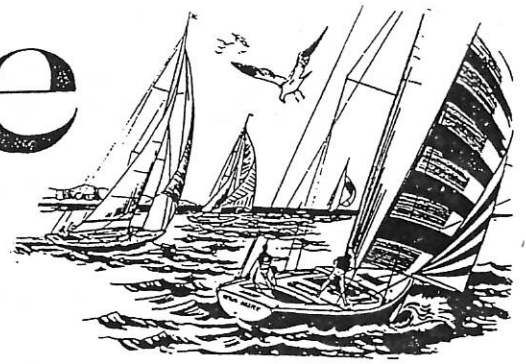


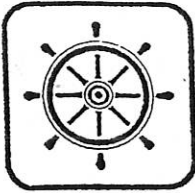

It is difficult to find words that describe my reaction to the vandalism that occurred at our beach bluff park and picnic area a couple of weekends ago. Some young adults and teenagers apparently had a late Friday night party at the bluff and broke up one of our concrete benches which so many of us in the community enjoy on a regular basis. This was not bad enough. On Sunday night they returned and broke up one of the concrete tables. Obviously the second act was premeditated; does this whole thing make any sense at all? No, these acts of vandalism will cost the community approximately \$1500. For twenty plus years people have enjoyed these facilities without any mishaps, but now in addition to the cost of replacing these items we will have to beef up our patrol of this area, add lighting, and post additional notices that this area is closed at 10pm and is private property. My only hope is that it was not any of our residents or their children who participated in this senseless act.

As noted in last month's Seashore News, if you see any activity you believe may be a problem call 1-800-540-5405 and the security patrol will be dispatched to that location. If the situation involves a resident's home or his premises, then the Sheriff's Department should be called.

UPDATE ON COMMUNITY CENTER LOCKER ROOM RENOVATIONS

The Board of Directors and staff would like to thank all residents and their guests for your patience while this long project continues. Neither staff nor the Board had any idea this situation was going to occur.

The majority of the renovations and painting are completed. The restroom and dressing room floors have been treated with a non-slip material. However, all who walk in should be careful and not make quick turns or run. The wall handrails that were previously in the showers will be reinstalled along with two tile soap dishes. The Board has authorized additional work such as new lights in the showers, small stainless steel shelves at each sink, moving of the lockers in the Mens locker room and another mirror for the Womens locker room.

The Board has authorized the purchase and installation of modesty panels in each dressing room. As part of this project, a new bench arrangement will be accomplished. These panels will be the same material as the stall dividers and must be ordered. They are being shipped from the east coast and may take as long as eight weeks to arrive.

When the final work items are ready for installation, staff will do everything possible to have notification signs put up at the Community Center several days in advance so that residents will know when the locker rooms will be closed.

STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

The scheduled date for street sweeping this month is **Tuesday, September 3**. You are requested to have your vehicles off the streets and out of the parking bays. This will allow the sweeper to do a better job.

NEW GATE DESIGN FOR GARIBALDI AND MANTA

The Board of Directors has decided not to re-use the current barrier arm/teeth system. The Board has decided to use twin seven foot wide swing gates on both the entry and exit sides. There will also be additional wrought iron fencing on either side of the gate structures with pedestrian gate(s). At this time, the pedestrian gates will not be locked; however, in case a future Board decides to use electric locks with key pad access, the wiring will be installed at the time of installation.

The swing gates will be four or five feet tall with new overhead lighting incorporated. A new phone structure will be built and a new phone system installed. The new system board will be computer accessed by staff and has a large ½" character readout that is not supposed to be affected by the sun. It is believed that this new system will allow the gates to automatically open in the event of a power failure and automatically reset when the power returns. There is also the possibility of a solar powered battery system that will continue to run the gates if the power fails.

Residents will be able to use the existing key card to open the new gates or the bypass code entered through the keypad. No decision has been made whether to offer garage door type openers to residents.

The Board hopes the new gate systems will meet homeowner expectations and significantly improve reliability.

MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS COMING TO THE VILLAS AND SEA TERRACE II

The Board has spent many hours of discussion on how to proceed with the following projects. It is expected that they will start in September or October:

✓ All streets will receive a petromat asphalt overlay. Several failed asphalt areas will be repaired first, along with the removal of speed bumps. Then a large machine will grind the asphalt edges next to the concrete curbs. After the streets are cleaned, a petromat (sheet material) will be laid down with two inches of compressed asphalt on top. All speed bumps will be reinstalled, along with the painted street markings.

✓ The Board is in the final stages of receiving bids on the installation of new entry/exit gate systems for Garibaldi & Manta. The Board will be able to make final selections at its September meeting so that materials can be ordered. It is the Board's intent to have this project going sometime in October. It is expected that the installation will take two to three weeks, depending on the weather.

It is staff's intent to coordinate both projects at the same time with the hope that residents will be inconvenienced as little as possible. While the gates are being constructed, there will be open entry/exit to anyone seeking access. At times, one side or the other will be closed down with entry/exit occurring through one side.

Before these projects start, a more detailed letter will be sent to the residents providing information available on how we will proceed.

12TH ANNUAL ART AFFAIRE REMINDER

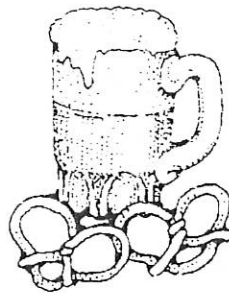

On September 17 our own Jerry Milner will speak to us on climbing Mount Kilimanjaro.



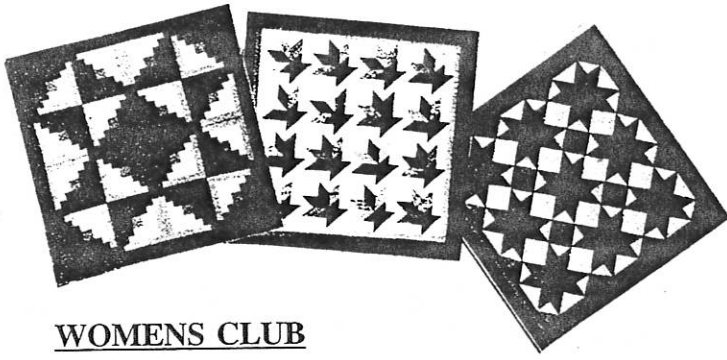
MENS CLUB GOLF

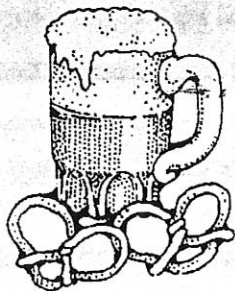
