



DEAR MEMBERS AND RESIDENT.

This months topic for my article is "CRIME" unfortunate but necessary. As many of you know, in recent weeks, Niguel Shores Residents have experienced an increased number of Burglaries. The Orange County Sheriff's Station (Laguna Niguel) are doing everything they can to apprehend the offenders. We, at the Association Office are trying to assist where possible and practical. If you are "hit" with a Break-in: First, Call the Sheriff (911), then call the Association Office (9-5 daily), and give us the information (including the Sheriff's crime report number which OCS assigns).

Close and lock your windows.


Recent burglaries have been made with entry through sliding glass doors.






HERE ARE SOME TIPS - Secure your windows with sliding glass doors the main objective is to keep the window from being lifted up and out of the track. This can be prevented by installing metal screws in the upper track and backing them out so there is just enough clearance for the window to slide. The majority of other

windows can be secured by drilling a 3/16" hole on a slight downward slant, through the inside window frame and into the exterior window frame. A nail or metal dowel can then be placed in the hole to secure the window.



Dead bolt your doors! Door locks that can be easily forced, are an open invitation to burglars. All exterior doors should have dead bolt locks.

Your home should be well lighted -both internally and externallywhether you are at home or not!




Light up your home.

A home that looks deserted is an easy "Target" for a burglary. Also remember, most burglaries happen during the daylight hours. Whenever you are away for an extended period, notify the OCS and a few reliable neighbors, then make sure your home looks lived in. Stop deliveried newspapers, etc.arrange for lawn and pet care - leave a key with a friend or neighbor, and have them change the position of the blinds, etc. - put some interior (and even exterior) lights on a timer - lock and secure all doors and windows. To The Residents of Niguel Shores:

During the afternoon of June 8, 1983, our home on Spindle Circle was burglarized. We now share the resentment and anxiety felt by the many other Niguel Shores residents who in the past week or so have experienced the same blatant act of invasion of privacy.

The two card gates and one manned gate make our area of Niguel Shores particularly vulnerable to the possibility of burglary by (1) an acquaintance of a resident (2) a malicious resident or (3) anyone who wants to walk in and out of the area. It is true that large items need to be transported in a vehicle. Our items were small enough to be carried out in our luggage!

We earnestly request that serious consideration be given to completing the fencing on the north side of Selva, to closing the card gates, and to adopting and immediately implementing a Neighborhood Watch program. The illegal activities and the uninvited trespassers must be identified and inhibited.

The time has past for apathy and seclusion on the part of the residents of this community. Each of us, owner and renter alike, shares in the responsibility of abiding by the rules and maintaining the standards of safety for the entire community of Niguel Shores.

WARNING-----CAT OWNERS BEWARE:

The office has been advised by home owners in Niguel Shores, that some domestic cats have been easy prey for roaming coyotes in the area. Coyotes are nocturnal and will roam/hunt in the evening hours. Therefore, we recommend that you keep your little pets in during the evening.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE (Cont'd)

My resignation as a Director of NSCA was made because the two prime issues affecting our community have not been handled in the most democratic manner, a manner essential to the good health of our community!

One issue, the Community Services District, involves our existing homeowner assessment as it is used for Maintenance and related Administration. These expenses currently run about \$900 per year. The other issue, Reclaimed Water, involves a proposed additional homeowner expenditure, to provide connections and lines of about \$1,000, on a one-time basis, or, if bonded and spread over 10 years, about \$120 annually.

To date, the community has not been advised by the Board of the latest information provided earlier by the C.S.D. committee, rejecting by majority vote its publication. To date, the Board also by majority vote, has rejected a straw vote of the community on Reclaimed Water.

It is my belief that only by information dissemination and decision by the members at large will the entire community either basically support or reject these issues. And, notwithstanding that the preponderance of evidence supports a C.S.D. and rejects Reclaimed Water, I would fully support the most democratic actions.

In view of this papers policy of "freedom of the press", the above letter has been printed. We do however challenge each of his figures. Three years ago, your Board of Directors turned down the C.S.D. because they felt the apparent dangers of such an arrangement outweighed the claimed advantages.

Remember, in August you (the homeowner) will have an opportunity to accept or reject Reclaimed Water for our community.


BABYSITTING CO-OP

Do's

- 1. ALWAYS READ THE INSTRUCTIONS AND WARNING LABLES THAT ACCOMPANY FIREWORKS.
- 2. USE FIREWORKS ONLY WITH ADULT SUPERVISION.
- 3. HAVE A BUCKET OF WATER HANDY TO PUT USED FIREWORKS IN.
- 4. KEEP FIREWORKS OUT OF THE REACH OF SMALL CHILDREN.
 - 5. Move a safe distance away after Lighting Fireworks.
 - 6. STAY AWAY FROM SMALL CHILDREN WITH LIGHTED FIREWORKS.

DON'TS

- NEVER LIGHT FIREWORKS IN THE HOUSE, GARAGE, PLAYHOUSE OR ANY OTHER BUILDING.
- 2. Don't ignite fireworks in or around anything that WILL BURN ESPECAILLY DRY GRASS AND VACANT FIELDS.
- 3. NEVER PLACE LIGHTED FIREWORKS IN CANS, BOTTLES OR OTHER CONTAINERS.
- 4. NEVER THROW SPARKLERS OR ANY FIREWORKS.
- DON'T GO NEAR FIREWORKS THAT HAVE BEEN LIT, BUT HAVE NOT GONE OFF. DOUSE WITH WATER, LET THEM SIT FOR A REASONABLE PERIOD OF TIME, THEN CAREFULLY PUT THEM IN A BUCKET OF WATER. USE A SHOVEL, NOT YOUR HANDS.
- 6. IF YOU SEE A FIRE STARTED BY FIREWORKS, DON'T PANIC. REMOVE ALL PEOPLE FROM THE AREA AND CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

ALL FIREWORKS MUST BE REGISTERED WITH THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL. EACH PIECE OR PACKAGE MUST BEAR THIS SEAL.
