# Manager's Report

Recently we have had several reports from residents about individuals going door to door in the community either soliciting funds for some organization or else handbilling the area with fliers advertising some local business. Since both of these activities are against the Association's rules and regulations we stop these individuals as soon as we receive a call and then notify either the organization or the business informing them of our rules. In order to continue this, we need your help. If any individual rings your doorbell soliciting funds or if a flier is placed on your door, we ask that you notify the Association Office as soon as possible so that we can put a stop to it. If a flier is put on your door, please let us have it so that we can present some type of evidence to the person doing it.

For many of you who have been utilizing the recreational facilities during the past several weeks, you will have noticed, that both the dressing rooms in the Ladies and Men's room have been tiled and repainted and it is really a great improvement. Anyone seeing any type of vandalism being done in the areas are urged to let us know as soon as possible. This improvement cost money - your money, so we want it to last as long as possible.

<u>WATER DIVERSION</u>. The Board of Directors has also approved a contract for the water diversion at the intersection of Garibaldi and Gourami Bay. This work should be commencing shortly, so we ask the indulgence of the residents in this area while the work is in progress.

BEACH PARKING AREA. The first two rows of the Beach Parking Lot are reserved for residents only who have a valid decal or a 90 day pass. Daily passes are not permitted in the first two rows.

Vehicles that do not display a decal, 90 day pass or a daily pass and are parked in the Beach Parking Lot will be issued "tow-away" notices or warnings. The second "tow-away notice" will result in the vehicle being towed away.

STREET SIGN PAINTING. We would like to thank the Men's Club volunteers who are in the process of painting our street signs. The gold lettering really stands out and is a great help in locating the various streets in our community at night by guests.

Dear Resident:

On the recommendation of the Security Committee, the Board of Directors for the Niguel Shores Community Association at their meeting on March 11, 1980, adopted the following rules regarding the decaling of vehicles:

- 1. That effective April 15, 1980 there shall be an additional penalty of \$50.00 per vehicle for all vehicles not properly decaled. This amount is in addition to any other fees assessed previously. To be properly registered a vehicle must have a current decal or a 90-day pass.
- 2. That all vehicles newly acquired by a resident must be registered within 15 days of acquisition.
- 3. That prior to April 15, 1980 all vehicles not properly registered be stopped by a guard, the old decal number noted and the driver requested to have the vehicle registered.

Although some of you have filed a letter with the Association requesting a waiver of the original \$15.00 late fee, the Board of Directors feels that by the cut off date of April 15, 1980, sufficient time will have passed for all vehicles to be either issued a new decal or a 90-day pass. It is therefore requested that arrangements be made to obtain either a new decal for your vehicle or that you obtain a 90-day pass for the vehicle.

Registration of vehicles, issuance of decals or 90-day passes can be accomplished at the Community Association Office, Monday thru Friday between the hours of 9 AM and 7 PM.

The Board of Directors for Niguel Shores Community Association (N.S.C.A.), on the recommendation of the Architectural Control Committee (ACC) approved the hiring of a professional consulting architect to advise the ACC on a fee schedule basis. This consulting architect shall be a professional and registered architect, employed by the Association.

The consulting architect shall advise the Architectural Control Committee and review all submittals required by the ACC's Regulations, as to their concurrence with N.S.C.A. articles; aesthetic applicability and impact on the community; and, other such information as requested by the Committee. The consulting architect shall make recommendations regarding changes, approvals or disapprovals of submittals to the ACC. The consulting architect will visit the site prior to construction and/or during construction stages as conditions may warrant, but with a final site visit upon completion and prior to final approval.

The consulting architect shall present to the ACC any and all submittals which require an exception to N.S.C.A. policies, for determination of action.

The owner shall make the necessary submittals to the ACC as required by the CC&R's. Illustrative of the projects requiring prior approval are the following:

- 1. New building construction;
- 2. Additions to and/or remodels of existing building;
- 3. New landscaping or re-landscaping of existing properties when County Building Permit is required;
- 4. Changes in the exterior colors and/or materials of existing buildings;
- 5. Swimming pools, spas, patio covers, impervious paving materials, walls, fences and demolition of existing structures.

The owner may, and is encouraged, at his option, to submit preliminary designs and drawings to the ACC for pre-submittal review and preliminary indication of conformance to the ACC's Regulations, prior to incurring the cost of detailed architectural or landscape drawings. All submittals shall be submitted in duplicate; one copy will be returned to the owner with noted comments.

## CONSULTING ARCHITECT FEE SCHEDULE

The following fees are an estimate of the cost to be incurred by the Association for the services indicated. The amount billed to individual homeowners will be the actual cost to the Association. All costs incurred by architect will be bourne by the homeowner and the Association will not receive any funds for this service. The Association will collect the fees and pay them to the architect. Individual estimates of cost can be obtained at the time the first set of documents is submitted. Payment of all fees and deposits is required at the time of application with plans.

### KEEP NIGUEL SHORES BEAUTIFUL

In an effort to keep the Niguel Shores Community a beautiful area in which to live, continuous inspection trips are made throughout the community to find problem areas. Most of our problems in trying to keep the community clean is the use of improper containers to hold garbage until it is picked up by the disposal company.

County ordinances require that garbage be set out on street curbs for pick-up in "some form of impervious container" with a lid. Many residents use plastic bags; however, these plastic bags can easily be torn apart by dogs and other roaming animals. As a result, much of the garbage ends up strewn around the streets, sidewalks or else on front lawns before the trash disposal trucks get a chance to pick it up.

Trash is sometimes set out several days before it is scheduled to be picked up and empty containers are sometimes left by the curb several days after pick-up. County ordinances allow only 24 hours before and after scheduled pick-up times to set the containers our and take them in again.

We need to have a more responsible attitude on the part of all residents, in addition to that of absentee homeowners. Absentee homeowners have a responsibility to help keep the community clean by informing their tenants of our rules and the county ordinances.

The Community Association does not have a janitorial service to pick this garbage up and the disposal company does not have the time or the responsibility to collect it if it is not placed in containers properly.

## PROPOSED RECLAIMED WATER SYSTEM FOR IRRIGATION

A proposed reclaimed water system to serve South Laguna - Monarch Bay - Niguel Shores area has come to the attention of the Landscaping/Maintenance Committee and the Board of Directors of our association. Following is the present status of the project as it is being carried on by the South Coast County Water District.

A preliminary study of the feasibility of the project has been completed by Boyle Engineering with funds from a State/Federal grant.

Various methods of financing the project, estimated to cost \$4.2 million, are now being explored. It has been determined that some state funds may be available to finance a portion of the pipeline which must be constructed to transport the water from the Aliso Creek treatment plant to potential consumers. Local share financing will probably have to be accomplished through an assessment district.

AVCO has signified a willingness to participate, the water to be used in the proposed AVCO coastal development.

Reclaimed water would be available to whatever extent it can be utilized in Niguel Shores. The community would have to participate in the pipeline project and be prepared to distribute the water within the community through a system independent of the domestic system. This will require a study of the existing landscape irrigation system to determine the necessary retrofit procedure and costs for comparison to benefits. There is no immediate need for our community to commit itself.

Preliminary studies indicate that substantial benefits can be obtained by the use of reclaimed water in the Niguel Shores Community. While the cost of the water delivered will probably be about the same as domestic water initially, within a five year period the cost will be substantially lower due to the steadily rising costs of imported domestic water and its related energy costs.

Of equal importance is this consideration: Three years ago we experienced a water shortage when drought deprived us of Northern California water. We were spared a restriction in the use of water for irrigation only because the availability of Colorado River water remained unimpaired. When Arizona completes diversion facilities from the Colorado River for use in the Central Arizona Project in 1985, our diversions will be reduced by one half and a drought at that time could result in domestic water rationing. The existance of a local source of reclaimed water would enable us to maintain our landscaped areas and relieve the demand for domestic water.

# ecycling Program

April pickup of newspapers, magazines, brochures, etc., for recycling will be:

#### APRIL 14 and APRIL 28

There is a three weeks interval between the last March pickup and the April 14 pickup.

The pickup day of March 10 caused some concern among our residents because the morning was clear and we had rain in the afternoon. After some consideration our recycler decided to make his regular call, but by that time a number of people had taken their papers in out of the rain, so our results were somewhat below normal. However, the March 24 pickup benefitted proportionately because of a larger than normal amount of paper.

PLEASE REMEMBER: All kinds of paper are wanted, but cardboard and carton material do not qualify. It is, however, permissible to use a carton to contain your papers. Don't forget to save your junk mail, brochures from Robinson's, Bullock's, Ward's, etc., as well as all your magazines - even Playboy!!! Use large grocery bags, cartons, or tie with string or cord. No more loose paper - please. The paper must be rehandled by the recycler several times and loose paper cannot be controlled.

Keep saving your aluminum and deposit in the large bin on the West side of our Community Center in back of the parking lot.

Thanks to everyone who participates in this wonderfully worthwhile recycling program. We have lots of room for more participants. Just save your paper and place it at your front curb before 2 p.m. on pickup days and our recycler will pass by and pick it up, (unless it rains).

We have had some reports that a <u>light blue</u> truck with several men aboard are picking up our papers, and the truck is not identified as "D & J Recyclers". This truck is official, and should soon be properly identified.





More duplicate bridge players, who enjoy friendly competition, are welcome.






#### WE JUST KEEP MOVING!

# Shores Cuisine



For afficionados of strawberries, here is a receipe that can be made year 'round, not just during the strawberry season! Enjoy!

## Dessert

"STRAWBERRY CAKE"

from the kitchen of ELEANOR CORBETT

- 1 pkg. regular white cake mix (ignore instructions on pkg.)
- 1 heaping tsp. baking powder
- 3 tbls. flour
- 4 whole eggs
- 1/2 cup strawberry juice
- \* cup cooking oil
- 1 6 ox. pkg. strawberry Jello (dry)
- 2 10 oz. boxes frozen strawberries, drained. Save juice.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease (or use Pam) 9x13x2 baking dish or pan. Drain berries and save juice. Blend ingredients adding berries last. Bake about 30 minutes or until cake pulls away from side of dish. (Toothpick will never come out clean because of moistness of cake)

Use remainder of juice for liquid for frosting. Frost while warm. Cover cake with saran wrap for at least 24 hours before serving. Does not have to be refrigerated. Also makes three 9" layers or 24 cupcakes.

#### Frosting

3/4 cube margarine - whipped until smooth and fluffy
1 lb. powered sugar - add to margarine slowly using enough berry juice to keep
it spreadable.
