HOMEOWNERS - if you rent your property, you must notify your tenants of the necessity of registering at the Association office. For registration, a tenant should present to the office secretary the following 3 items:

1. A copy of the lease or rental agreement
2. Driver's license
3. The auto registration card

These items are necessary for obtaining the N.S.C.A. auto identification sticker and key card, for which there is a charge to your renter. Money is refundable at termination of lease.

REPORT FROM YOUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

C.C. & R Enforcement

The Association for some time has been involved in litigation testing its authority under the C.C. & R's to require a homeowner to trim trees on his property which are blocking the ocean view of neighboring homeowners. The arbitrator has supported the Association's authority in this instance, and the offending trees will be trimmed.

Windshield Stickers

The Board has authorized new vehicle stickers, which will adhere to the windshield and "destruct" upon removal. This new type of sticker should substantially eliminate the abusive use incurred with the present stickers.

Throw-away Newspapers

Responding to homeowner complaints regarding the gratis periodicals which are tossed in front of our homes, the Board voted to restrict this practice and instead maintain a bulk supply available at the Center for interested homeowners. Prime purpose was greater home security, by eliminating evidence of residences with no one at home. Our General Manager advised that this bulk availability had worked satisfactorily where he was last employed. However, at the September open meeting, a show of hands was invited, and the strong majority in favor of continued house-to-house distribution has caused the Board to respond by reversing its prior decision.

(Note: The Board needs such input from homeowners, to assure that its actions reflect community consensus!)

Geotechnical

Converse's recommendations for improved drainage are now being received, and the Board will be considering proper commitment of funds.

1980 Budget

Committees and the Board are in the process of examining next year's financial requirements, preparatory to establishing a budget and homeowner assessments.

Manager's Report

Now that summer vacation has come to a close, it is important to remind all parents that the pool facilities are not attended by lifeguards during this time of year. During the recent hot spell, when the pool looked especially inviting, we had youngsters come into the recreation area fully attired in street clothes and five minutes later they were in the pool, swimming without supervision. CHILDREN UNDER THE AGE OF 12 MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT WHEN USING THE POOL FACILITY. Your assistance and concern with this matter is vital in helping prevent possible accidents. Furthermore, it is important that you as a parent know where your child is at all times!

The past month has been a busy one, for we have been in the process of contacting several homeowners regarding the parking of recreational vehicles and boats, etc. on streets and in driveway. We are happy to report that when the residents were notified, they complied with our request to remove the vehicles, in accordance with our CC&R's. In addition, when vehicles are either reported or spotted as being parked in any one area for a long period of time, and they bear no Association decal or proper pass, the Department of Motor Vehicles is contacted. A search of DMV records is made and we are provided with the proper name and address of the owner, etc. Once this information is obtained, we notify the person either to remove his vehicle or to obtain the necessary identification papers for parking here in the Association areas. This may sound like a lot of fuss, but during the last month three vehicles were abandoned here in the complex.

Our next big task is an attempt to clean up our beach parking lot and to keep it clean for the enjoyment of all residents. "No Trespassing" signs have been purchased and will be installed shortly at the various locations around the area. We are currently reviewing several different types of waste receptacles which can be installed at the beach parking lot and would be the type that cannot be removed unless the receptacle is released by a key device.

I would like to personally thank all residents who either called in information or filed a Homeowner's Request identifying our motorcycle rider. The information received was a great help and steps are being taken to correct this problem.

VANDALISM - An unnecessary expense!

Vandalism is very costly to the Niguel Shores Community Association. Everyone needs to be involved in combating this problem. One of the best ways to get involved-and we are not just picking on our youngsters-is to watch what our children and other children are doing. When you see a youngster or an adult playing (tampering) with sprinklers - STOP them! When you see someone bending trees over - STOP them! Take a morning or evening stroll, and if you see things happening and they appear out of the ordinary, report it to the Association Office.

Our gate vandalism has calmed down during the past month, which is encouraging. In conjunction with this, when reports are received concerning any damage, and the person responsible can be identified, we immediately seek recourse from the person responsible. During the last two weeks in August we had six such cases, mostly at the Garabaldi gate, where the gate arms were broken. Five of these have been resolved by the party responsible paying for the damages and the remaining one is pending further investigation by an insurance company. Every possible effort is being made to have the Community Association reimbursed by the party responsible for vandalizing any of the Association property. A vote of thanks should go to the residents in and around the Villas who reported the facts immediately to the Association Office.

SHORES GATE INFORMATION

Upon the recommendation of the Security Committee, the Board of Directors have approved the following hours that a Security Guard will be posted at the Shores Gate.

Beginning November 1, 1979, guard service at the Shores Gate will be from 11 A.M. to 7 P.M. daily. The exit side of the gate will be open, as usual, from 7 A.M. to 10 P.M. daily. Between June 15th and September 1th, a Security Guard will be on duty at this entrance from 9 A.M. to 7 P.M. daily.

ELECTRIC GARAGE DOOR OPENERS

Hot weather forced cancellation of our golf outing at Green River on September 11th, but a good turnout played at Torrey Pines famous south course on the 25th.

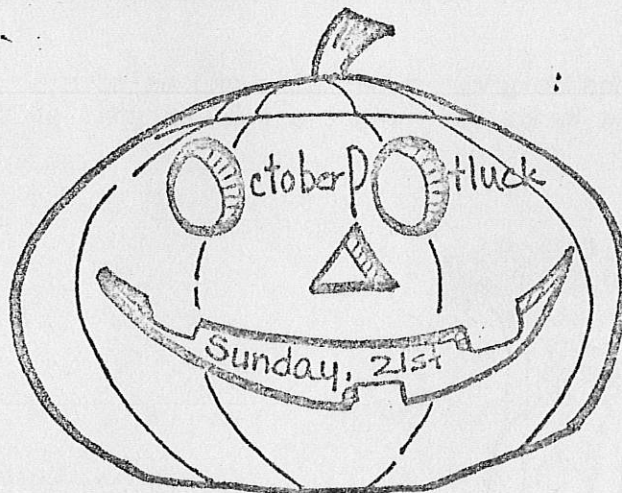
On October 9th we play San Clemente; on October 23rd, Fallbrook CC. Starting time at 10 A.M.

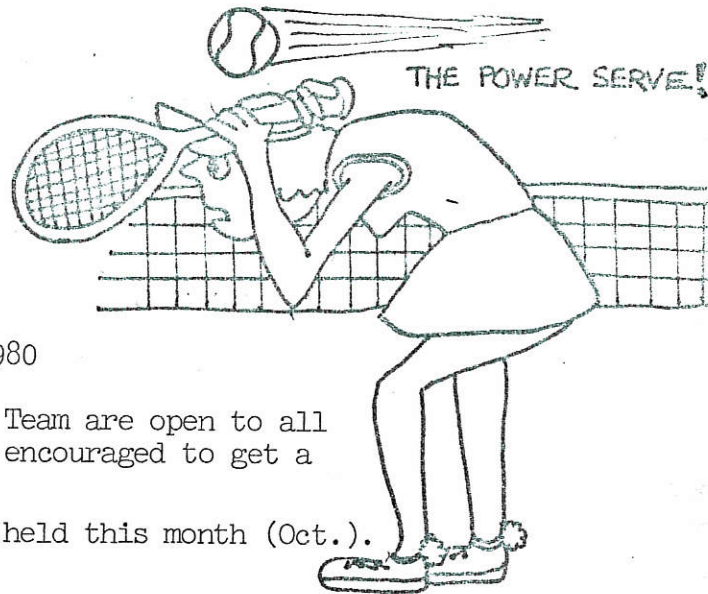


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women' singles tennis ladder

Despite the late summer heat wave, the holiday season and its many parties will soon be upon us. The following recipe is easy to make but will be a favorite at the hors d'oeuvres table.

Appetizer

CRAB OR SHRIMP SPREAD from the Kitchen of Phyllis Luengen

1 heaping cup crab or shrimp meat
1 8oz. package cream cheese
1/4 cup prepared horse-radish
Juice of half a lemon
Salt, fresh ground pepper and onion powder - to taste
1/3 cup fresh minced parsley

Mix all ingredients well. Refrigerate at least 4 hours. Serve on cocktail size rye bread.

COCA COLA CAKE ICING

1/2 cup margarine
3 tbsp. cocoa
6 tbsp. Coca Cola

Combine margarine, cocoa and Coca Cola in saucepan. Heat to boiling. Pour this sauce over the sugar. Beat well. Add nuts. Spread over hot cake.

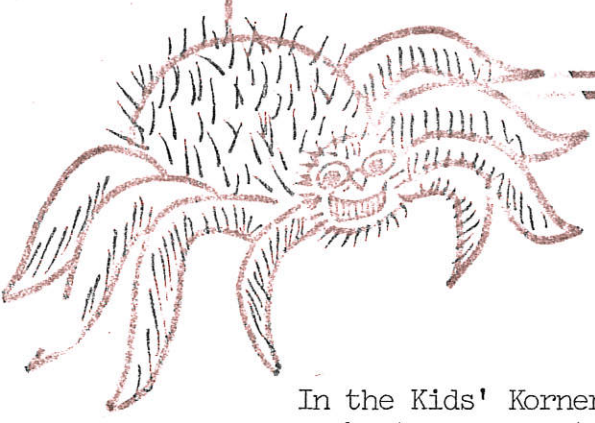
