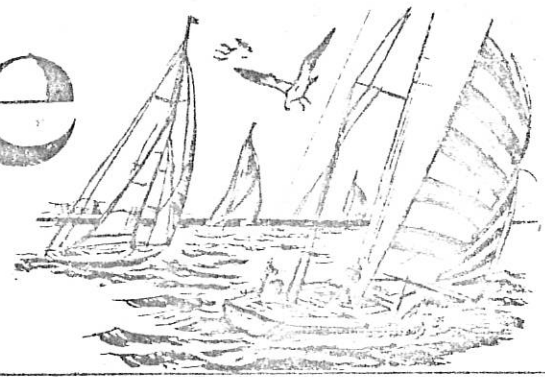

## FROM THE HELM

Conference/Social Room A proposal has been made to convert the Ping Pong area to a Conference/Social Room. Before it can consider the proposal, the Board needs a firm estimate of the costs. An expenditure of \$250 has been authorized by the Board for the preparation of plans needed to obtain this estimate.

Beach Parking Lot The Board authorized the expenditure of \$500 for the construction of a barrier at the top of the beach parking lot in order to make it possible to close the lot at night.

Landscape Contract The Board agreed that the 1985 landscape contract would not be put out for bid this year for the following reasons:

1. Our contractor has agreed to an increase of only 3% next year.
2. He is working on a number of continuing projects.
3. Our past experience with the contractor has been very satisfactory.

Community Center Painting The Board authorized an expenditure of \$2780 for the painting of all of the exterior wood surfaces of the Community Center building.

Communications Committee The Board approved the appointment of Dick MacMair as a member of the Communications Committee.

Planting Policy The Board approved a policy which will apply to requests from homeowners for new plantings.

Breakers Isle Palm Trees The Board agreed to inform the Breakers Isle owners that the trees they select must not exceed, when fully grown, the height of the lowest pad on Cabrillo.

Beach Slope The Board agreed to request the construction firm which rebuilt the beach revetment to review the condition of the revetment in relation to the coming winter.

Tree View Blockage Committee The Board approved the appointment of Steve Ozimec as a member of the Tree View Blockage Committee.

Appeal Procedure The Board modified the appeal procedure to provide a 60 day period within which a member may request a hearing and a 60 day period within which the Board may hear the appeal.

Skunk Problem The Board discussed the requests of several homeowners that the Association remove skunks from their properties. The Board agreed that the most appropriate procedure was for the complainants to set traps for the animals. Traps are available from the office and the County will come the same day to remove any trapped animal.

Coach Lamps The Board approved the expenditure of \$1000 for the cleaning of the coach lamps in the Garden and Shores tracts.

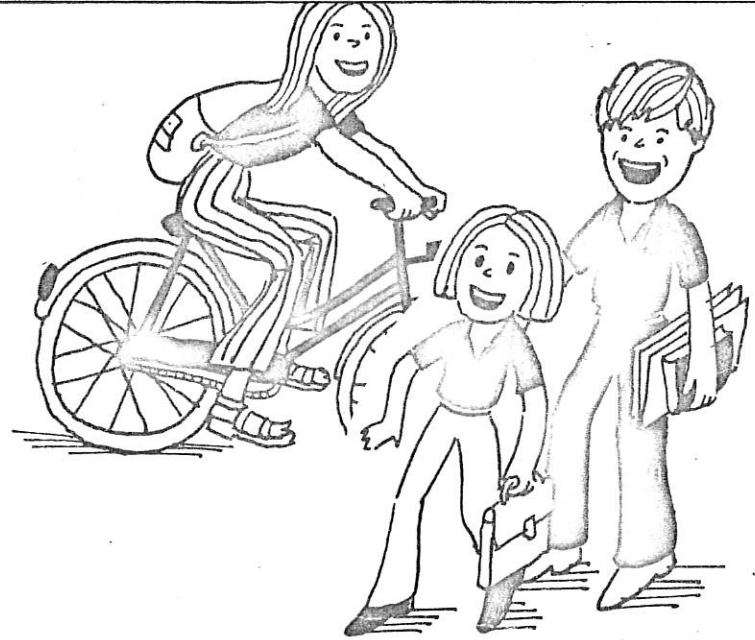
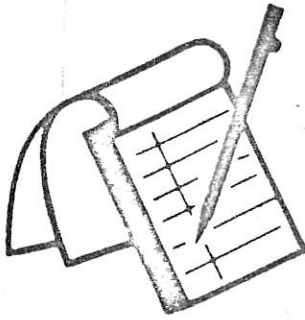

## BEACH PARKING LOT SECURITY:

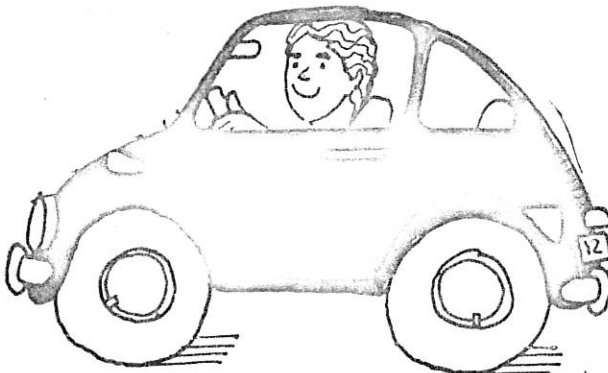

STEIN-BRIEF DONATES NEEDED PARKING SIGNS TO LAGUNA NIGUEL

The Orange County Board of Supervisors has accepted an offer by the Stein-Brief Group to install approximately 30 "No Parking" signs along Niguel Road and Stonehill Drive. The voluntary request was prompted by the company's commitment to traffic control within its 550-acre Monarch Beach residential/resort community, reported Jim Smith, senior vice president of the Monarch Beach development company.

Current regulations of the Niguel Planned Community restrict parking along arterial highways to prevent long-term parking by over-sized vehicles. However, enforcement of these restrictions has been hampered by previous developers' failure to post regulatory signs.

On its own volition, the Stein-Brief Group asked the County for permission to install "No Parking" signs and striping on the curb along Niguel Road between Pacific Coast Highway and Stonehill Drive, along Stonehill Drive between Niguel Road and Chula Vista and on the east side of Pacific Coast Highway between Monarch Bay Plaza and Niguel Road.

"We realize that it is not our obligation to install these signs, but we believe it is in the best interest of the community at large," Smith said.

John Stevens, aide to Supervisor Thomas Riley said, "The Stein-Brief Group has always been very cooperative in working with the County. This is an excellent example of a public/private partnership project that benefits the community. The parking restriction signs are long-awaited and much appreciated."

The California Highway Patrol and Sheriff's Department said that they will begin to issue parking citations within a reasonable period following installation of the signs.

Being developed on 550 coastal acres between Laguna Beach and Dana Point, Monarch Beach is a projected \$1 billion development scheduled to include 3,400 residences, three hotels, an 18-hole championship golf course(now open), tennis club, spa and European style shopping plaza.

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Dear Board of Directors,

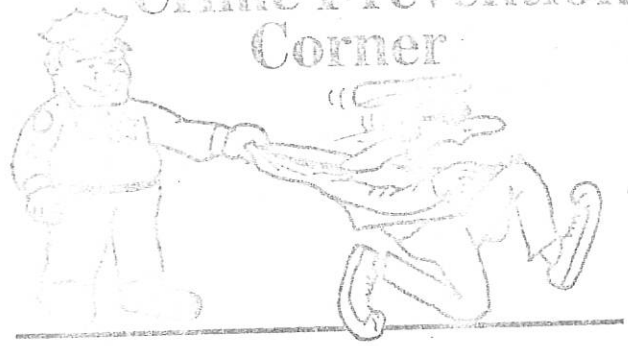

# NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

## Crime Prevention Corner



Operation Identification, an important second phase of our Niguel Shores Neighborhood Watch program, is now underway. This program involves the use of an engraving tool to mark an owner's drivers license number on all personal property large enough to be marked. A window sticker or decal is used to serve notice to any potential burglar that the property in the home has been marked for ready identification. Then, if property is stolen and later recovered it can be easily identified and also used in court as evidence to convict the burglar. It takes a little while to mark property, but we think it is well worth the time.

Using electric engravers made available by our Association, Neighborhood Watch Block Captains are beginning to schedule them on their blocks. The recommended time is two days per home. Because there are only eight engraving tools at this time to serve the total community, it may be some weeks before one reaches your block. Meantime, if you already own an engraver, we urge you to use it to mark your property and then share it with your neighbors. If you are interested, engraving tools can be purchased for from ten to fifteen dollars at most hardware stores.

The decals being made available state "Member - Operation Identification; All items Of Value On These Premises Have Been Marked For Ready Identification By Law Enforcement Agencies". A twenty-five cent charge for decals is used to purchase additional decals or other neighborhood watch materials.

Anyone who has not joined Neighborhood Watch and wishes to become involved may contact one of the co-chairmen, Ed Adams (493-4445) or Polly Buckingham (496-5142) or the NSCA office (493-0122) for further information. If you need to identify or contact your block captain please call one of the above.

You can prevent burglaries by being a good neighbor, a Neighborhood Watch neighbor.

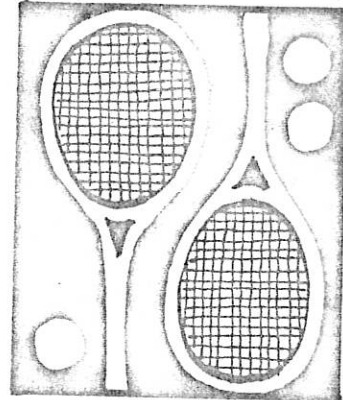

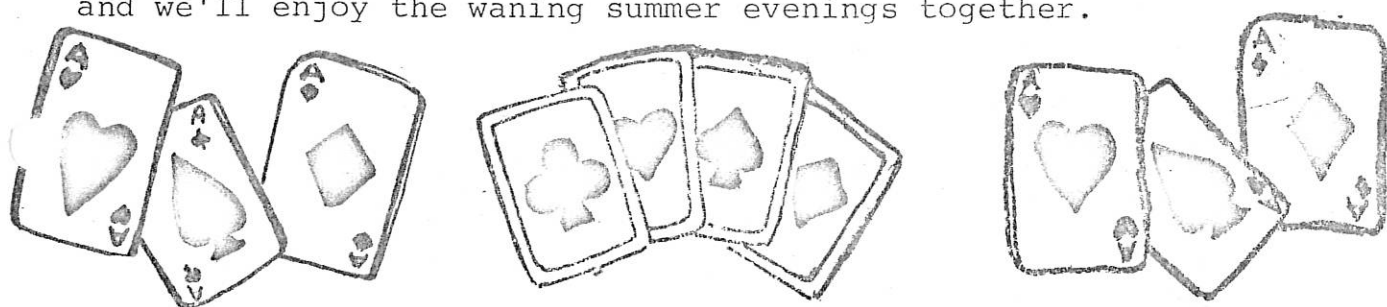


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COUPLES NIGHT BRIDGE

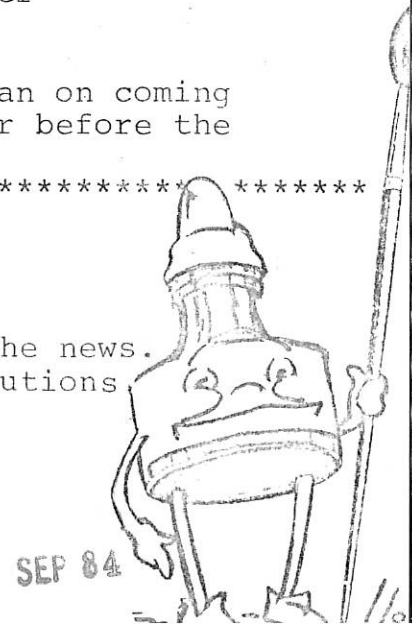

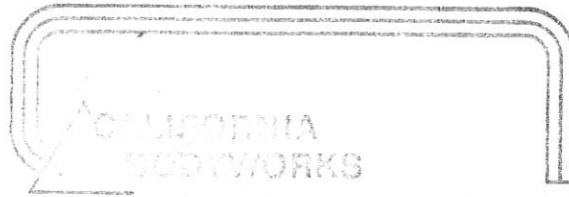
