastened over the ope of the chimney.

In addition, adequate ventilation is important to prevent the buildup of carbon monoxide from home fires. Wood smoke and fumes can also cause allergic symptoms in some people, and burning newspapers and magazines printed with black ink can release large amounts of lead in the air. Use kindling instead.

Always make sure the damper is opened before lighting a fire and have the flue checked periodically to be sure it's free of accomulations of tar. If you use artificial logs, follow the directions: use only one log at a time and don't add them to an existing fire made from wood or other material. Use fireproof mittens to add wood, keep a screen in front of the fire, and keep a pail of sand, water or a chemical fire extinguisher nearby. Small children should never be left unattended near a fire.







THE HAZARDS OF DOGS:



Inquires have been received from several residents as to possibility of recycling glass. We have been informed by our recycler that the recycle value of glass is so low that he cannot handle it profitably at this time. The increased cost of truck fuel, manpower costs, etc., simply outweigh the salvage value of the glass delivered to the glass companies. In addition, in order to receive the highest price, clear glass and colored glass must be kept separate. This would be an almost impossible task in a community the size of Niguel Shores.

It has been reported that an adult with a truck has been seen picking up papers placed at the curb for our recycler. These unauthorized pickups occur on Monday mornings, before our recycler arrives in our community, usually after 2 P.M.

If anyone stops at your home to pick up papers before 2 P.M. please endeavor to get a license number, and we will follow up to identify this individual. The only truck authorized to pick up your papers belongs to D & J Recyclers. Sometimes this company uses a supplementary truck when pickups are unusually large, but his truck picks up all papers on the street, not just part of them as this unauthorized person has been doing.

Between pickup dates, just stash your papers in your garage. Please DO NOT throw them in with your trash. We will all benefit. Thank you.
