
These residents run with several other neighbors every Saturday and Sunday at 6:30 AM starting from the bridge. Newcomers are always welcome!

RECYCLING PROGRAM

NEWSPAPER PICKUP FOR: NOVEMBER --- 10th and 24th

DECEMBER --- 8th and 22nd

Our Seashore News for October indicated November 13th as the first Nobember pickup. Please correct your calendar to the 10th for the first pickup.

Newspaper pickup of September 22, 1980 . 13,450 lbs \$168.13 October 13, 1980 . 24,860 " \$310.75 \$478.88

Our selling price for reclaimed paper has been raised to \$25 per ton effective September 22.

Aluminum salvage for September was 155 lbs at 27¢ per pound totalling \$41.85. This brings our salvage income for the past 30 days to over \$500.

Dale Baltimore has informed us that he and his small group of helpers have at last FINISHED the restoration of our street signs. Over half of the signs needed sanding, nailing, glueing, and repairing. In a little over a year Dale has spent over 150 man hours on this work. After needed repairs, every street sign in our community has been painted with a high gloss black background, brown trim and gold letters.

Merle Zeigner assisted Dale in taking down and replacing the heavy signs, as well as repairing many signs and posts. Stan Thompson personally carved six new signs which needed replacement. Dale estimates that \$200 of our paper salvage funds were used for paint and repair parts; however, the value of the voluntary labor contributed by Dale, Merle and Stan is beyond calculation. Many, many thanks to these men for their efforts on behalf of our community. It was a needed job - well done!

The kitchen refurbishment is not yet complete, but we are still committed to supplying a new commercial type refrigerator and new stainless steel sink using funds from this program. This will cost between \$1,000 to \$2,000.

Again, for the benefit of new residents and others newly interested, all types of paper except carbon paper are wanted for recycling. No cardboard or cartons may be used, except those cartons used to contain your paper. Paper must be contained either in cartons, large grocery paper bags, or tied with string. Simply stash the papers in your garage until pickup day, (second and fourth Mondays of each month), then place them at your curb by 12 o'clock of pickup day. The recycle truck will pass by your home sometime during the afternoon and take them away. That's all there is to it-except that we will collect a check based upon the weight of the paper calculated at \$25 per ton. Any household subscribing to the L.A. Times should be able to generate at least 25 pounds per week when the Times is supplemented by your junk mail, store brochures, and throw-away papers delivered to every house each week. At 14¢ per pound, each participating household could generate approximately \$1.35 to \$1.50 per month. With half of our residents participating, this could generate over \$600 per month. Alas, however, we don't actually have half of our people participating. so we have to settle for considerably less. Thanks to those who do participate, and "Welcome" to all newcomers. great program that we all can support.


LADIES DAY TENNIS

Eye-Openers from USTA's "CODE"

- Rule 9. No player should question another's call unless asked, but a player should always ask his opponent's opinion when the opponent is in a better position to see a ball; and once the opponent has given a positive opinion it should be accepted. In accordance with the laws of parallax, the opinion of a player looking down a line is much more likely to be accurate than that of a player looking across a line.
- Rule 9.1 When you are looking across a line, don't call a ball out unless you can clearly see part of the court between where the ball hit and the line. This means if you are half a court away and a ball lands within 2 in. of a line, it is almost impossible for you to call it with accuracy. A player who stands on one base line and questions a call concerning a ball that landed near the other base line is most likely being ridiculous.
 - 9.2 Unless you have made a local ground rule about balls that are obviously going out, when you catch in the air a ball that is in play, you have lost the point, whether you are inside or outside the court.
