### BEACH PARKING FUR GLESTS

The Board has directed a change in parking policy for the beach parking lot on a trial basis until December 31, 1989. Except on holiday weekends — Sept. 2-4, Nov. 23-26 and Dec. 23-25 — guest vehicles bearing a valid Day Permit or Special Entry Permit may park in the beach parking lot on the upper level only.

Guest vehicles bearing a Day Permit or Special Entry Permit <u>PLUS a Guest Parking Permit (grey, laminated permit)</u> may park on any level of the beach parking lot with no restriction.


As usual vehicles with valid owner and tenant decals may park at the beach parking lot on any level on any day.

Cooks and waiters from the Mens Club served more than 300 breakfasts and raised approximately \$150 for the Recreation fund. The day's final event was the annual sandcastle building contest at the beach.

## NBCA SETTLES SUIT WITH GRANGE COUNTY AND AVOID

A lawsuit was filed May, 1986, by Niguel Shores Community Association against Orange County and AVCO Developers to establish responsibility for repair and maintenance of beach revetment. Now, after three long years, many, many meetings, and countless hours, the lawsuit against Orange County and AVCO has been settled.

For the benefit of new residents, I would like to define Phase I and Phase II. Phase I is the present configuration of the beach revetment. Phase II would have extended the base of the revetment seaward by seven feet, raised the height of the revetment by five feet, and required construction of a pathway on top of the revetment from the ramp to the end near public restrooms.

During the Winter of 1986-87, revetment sustained some minor damage. The estimated cost of repair \$38,000. The Association applied for a permit in Fall of 1987 to repair damage. The County subsequently issued conditions, four with permit including the Association to assume all future responsibility for maintenance The Board did not feel and liability. it was prudent to subject our community The permit was not to this condition. accepted and repair was not made.

During a violent storm in January of 1988, the revetment sustained major damage. Our attorneys continued to try to work out some agreement with the County to repair the revetment with no success. The estimated cost of repair had grown to \$161,400.

During the summer of 1988, several settlement conferences were held. At one of these conferences the judge introduced the other principles in the suit; namely VTN, Moore & Taber, and Dr. Pipkin. VTN was the engineering firm, Moore & Taber was a professional consultant, and Dr. Pipkin was the geologist.

A trial date was set for September 19, trial the County At the requested a postponement, stating they thought we could reach some agreement. The Board has always felt We agreed. the problem could be resolved out of court. The trial was estimated to last ten days at a cost of approximately \$40,000. The judge agreed to postponecase assioned the but ment arbitration with Judge Phillip Swab presiding.

In the meantime our attorneys were negotiating with VTN, Moore & Taber, An agreement was Pipkin. and Dr. reached. VTN would pay the Association & Taber would pay Moore \$25,000. Pipkin would pay \$5,000, and Dr. \$10,000 over a year's time. If Dr. Pipkin did not pay the \$10,000 in one year, the settlement would be increased to \$20,000. We have been receiving payments.

At the end of September 1988 the County agreed to furnish rock for repair of Phase I at an approximate cost to the County of \$95,000. The disagreement on permit language still existed.

In early December, 1988, the County made a <u>verbal</u> proposal to the Association:

Then, on January 23, 1989, the County modified their proposal as follows:

NSCA would have to assume full responsibility in future for liability and maintenance of revetment.

The Board was very concerned about responsibility for liability and maintenance. We informed the County we would accept \$597,500, but would not assume responsibility for liability and maintenance.

In January, 1989, the permit for an interim repair of Phase I was modified and work commenced in early February.

In March, 1989, the County submitted another proposal. The County would pay the Association \$100,000 and AVCO would pay \$100,000. The responsibility for maintenance of Phase I would remain with the County and the Association. Our attorney went back and negotiated an additional \$25,000 from AVCO, for a total of \$125,000 from AVCO.

The Board approved the settlement in concept and instructed our attorney to draw up the required documents. One of our major concerns was the amount of time required by the County to issue a permit to repair any future repair to revetment. The final agreement states the following:

- 1. NSCA will receive the following:
  County \$100,000
  AVCD 125,000
  VTN,M&T,DR.PIP 40,000
  Total \$265,000
- Phase II will not be constructed.
- 3. Phase I will be maintained according to the agreement, including:
- a. If damage occurs to that portion of the revetment on Association property, the County will issue a permit in a timely manner to accomplish repair.

b. If damage occurs to that portion of the revetment that is on County property, the County will be notified and they are to make repairs in a timely manner. If repair is not performed in a timely manner, NSCA may make repairs and bill the County for the total cost of these repairs.

Final agreement was signed June 7, 1989.

Will your home be damaged by fires and broken water pipes, or do you know how to shut off your gas, water and electricity? Will you be a burden on your community, or have you stored food, water, and supplies?

My name is Clinton Coil, a Sea Explorer in Ship 711 and a candidate for the rank of Eagle Scout. For my Eagle Service Project, I would like to help you to be able to answer these questions with, "YES, I'm prepared." have all recei ved written information about earthquake preparedness, but rarely has anyone taken the time to explain it to us, and almost never has someone offered to come to our home and assist us in this task.

On August 15th, 7:30 to 8:30pm at the the NSCA multi-purpose room, scouts Brian Hilts, D.C. Sener, Evan Baxter and I will be making an oral presentation on (1) How to prepare for an earthquake, (2) How to take cover during an earthquake, (3) What to do after an earthquake, and (4) Very basic first aid.

As a follow-up those who attend may sign up to have a team of scouts visit their homes to help them find their gas, water and electrical shut-off valves and show them how to operate them. This will take place the 17th, 18th and 19th of August.

We have received information and guidance from the San Clemente, Orange County, Laguna Beach, Huntington Beach, Los Angeles County and Los Angeles City Fire Departments, Southern California Gas Company, and South Coast County Water District to assure that our information is accurate. 
#### WOMENS CLUB NOTES




### HILL & HARBOR SENIORS

#### ARTICLE VI

#### MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

# Sec. 601 Place of Meetings

All annual and other meetings of Members shall be held at the principal office of the Association, or at any other place within the County of Orange which may be designated by the Board of Directors. (9-4-85)

#### Sec. 602 Annual Meetings

The annual meeting of the Members shall be held on the third Tuesday of May at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P.M. If the day for the annual meeting of the Members is a legal holiday, the meeting will be held at the same hour of the first day following which is not a legal holiday. (9-4-85)

#### Sec. 603 Special Meetings

Special meetings of the Members may be called at any time by the President or by the Board of Directors, or upon the written request of Members holding five percent (5%) or more of the voting power of the entire membership.

(9-4-85)

#### Sec. 604 Notice of Meetings

- (a) Written notice of each meeting of the Members shall be given by, or at the direction of, the Secretary, or other person authorized to call the meeting, by mailing a copy of such notice by first-class mail, postage prepaid, not less than (15) days, nor more than ninety (90) days before such meeting, to each Member entitled to vote thereat, addressed to the Member's address last appearing on the books of the Association, or provided by such Member to the Association for the purpose of notice. (7-19-89)
- (b) If no address of the Member appears on the books of the Association and the Member provides no such address, notice shall be deemed to have been given the Member if mailed to the place where the principal office of the Association is situated, or published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in the County of Orange.

(9-4-85)

- (c) The notice shall state the place, date and time of the meeting ANA (1) in the case of a special meeting, the general nature of the business to be transacted, and no other business may be transacted, or (2) in the case of the regular meeting, those matters which the Board, at the time the notice is given, intends to present for action by the Members, but, except as provided by law, any proper matter may be presented at the meeting for action. The notice of any meeting at which Directors are to be elected shall include the names of all those who are nominees at the time the notice is given to Members. (9-4-85)
- (d) Upon request in writing to the Chairman of the Board, President, Secretary, or any Vice President, by any person (other than the Board) entitled to call a special meeting of Members, within 20 days after receipt of the request, notice shall be given to the Members entitled to vote that a meeting will be held at a time fixed by the Board not less than 35 or more than 90 days after the receipt of the request. (9-4-85)
- (e) Attendance of a Member at a meeting without protesting, prior thereto or at its commencement, the lack of notice to such Member, shall constitute a waiver of notice of the meeting by such Member.

#### Sec. 610 Action Without Meeting - Written Ballot

- (a) Pursuant to the provisions of Section 7513 of the California Corporations Code, any action which may be taken at any regular or special meeting of Members may be taken without a meeting if the Association distributes a written ballot to every Member entitled to vote on the matter. Such ballot shall set forth the proposed action, provide an opportunity to specify approval or disapproval of any proposal, and provide a reasonable time within which to return the ballot to the Association. (9-4-85)
- (b) Approval by written ballot pursuant to this provision shall be valid only when the number of votes cast by ballot within the time period specified equals or exceeds the quorum required to be present at a meeting authorizing the action, and the number of approvals equals or exceeds number of votes that would be required to approve at a meeting at which the total number of votes cast was the same as the number of votes cast by ballot. (9-4-85)
- (c) Ballots shall be solicited in a manner consistent with the provisions of Section 604(a) of these Bylaws relating to notice of meetings to Members. All such solicitations shall indicate the number of responses needed to meet the quorum requirement and, with respect to ballots other than for the election of directors, shall state the percentage of approvals necessary to pass the measure submitted. The solicitation must specify the time by which the ballot must be received in order to be counted. (7-19-89)
- (d) Directors may <u>not</u> be elected pursuant to the written ballot procedure (without a meeting) provided in this Section. (9-4-85)

# 3106 Correction of Violations (4-16-86)

The Committee has the right to require any modification which is in violation of the OOSRs or these Regulations to be corrected, improved or destroyed. Oversight or failure of the Committee to note violations with respect to approved plans will not be binding on the Committee nor constitute approval, and the Committee may require all such violations to be corrected.

# 3107 City Approval Required (6-15-89)

Approval by the Committee does not eliminate the need to obtain proper permits from the City of Dana Point, where required, and such approval will be null and void without such permits being obtained. Any deviation approved by the City must be re-submitted for approval by the Committee. Construction must be in accordance with Committee-approved Construction may not be started until a copy of the City approved plans has been brought in to the Association office for comparison with the plans which were approved by the Committee and for retention in the Association files.

The Committee may use the services of a consulting architect for all new structures and exterior design modifications or additions to existing structures. The architect may inspect the property as part of his review of the plans and may also check the job upon completion to ensure compliance with the approved plans. Such approval will be in writing for attachment to the file copy of the plans stating that the work has been satisfactorily completed.

# 3111 Committee Meetings (4-16-86)

- A. The Committee will meet not less than twice each month on a regularly scheduled basis.
- B. Applications containing all the necessary information and plans must be filed in the Association office at least one week prior to the established meeting date in order to be reviewed by the Committee at that meeting. Applications filed late will be held for review at the next regularly scheduled meeting.

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# 3115 Committee Approval or Disapproval (01-04-89)

- A. An application may be approved or disapproved at any regular or special meeting of the Committee at which two or more members cast votes. Should only one member be casting a vote, the Board liaison representative shall be permitted to cast the second vote. An application shall be considered approved if there are more "approved" votes cast than there are "disapproved" votes cast. An application shall be considered disapproved if there are not more "approved" than "disapproved" votes cast.
  - B. Failure to provide all required information, documents, plans and specifications as required by these Regulations to the satisfaction of the Committee will result in automatic disapproval of the application as incomplete.
  - C. In the event the Committee fails to either approve or disapprove a timely and complete application within thirty days after submittal of the application to the Committee, it shall be conclusively presumed that the Committee has approved such application as submitted.
  - D. The approval of an application for new construction or alterations to existing structures shall be for one year from the date of approval. If construction is not started within one year, such approval shall be null and void and a new application will be required and will be subject to the regulations and requirements in effect at the time of re-submittal.
  - E. Any additions or alterations to any portion of the approved plans shall be re-submitted to the Committee for review and approval prior to construction. Construction of any work approved by the Committee shall be diligantly pursued to completion within six months from commencement.
