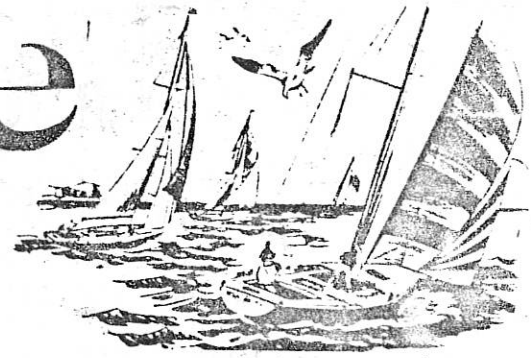

RECENT BOARD ACTIONS

A new traffic control system is in the offing. The Board has voted to award the contract for a pilot installation of motorized barricades at the Shores Gate. The entry barricade will be activated by a programmable card reader and card. This installation will allow us to eliminate one guard and provide for 24-hour exit and entry at that gate. It should also help us determine whether we wish to equip other gates with the same system. The Gate Committee, under the chairmanship of Jane Lutz, has been congratulated for a job well done.

Slope and drainage projects will have cost the community about \$80,000 this year. As usual, unforeseen problems continue to arise and are promptly taken care of.

The Men's Club has received the Board's appreciation for assistance with two projects:

1. Sharing half of the cost (\$1,050) of a storm roof over the maintenance area
2. Repainting the Mariner Gate guard shack by Dale Baltimore and Merle Zeigner.

As the money for this great work comes from the recycling program, a big thank you is due the residents who go to the little extra trouble of saving their papers and aluminum. Imagine how much could be done for our community if the other 50% of the residents were as thoughtful and caring.

Spa Denizens will have cause to rejoice over the newly refurbished jacuzzi.

The December 9th Board meeting saw more people at the Board table than in the audience (6). A revised meeting format is being considered.

RECYCLING PROGRAM

JANUARY pickup of paper for recycling will be the 12th and 26th.

Due to a mix-up in dates during December, it was necessary for our recycler to make two extra trips through our community, so that, in effect, paper was picked up every Monday except the first. Hereafter, he will return to the regular SECOND AND FOURTH MONDAY OF EACH MONTH.

At presstime, we do not have complete information on results for December. However, we will supply a complete summarization of 1980 results of our recycling efforts in the February Seashore News.

Our new stainless steel refrigerator for the Community Center kitchen has been installed and the old one relegated to the maintenance area for use of the Association employees. The refrigerator cost \$1,448.90, which included three extra shelves and shipping charges from the factory. It took the proceeds from the sale of 58 tons of salvaged paper to pay for this equipment, but it is worth it to have this refrigerator available for the use of the Women's Club luncheons and the Pot Luck groups, as well as the Men's Club and others who use the community facilities. The available space makes it possible to accommodate many salads and chilled desserts with ease.

Using funds from the recycling program, we employed a cleaning service in December to give our kitchen a good, thorough cleanup. The electric stove, along with its two ovens was cleaned, perhaps for the first time in eight years. The cost for this service was \$35 and we have ordered a repeat for the first week of January. After that, we hope that our maintenance people will be able to take over again.

The new kitchen sink and disposal will be handled in 1981. We have also ordered an additional electric stapler for the use of the Seashore News staff for stapling the monthly Seashore News pages together. This will cost approximately \$75.

According to a recent article in Newsweek Magazine,

"Recycling is growing fast. In the last eight years, thousands of civic groups and individual collectors have earned over \$250 million through recycling. And recycling has added an estimated 15,000 new jobs to the economy - jobs that didn't previously exist. By returning use aluminum cans for recycling, Americans are really helping to save energy."

Alcoa says that every time an aluminum can is recycled, they save 95 percent of the energy needed to make new metal from bauxite.

"Since 1972 the aluminum industry has received over 1.5 billion pounds of used aluminum beverage cans for recycling. By putting those cans back to work, enough energy was conserved last year alone to meet the residential needs of a city like Pittsburg, Pennsylvania for over a year. And recycling also helps Alcoa reduce its consumption of coal and bauxite, both valuable natural resources."

Again, thank you to all those Niguel Shores residents who participate in our recycling program, and a warm "Welcome" to all new ones. Tell your neighbors they not realize the enormity of the recycling movement. We need all the paper and aluminum we can get.

SELF DEFENSE

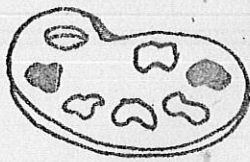

- February 11: Wines of the world, a quick look at the major wine producing regions in the northern and southern hemispheres. Wine tasting.

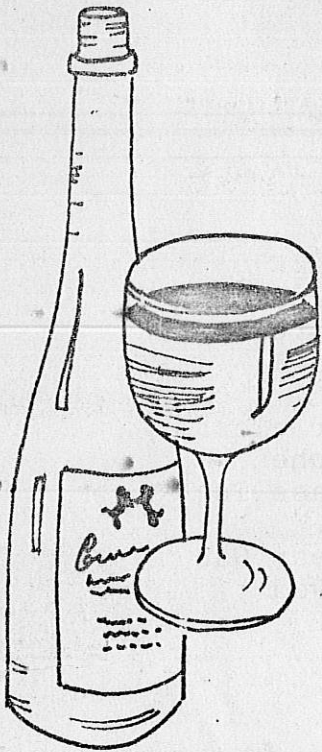
