OUTSTANDING PROGRAM QUALITY CONTINUES AT MENS CLUB

Over the last several years the programs of the Mens Club have been of increasing high quality. Green received his M.A. and Ph.D. in engineering at Washington State University in 1961-65., and has worked for JPL since 1967. He has been a team member of many of the JPL successes since that time. JPL is an operating division of the California Institute of Technology (Cal-Tech).

The primary roles of JPL include: 1) exploration of the earth and solar system; 2) design and operation of the global Deep Space Tracking Network; and 3) scientific and engineering research and support of other pressing national needs, i.e. development of concepts and know-how for such things as "smart bombs," patriot missiles, SDI, etc.

In cooperation with NASA, JPL managed missions to the moon, Mars, Venus, Mercury, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune.

The daunting responsibility for speakers is in the capable hands of Vice President Don Ellis for the next eleven months.


