


New numbered stickers have been approved by the board in an effort to better control access to the community and for identification.

A new voice has been given to 3,253 families in the unincorporated coastal communities in the southern end of Orange County. It is known as USOCC, which stands for United South Orange Coast Communities. The area covered includes the communities of South Laguna, Three Arch Bay, Monarch Bay, Laguna Niguel, Dana Point and Capistrano Beach.

USOCC was born on January 15th of this year when Paul Sayre, president of Capistrano Estates Home Owners Association, issued invitations to eighteen South Coast homeowner and civic associations to meet and decide whether or not they felt that such an organization was needed to represent them in County affairs. The project was overwhelmingly approved and work began immediately. A steering committee was formed, meeting once a week, to solve the various organization problems and come up with bylaws for the group. Each association which becomes a member of USOCC selects one of its members to represent it on the Board of Directors. Individuals may become members of USOCC, but they have only one representative on the Board as a group. The Board then elects the Executive Committee, which is comprised of the officers of the Board, and it functions under the policy making powers of the Board.

Each association votes on each major issue brought before USOCC for study and instructs its representative as to its stand. Thus, the cumulative effect is that the Executive Committee of USOCC speaks for the total membership of its affiliated associations.

At its initial formal meeting, the following associations became members of USOCC and officers elected:

PRESIDENT: Paul Sayre, Capistrano Estates Home Owners Association FIRST VICE PRESIDENT: Frank Irvine, Niguel Homeowners Association SECOND VICE PRESIDENT: Robert Dwyer, Three Arch Bay Association RECORDING SECRETARY: Martha Beaumont, South Laguna Civic Association CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: Cecil Collins, Lagunita Property Owners Association TREASURER: Edward Miller, Pacific Island Village Homeowners Association MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN: Edward Miller, Pacific Island Village Homeowners Association

Other member Associations are Dana Point Citizens for Action, represented by Charles Cross; Capistrano Beach Chamber of Commerce, Georges Narbel; Monarch Bay Terrace, John (Skip) Swartley. These ten homeowner and civic associations represent 3,253 member families, whose efforts are united to represent the entire area to the County and to coordinate the efforts of the several community associations on area-wide matters.

A secondary purpose is to fulfill a need, as it arises, to assist the individual commun. ties in finding solutions to their common problems.

The spheres of concern of USOCC shall include, but are not limited to:

1. Planning/Land Use

2. Taxation

3. Industry 4. Roads/Freeway

Schools

6. Local Governance Police/Fire/Health Protection

8. Parks and Recreation

9. Flood Control

10. Ecological/Environmental Impact

The spheres of concern which shall be given immediate attention by USOCC are: Planning/Land Use Roads/Freeway Police/Fire/Health Protection.

These subjects are being given study in depth, and the findings of the committees will be submitted to the Board by the Executive Committee for discussion, approval and action. The task at hand will require the assistance of countless citizens within USOCC's area who have the experience, interest and the time to devote to finding the solution to these problems. ## ATTENTION ALL RESIDENTS!!!!

In recent days there have been anumber of problems at the Community

Center which deserve your attention.

First and most serious is the case of a young teenage girl in possession of marijuna on the clubhouse grounds. Upon consultation with law enforcement officials, and officials of the community, the girl was turned over to the custody of her parents. This warning is the first and last! In all future cases the County Sheriff will be called immediately for arrest. This Community's Board will not tolerate violation of the law!

Other problems involve violations of the Community Center rules These rules were instituted after much work and consideration for the property that belongs to all of equally! Some of the rules may be changed at a later date to compensate for changing situations. However for the present the rules have been approved by the Board of Directors and THE RULES WILL BE ENFORCED! Misconduct and violation of specific rules will result in restriction from the privileges and use of the Community Center, as provided for in the By-laws of this association.

Some of the problems encountered by Mr. Misner and his staff are listed here to emphasize the type of misconduct perpetrated by adults of this community:

- A drunken man was beating his wife in the parking lot. (This episode was followed by both parties concerned each in a vehicle, having a speeding contest around this entire community.)
- 2. Two men were trying to break open the vendingmachine near the clubhouse--Both being"respectible adults of this community.

These incidents will not be tolerated in this community!
Mr. Misner and his staff have been directed to notify the County Sheriff.
In addition you may be asked to identify your self when entering the center or at anytime while on the premises.

Please Cooperate with all staff personnel. This is your Community Center. The Staff have been hired to maintain and protect your propery which also belongs to all the residents of this association, therefore we ask only for support and cooperation in maintaining your facility1




## TENNIS ROSTER ANYONE?


