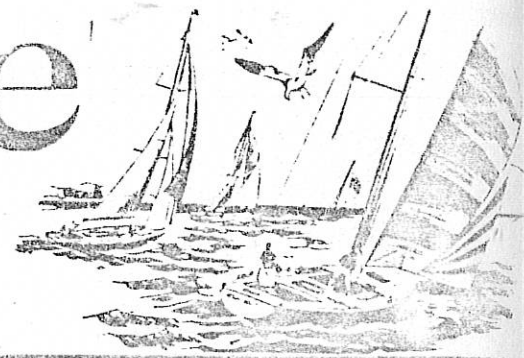

MANAGER'S REPORT

Dear Members,

Certain staff changes have occurred during February of 1981, which I am sure will be of interest to you. As I indicated in last month's newsletter, the position of Recreation/Activity Director for the Association was vacant. I am pleased to announce that the Association has recently employed Kim Gabrielson to fill this position. Kim comes to us with considerable recreation related background. She has already met many of you. Members who have not met Kim are invited to stop by the office and do so.

One of the first projects that our new Recreation/Activity Director has taken on is to become familiar with the facilities and the prior year's activities and to begin to formulate plans relative to the summer day camps and the swimming pool operations, for not only the summer but a brief program for the Easter vacation. Secondly, she is busy investigating classes and activities normally conducted in the multi-purpose room, such as the Saturday movies and self-defense. At the same time, the first quarter 1981 community activity is being planned, the Pancake Breakfast on Sunday, March 29, 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Expected cost for this community get-together will be \$1.00 per person. Thanks to Kim's input in suggesting this program and the endorsement of the Recreation Committee, the community function has all the ingredients for a successful general membership get-together. Besides, not even Col. Sanders can feed you for a dollar.

In addition to the above, Kim's schedule, starting in mid-March, will include a Saturday recreation and activity program which will be geared for the youth and young adult members in our community. This activity day will fit in with the primary goal of our new Recreation/Activity Director to begin to round out as quickly as possible a recreation/activity program which has some interest for all members. Let's all give Kim our support and best wishes.

A new addition to our staff to fill a newly-created position of Administrative Assistant to the General Manager is Francie Werner. Francie brings with her to this new assignment considerable previous association management experience and skills. With her help and input, I will have more time to attend to many of the finer points of management. Overall, the management and staff response to members' requests, complaints and inquiries should be more prompt and complete. Mrs. Werner and I have worked together previously and, therefore, I am well acquainted with her ability and am anxious for her assistance and support. As quickly as possible, and as soon as Mrs. Werner has familiarized herself with this particular Association, she will be in a position to make many administrative decisions necessary to standardize office procedures and staff functions. Let's welcome our new Office Manager and also extend to her our best wishes.


The South Coast County Water District Water Reclamation Project, discussed at previous Board of Director's meetings, was again the subject of discussion at the February 10, 1981, meeting. Raymond C. Miller, the General Manager of the District, and other members of his staff and/or consultants, explained the mechanics of constructing a reclaimed water (retrofit) system, as well as financing alternatives that the District felt might be beneficial to NSCA in order to make modifications to our irrigation system necessary to make it possible for the Association to use reclaimed water for irrigation purposes. SCCWD is moving ahead with the master system. The State has issued the District a concept approval letter and has urged the District to move ahead with final designs. AVCO Community Developers, a major participant in the project, is advancing funds to the District to facilitate prompt action. For those of you who may not be aware, considerable publicity and advice of experts has been considered which indicates that by 1985 the Southern California area may expect a shortage of water. As in the past, when a water shortage occurs, water for washing cars, landscaping, and other non-essential uses is either restricted or not permitted. Should this shortage come to pass, and should the Association not become a user of reclaimed water, much, if not all of the community area's landscaping might suffer. It has been suggested to the Board that NSCA consider forming a committee composed of members of the Board, as well as other interested citizens/members, to work with the staff and Board of SCCWD to explore in detail the options open to NSCA. Needless to say, a project of this magnitude must be thoroughly investigated, presented to the membership and acted upon promptly lest NSCA find itself wishing it had properly planned for the future. Any member who can make time available to participate on a committee for review of this project should contact the Community Center office and leave their name so that they might be contacted when and if such a committee is formed.

Tree view blockage complaints received in recent months have been brought to the attention of members who are in violation. For the most part, members so notified have cooperated. Unfortunately, however, a few members have yet to comply and the Architectural Review Committee and the Association staff are following up on those view blockages remaining. Suffice to say, most members of NSCA are well aware by now of the tree height and related regulations. It would seem prudent and cost effective to both the member and the Association if members would police their own property and, when needed, trim their trees. Additionally, in the case of eucalyptus trees, when a tree is trimmed it is recommended that the trimming be substantial enough so that the quick rebirth of growth on a trimmed tree will not immediately exceed the acceptable heights and again become the object of view blockage of fellow members. An annual tree trimming may be necessary in order to preclude the necessity of a fellow member to complain; the Architectural Review Committee involvement in seeking compliance by letters and, ultimately, the need for future and further reminders, such as herein, by staff and/or the Board of Directors. The consideration by a member for his fellow members' rights is evidenced by compliance with such general Association policies as conformance to the tree view blockage guidelines.

RECYCLING PROGRAM

MARCH pickup dates for newspapers to be recycled will be:

March 9 and March 23

There was no pickup of paper on February 9 because our recycler refused to make the trip due to imminent rain. Actually, the day was clear until late afternoon, but because rain was falling at Lake Forest where our recycler has his plant, we had no pickup. Because many people placed their papers out for pickup, much of our paper was taken away by the Solag Disposal people on Tuesday.

Actually, the loss of the recyclable paper was a greater disappointment than the loss of the paper salvage value. Because Mr. Leensvaart claims that he has been losing money handling our paper salvage, he has reduced our purchase price to \$10.00 per ton, and even made it retroactive to the pickup two weeks prior to the notification.

Not only are we faced with the \$15.00 per ton reduction in salvage value, but we have also been notified that glossy paper such as slick magazines, brochures, etc., are not acceptable in the future. This was brought about by a change in the market for recyclable paper. Therefore, our tonnage will be lower as well - - unless we get out and hustle.

By hustling, I mean try to enlist your neighbors who have not been involved in this program in the past. It's easy to see who participates simply by looking around the neighborhood on pickup day. Fewer than half of our residents now participate in the recycling program, and it really shouldn't be difficult to generate a little more support, thus replacing the lost weight from the elimination of magazines and brochures with more newspapers, Pennysavers, telephone books (pages removed from the glued backing and covers), and similar publications.

Another area where much improvement can be made is in the saving of waste aluminum. We have about 950 residences in this community. About every five weeks we accumulate about 150 pounds of aluminum at the collection bin next to the Community Center. This amounts to approximately 1/8 pound average per residence per month. Two and one-half beverage cans weigh about 1/8 pound. This community could easily generate one pound per residence average per month if all would save and deposit their waste aluminum at our collection point. Instead of \$45 to \$50 per pickup, we could be collecting \$250 per month from aluminum salvage alone. So, let's start being more careful and retain those pieces of scrap aluminum foil, Stouffer's frozen food dishes, frozen pie plates and, of course, those many, many beverage cans. Also, it will help save space in our bin if you will crush the cans and other bulky items before depositing in the bin. Step on the cans with a heavy foot or pound them down with a hammer. When depositing your aluminum in the bin, please dump the aluminum from the bags and toss the empty bag into the Community Club House trash bin right next to the aluminum bin. That will also be a big help.

TO SUMMARIZE THE NEW RULES FOR PAPER SALVAGE: SAVE ONLY NEWSPAPERS AND PUBLICATIONS PRINTED ON THE SAME TYPE PAPER.

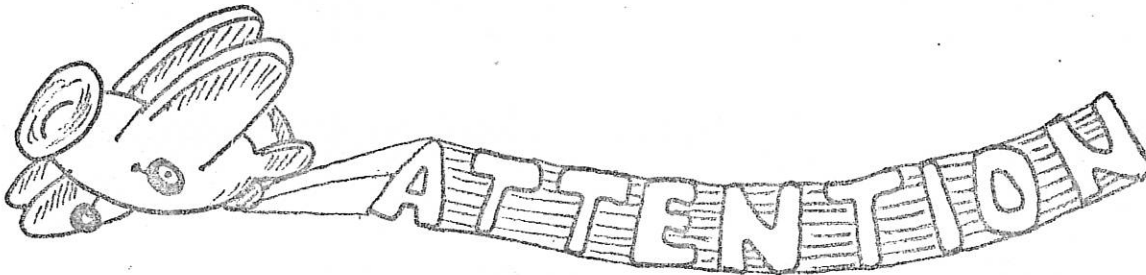
If rain is forecast for pickup Monday, hold the paper in your garage until the next sunny pickup Monday. If you put out

your paper and no pickup is made, please return the paper to your garage and hold it until the next pickup. Above all, don't get discouraged because of the lowered salvage value. We are still performing a valuable patriotic service to our country and our own community. And something will turn up along the way - perhaps another salvage firm would like our business. Who knows???

Anyone interested in joining our program may call the Community Center office.

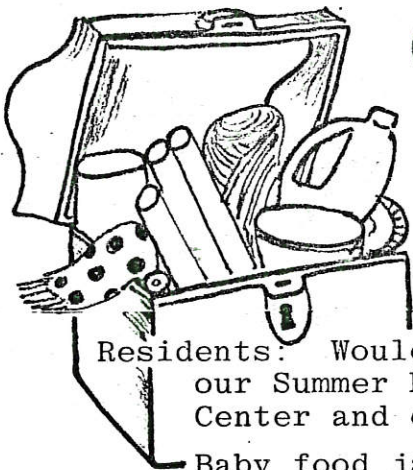

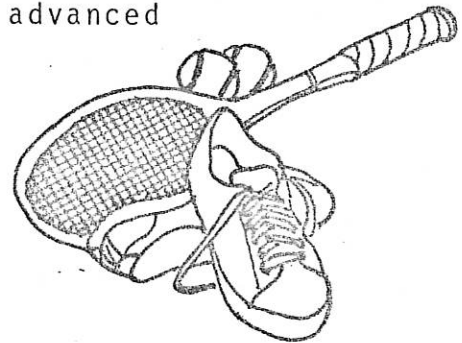
Adult & Jr. Tennis Clinics

Who hasn't been there? Your partner calls a ball out--you clearly see it good--what to do? According to the USTA "Code" #17.

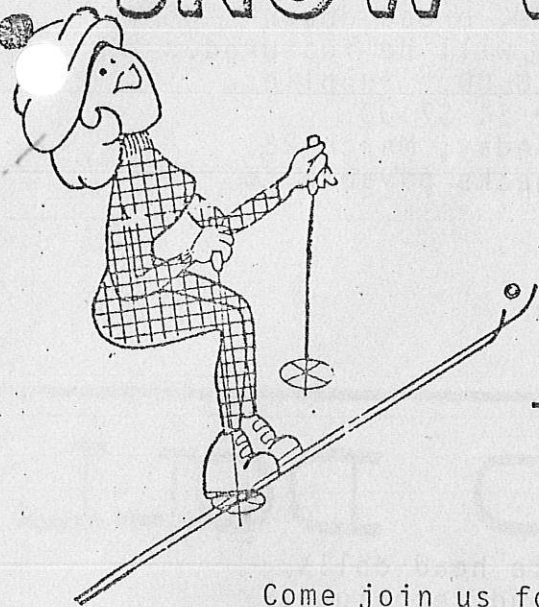

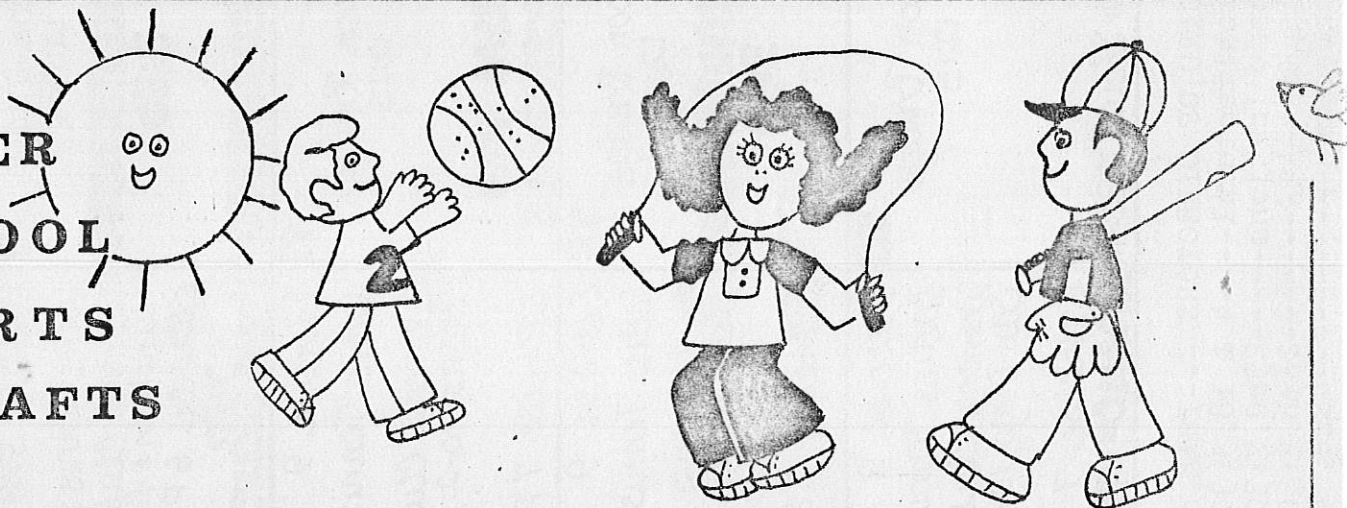
