### CC%R AMENDMENTS BALLOT RESULTS

Following are the results of the formal vote presented to the membership amend the CC%Rs, Articles Incorporation and Bylaws. The number approvals required to pass amendment to the CC%Rs and the Bylaws The number of approvals 481. required to pass an amendment to the Articles of Incorporation is 720. total of 602 valid ballots Mer-e received, satisfying the **QUOP-UM** requirement of 480.

AMENDMENT A was defeated with 370 yes votes and 231 no votes. This amendment would have changed Section 1 and 2 of the CC%. Article I and II of the Articles of Incorporation to reflect the name change of the Niguel Shores Community Association to "The Shores Community Association".

AMENDMENT B passed with 536 yes votes 64 no votes. This amendment changes Section 1 of Article VII of the CC2Rs so that the Architectural Control Committee will base its approval of requests "architectural ODcompatibility" rather than "adequacy of This amendment structural design". also adds Section 8 to the same article to indicate that the approval of the Architectural Control Committee does not mean that the Committee or the Association assumes any liability for structural integrity the building or its compliance with building code.

AMENDMENT C passed with 537 yes votes versus 63 no votes. This amendment changes Section 3 of Article VII of the CC2Rs to increase the maximum period for processing architectural submittals from 30 days to 45 days to permit "problem requests" to be reconsidered at the following meeting rather than be disallowed.

AMENDMENT D passed with 552 yes votes versus 44 no votes. This amendment deletes from Section 1 of Article VII of the CDSAs any reference to landscape plantings since this is not a matter for the Architectural Control Committee, and adds landscape control to Section 5 of Article IX which now relates only to view blockage by buildings.

AMENDMENT E was defeated with 464 yes votes versus 128 no votes. This amendment would have changed Section 5 of Article V of the CC&Rs so that a special assessment to defray the cost of a capital improvement would require the approval of the homeowners if required under applicable law rather than the 2/3 approval currently set out in the CC&Rs.

AMENDMENT F passed with 525 yes votes against 72 no votes. This amendment changes Section 10 of Article IX of the CC&As so that the specific restrictions on signs will appear in the Association Rules as established by the Board of Directors rather than in the CC&As.

AMENDMENT <u>G passed</u> with 501 yes votes against 101 no votes. This amendment changes Section 11 of Article IX of the COLAs so that the specific restrictions on animals will appear in the Association Rules as established by the Board of Directors rather than in the COLAS.

AMENDMENT H passed with 533 yes votes against 68 nó votes. This amendment changes Section 7 of Article IX of the CCLAs to provide for Board regulation of all temporary structures visible from outside the Lots.

AMENDMENT I passed with 547 yes vote versus 55 no votes. This amendment changes Section 15 of Article IX of the CC%As to permit only businesses which conform to zone restrictions, do not increase traffic, and are not detectable by signs, sound or smell.

AMENDMENT J passed with 580 yes votes versus 22 no votes. This amendment adds Section 23 to Article IX of the CC&Rs prohibiting timeshare ownership of property in Niguel Shores.

AMENDMENT K passed with 535 yes votes versus 62 no votes. This amendment changes Section 4 of Article XI of CCLRs to give the Association the same rights in handling violations as it has in handling regulations Of violations the CCLRs. This amendment also adds arbitration as option to resolve disputes.

AMENDMENT L passed with 576 yes votes against 26 no votes. This amendment adds Section 11 to Article XI of the CC2Rs to provide that any member who has made application to any committee of the Association may appeal the decision of that committee to the Board of Directors in accordance with Rule 1401 of the Association Rules.

AMENDMENT M passed with 508 yes votes against 93 no votes. This amendment adds Section 24 to Article IX of the CCLAs to prohibit the rental of Niguel Shores property for periods of less than one month.

AMENDMENT N passed with 538 yes votes versus 61 no votes. This amendment changes Article VI, Section 608 of the Bylaws to eliminate cumulative voting. Members will cast only one vote for a candidate.

ADVISORY A which sought to measure the extent of community support for the addition of an exercise room to the Community Center facilities resulted in 303 yes votes and 297 no votes. The final decision whether or not to pursue this project now rests with the Board of Directors.

Thanks to all the volunteers who gave their time and energy to develop the ballot, canvass the community for the return of the ballots and, finally, to validate and count the ballots. The amendments which passed will be recorded with the County of Orange and a copy of the recorded document mailed to each property owner.



# OVERNIGHT PARKING OF RESIDENTS


Your association Board of Directors has been asked by the Traffic and Safety Committee to help solve what appears to be a growing problem at the Shores. It seems that for some time now, overnight parking has creating somewhat of a traffic Guests have always been allowed to park overnight, with approved guest permits, many of these guest-allocated spaces are taken up with resident vehicles parked in the common areas. Naturally, we all prefer to have residents park in their garages, or barring that possibility, parking in their driveways.

This problem does not seem to be as acute in some areas of the Shores as it is in others. The Board would like to address this situation by establishing, on a trial basis, the following rule:

"Overnight parking of resident vehicles in common parking spaces is authorized permit only. special Permits are issued by the NSCA office and are limited vehicles in excess of the number of parking spaces designed for the garage and driveway Of each home. Temporary permits may issued when a construction or other emergency causes a driveway or garage to Such temporary be blocked. permits will be issued for the duration of the project or emergency only. Owners of vehicles resident panked overnight without a special common area parking permit are subject to fine(s) and/or towaway."

The parking permit is available at the office at no charge to registered owners and tenants. The number of permits issued to a resident is limited to the number of vehicles which exceed the parking space available in the garage and driveway of the property. For example, if a resident has a twocar garage and a driveway which permits him or her to park two vehicles and resident has three OI. vehicles, no parking permit will be However, if the same resident issued. had five vehicles, he or she would be entitled to one parking permit. permit is transferrable between vehicles.

This issue will be heard in open forum at the Board meeting on Wednesday, August 15, at 8:00 p.m. in the community center. The Board welcomes your input in this matter before any conclusions are reached. Please come and let the Board know your feelings on this matter.



## BEACH PARKING POLICY CHANGE

Board has adopted a permanent policy regarding use of the beach parking lot. Effective August 1, vehicles bearing a <u>valid</u> owner tenant decal, special entry permit, visitor day permit or guest parking permit may park on any level of the beach parking except for the following holidays: Memorial Day weekend; July 4 and weekends when the holiday falls on Friday, Saturday, Sunday or Monday; Labor Day weekend. On these holidays only vehicles bearing valid owner or tenant decals will be permitted to park in the beach parking lot.

# NEW TOWING POLICY

Attached to this issue of the Seashore News are several pages of revised rules which reflect a significant change in the Association's towing policy. This new policy will be enforced beginning August 15.

If a vehicle is found in violation of the Association's rules, it will be cited. If the vehicle is found to be in violation of the same rule at a later time, it will be cited and warned of tow-away in two hours from the date and time of this second citation. If, at the end of the two-hour time limit, the vehicle remains in violation, the patrol service will cause the vehicle to be towed at the owner's expense. No further notice shall be given prior to tow-away.

Towable offenses are as follows:

No valid permit/decal Double parking

Parking in red zone; on sidewalk; obstructing driveway/road; creating

a traffic hazard

Parking in violation of posted hours at beach parking lot


Abandoned/stored vehicle (in excess of 72 hours)

Failure to observe posted traffic signs or speed in excess of 25 mph

Parking in fire lane, within 15 feet of fire hydrant, in designated handicapped space without permit, in a manner which interferes with entrance to or exit from Niguel Shores

All residents are reminded to register their vehicles with the Association to receive the proper permit. Vehicles belonging to guests of residents must display a valid permit at all times.

The policy described above has been developed and adopted in an effort to stream—line our procedures in view of recent legislative changes and to control more effectively the vehicular access to the community.


