# NIGUEL SHORES RESIDENTS WINDANA POINT CITY APPOINTMENTS

From a field of applicants numbering one hundred fifty—four, five Niguel Shores residents were appointed by the new Dana Point City Council to serve on three of the City's Commissions and one Committee.

Those selected are Feggy Bucci for the Cultural Arts Commission; Lynn Dawson for the Flanning Commission; Forrest Owen for the Traffic Improvement Commission; Robert Norton and James Smith for the Economic Development Committee.

Council members said they were pleased and overwhelmed by the number and qualifications of those who applied. All of the volunteers were interviewed personally during the past three weeks.

Mayor Judy Curreri, in announcing the appointments, congratulated all the applicants on their high qualifications, enthusiasm and depths of talent.

### CC&R STRAW FOLL

A total of 65 CC%R Straw Poll Ballots were returned by March 20. It is anticipated that the results will serve as an indicator to the Ad Hoc CC%R Revision Committee. This committee is currently reviewing the "Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions" and will make recommendations to the Board of Directors regarding possible changes.

The results of the straw vote were as follows:

- YES 22 NO 37 1. CC%R changes should require 60% approval of members.
- YES 44 NO 19 2. CC%R changes should require majority approval of members.
- YES 47 NO 11 3. Monetary penalties should be possible for violations of present architecture standards.
- YES 47 NO 12 4. Monetary penalties should be possible for violations of present restrictions on owner's use of property.
- YES 17 NO 26 5. A capital improvement itself should require the approval of 2/3 of the members. (Now only a <u>special assessment</u> for a capital improvement requires 2/3 approval.)
- YES 39 MO 23 6. A capital improvement should require the approval of a majority of the members.
- YES 53 NO 8 7. Arbitration should be required to settle differences between the Association and its members.
- YES 58 NO 0 8. References to the rights of the Developer and Frudential should be eliminated from the CC&Rs.
- YES  $40\,$  ND  $18\,$  9. Maintenance should be defined as restorative rather than preventative.
- YES 58 NO 3 10. The Architecture Committee should not be asked to base their approval on "adequacy of structural design and material" but rather on "suitability of design and material."

The election will be held on May 16, 1989. Ballots and proxy forms will be sent out prior to that date.




