Their dedication makes this community successful, and they deserve all our thanks and support. Not to be forgotten is a dedicated Management Staff which makes it easier for the Board to function.

Considering other items of interest, so often we suggest that young people are not caring, and include all of them in this category. Most kids are really great...it is only the few who make it uncomfortable for the many. Recently, a young Niguel Shores man was found to be doing something which did not conform to community rules. His response! He offered five hours of his time for comunity service to our organization. Our thanks to him for his contribution.

"JAWS" ALERT

Well...maybe just teeth, but they're made of iron, so beware! Watch for the green light.

As a result of Board action taken at the open meeting September 18, the teeth at all entry/exit gates throughout Niguel Shores will be in operation once again effective Friday, October 4.

We would like all residents to be aware that gate damages included several incidents of vandalism. The consensus was that reactivation of the teeth, plus operating gate arms, would at least reinforce our limited access image to the degree possible.

Past President Lloyd Somer-field, at the last Annual Meet-ing, reported from independent sources and our legal counsel that our community is considered by our counterparts to be a "model" for others to follow. We should be pleased with this assessment of our organization by others.

After almost two years, the Ad Hoc Refurbishment Committee was unable to come up with a proposal in a form which could be presented to the community for a vote; therefore, the Board has chosen to dissolve the committee. We sincerely, appreciated the efforts of all committee members who worked so hard. If there is a desire by some to continue this program, the Board will consider reestablishing this Ad Hoc committee in the future.

SECURITY - NO

Confusion regarding security continues from time to time. clarification, I refer you to the CC&Rs as amended, Article Section F. The Association does not provide security. Our mary responsibility is the control of vehicular access and the protection of common area Yes, we do have a facilities. patrol which is consistently, defined hours, cruising community to enforce Association vehicular and other regulations. It does, by its very presence and visibility as a by-product, offer a possible deterrent to unwanted intrusions. However, its purpose is not that of security. Certainly, if the patrol notices something unusual, it will be noted and, in the case of private homes, reported to the owners as a courtesy. The patrol has also cooperated with local law enforcement authorities by providing information relating to their observations when we have been able to make a contribution that end.

NEIGHBOR RELATIONS

We have had an ongoing communication with our neighbor, Ritz-Carlton, most recently concerning their obligation to maintain the slope areas adjacent to Cabrillo Seaward Isles. pleased to report that they now are maintaining these areas in a judicious manner, an together we have established a procedure to monitor this on an ongoing cooperative basis. We certainly thank them for their efforts.

THE MONTHS AHEAD

There are many other issues facing the Association such as assessments for 1992, amending rules and the CC&Rs, and our entry problems, but space limits my addressing these at this time. They could be subjects for future letters. Please read the Seashore News and other communications to keep informed.

In closing, I would like to remind all owners that the Board is dedicated to serving the entire community in an atmosphere of openness, considering our obligations as defined in the CC&Rs as well as the civil codes governing Association Law. As the end of the year approaches, with all its activities, the Board and I hope that you will continue to enjoy our beautiful community and its facilities.


OPEN BOARD MEETING WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 16, 1991 8:00 P.M.

The agenda for this meeting will be available in the office on the Monday afternoon prior to the open meeting.

SEPTEMBER BOARD ACTIONS

- 1. Per discussion with Association attorney, the Board will not become involved with contacting alarm companies for presentation to homeowners. There could be an implied liability to the Association.
- 2. Reiterated that residents entering through Mariner Gate, without proper vehicle decal, must show pictorial I.D. every time they enter.
- 3. Chose Option #1 (painting) for maintenance to the overhead structures. Accepted contractor bid and work will commence January 1992.
- 4. Funded homeowner entry walk replacement because coral tree roots raised walk approximately six (6) inches.
- 5. Per recommendation of committee chairpersons, appointed Sharon Stewart to Community Relations and George Williams to Landscape.
- 6. Raised directors' and officers' liability insurance to total coverage of \$5 million. Chose not to purchase earthquake insurance for common area.
- 7. Directed management to have maintenance staff reattach gate spikes for operation as of October 4 (see article).
- 8. Dissolved Refurbishment Committee and directed that a homeowner interest survey be issued in the Seashore News.
- 9. Authorized management to purchase replacement concrete backrest for bench (beach) at cost of \$225.

- 10. Contracted with Converse Consultants for association-wide survey of slopes. This report will update last one dated November 3, 1989.
- 11. Approved expenditure from contingency funds for installation of two (2) small drains, cost \$865. These are needed to alleviate potential liability problems.
- 12. Accepted Landscape Committee recommendation to authorize removal of the three (3) coral trees on the north side of the community center office and replace with two 24" box trees of a different species.



KEEP DOORS CLOSED AND LOCKED

Resident Barbara Kiger has reported the theft of a bicycle from their garage while they were at home. This is not unusual. Several people have reported such thefts over the years, often during daylight hours and while they were just in another room in the house.

A garage-door-opener kept in a car that is parked in the drive or on the street is a great target for a thief.

Neighborhood Watch is looking for new volunteers to work on the committee. Please leave your name at the office in writing if you are interested in helping to prevent incidents such as those mentioned above.

ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

It is important for all residents of Niguel Shores as well as those who live or work in Dana Point to read, and hopefully, complete and return the survey that appears elsewhere in this issue. This same survey is being circulated through other homeowners' associations, at veterinary clinics, libraries and at other locations in the city. The results of the survey are scheduled to be presented to the City Council by November.

The plight of lost, strayed, injured or abandoned dogs and cats in this area has become increasingly tragic, as has the situation concerning wildlife seeking food nd water no longer available in their former habitat because of burgeoning developments. Anyone who has waited long hours for County assistance in caring for an abandoned or in-jured animal, or who knows how many of these finally D.O.A. because of the long distances travelled after eventual pick-up, can understand the vital necessity of improved services and more localized shelter.

Our committee, having visited the various shelters and animal control agencies in this County, is preparing a feasibility study evaluating these services and exploring cost-effective alternatives to the County contract. You can help by completing the survey and mailing it to the address appearing at the bottom of the survey. In order to meet the committee's deadline for its presentation to the City, the survey must be returned as soon as possible.

We expect that the repairs will be started in mid-October. Please be aware of traffic cones marking the repaired areas.

STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

The scheduled dates for street sweeping in October are Thursday and Friday, the 10th and 11th, and Thursday, the 24th. These dates are also noted on the attached calendar. If at all possible, you are requested to have your vehicles off the street on these dates to allow the street sweeper to do a thorough job.

MEDIANS GET NEW TURF

The new green turf in the center medians of Periwinkle and Leeward Drives is a gift from our landscape contractor, Dick Wendt. It replaces the ivy geranium not happy with those areas. When our budget allows, we will add some color areas to complete the new look.

Monarch Beach 92629

Unfortunately, the recent notice from the Post Office mailed to all residents in Niguel Shores erred in referring to us as living in an area "previously called Monarch Beach." We still live in an area called Monarch Beach!

Just as Hollywood is in the city of Los Angeles and Corona Del Mar in Newport Beach - we are Monarch Beach, city of Dana Point. The new zip code took effect September 23rd. When stating our address the use of Monarch Beach or Dana Point or both names may be used. Since Monarch Beach is not yet printed on any map, consideration of using Dana Point in the address may be desirable. The new zip code, incidentally, reads the same backwards making it easy to remember.

If you wish to know your four digit number following the zip code, check with the Post Office. Warning, the four digit numbers vary within the community.

VANDALISM COSTS EVERYONE!

The Board of Directors has requested that homeowners be kept informed as to how much is being spent for vandalism repairs. During the period June 3 through September 13, the Association spent approximately \$1068.00 for replacement of various items destroyed by vandals. The majority of this money was spent on gate arm repair/replacement (\$525) and replacement of concrete bench back (\$225).

Help the Association stop vandalism! NEIGHBOR SAVES SHORES MAN FROM FLAMES

DANA POINT - A quick-thinking neighbor saved a Niguel Shores man by awakening him just before a smoky electrical fire engulfed his home, county fire officials said.

Joseph D. Middlebrook, 55, was not injured in the September 16th blaze that gutted his unit on Brisbane Bay, county Fire Department spokeswoman Maria Sabol said.

Sabol said that the fire broke out in the kitchen of Middle-brook's home at 10 pm, apparently as a result of a faulty lamp.

Middlebrook was asleep in his bedroom as flames began to race through the dwelling, Sabol said. There were no smoke detectors, she said.

A neighbor, Udo Stoeckmann, noticed smoke pouring from Mid-dlebrook's home and, after calling 911, ran to the home and began yelling. Middlebrook woke up and escaped through a sliding glass door in his bedroom.

"The guy would be dead if it wasn't for his neighbor," Sabol said. "When you don't have a smoke detector and you don't hear anything, people die from smoke inhalation."

Firefighters took about 15 minutes to extinguish the blaze. The loss was estimated at \$141,000.

5107 Use of Tennis Courts (08-21-91)

1. Court reservations may be made at the Community Center office no earlier than 7:00pm two days in advance of the playing date. (Example: sign-ups for Saturday reservations can be made at 7:00pm the previous Thursday). Reservations are made on a "first come - first served" basis.

Court 1, the racking court, is available for reservation on weekdays from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. and on weekends and holidays from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.

From 9:00 a.m. to noon Mondays and Fridays and from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, the Tennis Professional has first call on the use of Court 1. The rest of the time Court 1 is a racking court.

- Courts must be relinquished when scheduled time is up: Weekdays - 1 hour. Weekends - Singles, 45 mins; Doubles, 1 1/2 hours.
- 3. If a court is not occupied within 10 minutes after scheduled time, it will be opened for use of racking players or standby players, on a "first come first served" basis.
- 4. Reservations may only be made by or for a current resident and only one court reservation per day is permitted.
- 5. Players who do not appear to use the court they reserve and who fail to call in or come in before the scheduled time to cancel the reservation may lose the privilege of making reservations for one month.
- 6. Players are required to sign in upon arrival by initialing the space next to their names and noting the time. Failure to sign in may forfeit the court.
- 7. Players are encouraged to play doubles during "prime" time and whenever possible.
- 8. Tennis etiquette is to be observed at all times and must observe posted court rules.
- 9. Children under 6 years of age are not permitted on the courts unless accompanied by an adult and playing tennis. Children over 6 must be players or seated spectators. Players may use an unoccupied court until the end of a reservation period when players with a reservation appear and are ready to play.

- 10. No food or open beverage containers are allowed on the courts.
- 11. Courts are to be used for tennis only. No skateboarding or roller skating.
- 12. Tennis activities sponsored by the Association shall have priority over two or three courts on weekends.
- 13. Tennis clinics, private lessons or any group tennis instruction must be approved by the Community Center staff four weeks prior to being conducted and must be open to all members. No tennis lessons will be permitted during prime weekend playing time.

CITY OF DANA POINT ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES SURVEY

Animal control services for the City of Dana Point, at a cost of approximately \$50,000 per year, are presently contracted out to Orange County. The Orange County Animal Shelter, which is located in the City of Orange, provides shelter services, veterinary services, licensing and field services to Dana Point and 21 other cities under contract for the same services. Presently, the Orange County Animal Shelter provides 2 truck units during the day and 1 truck unit at night to cover the cities of Laguna Niguel, Mission Viejo, San Juan Capistrano, as well as Dana Point.

The Dana Point City Council recently appointed an Animal Control Services Advisory Committee to review the services provided to the residents of Dana Point by the County contract, to recommend ways to improve current and future services, and to determine the costs and feasibility of providing these services locally.
