NEW COMPUTER SYSTEM ON THE WAY FOR OFFICE STAFF

The Board of Directors, Finance Committee, and management staff have been looking at various options for new hardware and software. The Board has authorized management to enter final negotiations with Avgar Computer Systems to purchase new hardware and a property management software system.

specifically software is The designed for homeowner's associations and has been in use for over six years. It is believed that the new system will allow management to better able to manage association. of the affairs Management will be able to computerize much more of the information collected, process it and hopefully communicate better with the residents.

When this change occurs in June, the association will sever its relationship with Applied Datametrics. Your July 1 quarterly assessment billing will be issued by Avgar. When you pay the assessment, you will be mailing back to Avgar in the envelope provided.

The office staff asks for your cooperation while they are in transition with the new system. So that staff can input data contained in your tract and lot file, the office will be closed for two to three hours each week day. We expect the process will take approximately two weeks. Signs as to when the office will close will be posted in advance at the community center and Mariner Gate.

Both the Board of Directors and office staff would like to thank you for your anticipated cooperation throughout the transition.

RECREATION COMMITTEE REPORT

At its April 14 meeting, the committee was informed that the Children's play area (tot' lot) equipment was now installed and receiving an enthusiastic welcome from parents and children. was pointed out that there already a problem with adults wanting to play on the new equipment that is intended for young children. The addition of small, separate sandbox is pected to be completed within a few days. The horseshoe pits are now completed and ready for use by adults only.

It is expected that an illustrated lecture on birds in our community will be scheduled late in May or in early June. Another lecture on the impact of the new North American Trade Treaty is now being considered for October or early November.

The Community Census initiated by the committee will continue with a form included in this issue of the Seashore News. To date we have received fewer than 100 returns, so we urge you to take just a moment or two to complete the very brief form and return it to the office.

Plans are again being made for a Summer Camp Program.

The monthly Friday Night at the Movies is continuing as is the twice monthly Country Western/Square Dance class which meets at 7:30 pm on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month.

Because there were not enough people interested in the Alive at 55 Class at this time, plans for this AARP sponsored class will be reconsidered in the Fall. In the meantime, for those interested, some classes are offered through the Capistrano Bay Parks and Recreation District.

Planning is underway for the 4th of July Celebration, the End of Summer Party and the Country Fair later in September.

It is expected that several new members will be added to the committee in May. However, we would welcome any additional people interested in helping with recreation activities in our community.

POOL AREA AND LOCKER ROOMS TO BE CLOSED IN MAY

The pool will be drained in May and refilled with fresh water, then the chemicals will be rebalanced. This is a necessary process every three to four years. Staff will also be servicing the filters and heater.

For approximately two weeks, the pool area will be closed and locked while work is on-going. An outside contractor will be repairing the surface of the pool deck and another will be repairing the stucco around the outside showers. Our maintenance staff will be repainting the locker rooms and cleaning the floor. The men's room will be receiving new lockers.

While all this work is on-going, the spa will be available for resident use.

Signs will be posted at the Community Center as to the specific day the pool area and locker rooms will be closed. We fully intend to have the area re-opened prior to the Memorial Day weekend. We expect to close during the first two weeks in May, however, final details have yet to be worked out.

We hope all the work will flow smoothly so that the pool area and locker rooms are only closed for a minimal amount of time. Thank you for your anticipated cooperation.

TOT LOT RENOVATIONS - WHY USE WOOD MIX?

The office has received several inquiries as to why the sand was removed and wood shavings installed. The following are the reasons:

- 1. This material is recommended for children's safety if they fall off the equipment. It is much softer than sand and absorbs impact.
- 2. This material will compact down, thus meeting the requirement of the Americans with Disabilities Act for handicap access. Sand does not allow for wheelchair access.
- 3. This material has maintenance advantages cats are not interested in using it as a litter box.

The cost to the association was approximately the same as sand would have been.

SWIM LESSONS OFFERED

Swim lessons are offered to Niguel Shores residents this year by The Lifeguard Company. The lessons are based on the same program used by the American Red Cross.

Lessons are offered seven days per week, scheduled from 8 am to 6 pm, excluding 12 to 1 adult swim.

The company offers a very flexible swim program, with no minimum or maximum course length, according to the needs of the student. Generally, the program works well in 8-10 lessons of 30-45 minutes each.

MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

A lifeguard will be on duty over the Memorial Day weekend, May 29, 30 & 31, from 1 - 6 pm.

All children between 6 and 14 years who wish to swim without adult supervision will be required to pass a swim test. The requirement for passing this test is completion of two laps and treading water for one full minute. A permission form must be filled out and returned to the lifeguard BEFORE a swim test will be given.

As a reminder, adult swim is from 7-9 am and 12-1 every day. Also, NO ONE under 18 years is allowed in or in the area of the jacuzzi.

2701 Basic Policy on Penalties, Fines, Fees (02-01-85)

- (1) Whereas it is the policy of the Niguel Shores Community Association to protect the rights and privileges of the members and to enforce the CC&R's and Rules and Regulations of this Association, therefore pursuant to the authority vested in the Board of Directors of said Association by the CC&R's and by the By-Laws, the following system of penalties, fines and fees is hereby established and supersedes all previously adopted systems for such penalties, fines and fees.
- (2) This system shall be binding on the members of the Association, and shall not be the exclusive remedy of the Association to deal with violations of the CC&R's, By-Laws or Rules and Regulations. Members shall be responsible for the acts or omissions of their guests, lessees or invitees.
- (3) All penalties and fines, pursuant to this Rules and Regulation, shall be imposed by Board action after reasonable notice and hearing, as set forth hereinafter:

2702 Violation of CC&R's (02-01-85)

Pursuant to Article XI, Section 4 of the CC&R's, the Association has the right to prosecute a proceeding at law against any person or persons who have violated or are attempting to violate the CC&R's, and the losing party shall pay any attorney fees of the prevailing party as may be fixed by the court.

2703 Non-Payment of Assessment (02-01-85)

In addition to the right of the Association to bring an action at law against the Owner for non-payment of assessments, (as set forth in Article VI of the CC&R's), Section 304 of the By-Laws provides that the voting rights and use of the common areas by any member, his guests and delegatees, may be suspended by action of the Board of Directors during any period when assessments owed by such member remain unpaid.

2704 Continuing Violation of Rules (10-03-90)

Section 304 of the By-Laws also provides that the right to use of the common areas and facilities may be suspended by the Board of Directors for violation of the Rules and Regulations relating to the use of the Common Areas and the conduct of Members thereon, for a period not to exceed thirty days.
