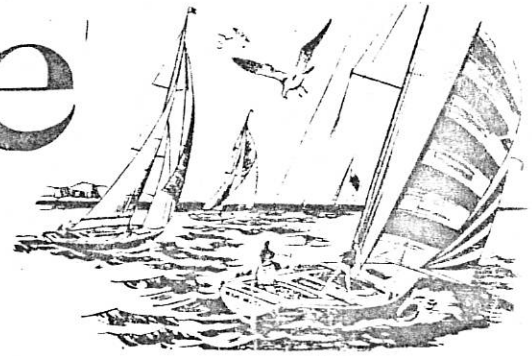

Since May of this year, Howard Magwood carefully selected the text and words for the column. His articles, while informative, often expressed appreciation for the efforts of individuals, committees, staff members and others for their efforts and accomplishments achieved for the benefit of Niguel Shores. It is only proper that this month's article be dedicated to him.


Howard Magwood succumbed to a heart attack on Friday, October 14, 1983, while playing tennis at the Laguna Niguel Racquet Club. His passing is a great loss to us all. His participation as a member of the Board of Directors since August 1982 and more recently as President, benefit us all. He attended not only Board Meetings, Committee Meetings and Business Meetings, but worked closely with fellow Board members and management staff to effect a well run organization.

At services held on Tuesday, October 18, 1983 an overflow attendance was noted. While the presence of many community members, business associates, family and friends was obvious, it was of particular interest to note the many young people in attendance. This fact indicates the diversity of those who held Howard in high esteem.

Mr. Magwood found time to deal with problems, big and small. He spoke with knowledge based upon thorough investigation and listened with interest and concern. He was a kind, tolerant yet firm individual, who never lost sight of the value of each person with whom he came in contact. He sought to find the worth of a person, not the faults. He strived to be fair, always listened to both sides in order to understand each person's point of view. He gave generously of his time and himself.

We shall all miss this quiet, effective, caring man - - we are all better for having known him !!

HOWARD MAGWOOD, President of Niguel Shores Community Association,
Succumbs to Heart Attack

Howard Magwood, a pioneer director/producer of television commercials, suffered a fatal heart attack October 14, 1983 while playing tennis at the Laguna Niguel Raquet Club.

For a number of years he was a partner in Rose-Magwood Productions, a producer of commercial films, with studios in New York, Hollywood, London, and Toronto, and an office in Chicago. The first director to win the coveted Clio award for three successive years, he ultimately won nineteen(19) Clios, two(2) Gold Lions (Cannes Film Festival), and two(2) Silver Lions (Venice Film Festival). He has also won the Best English Speaking Commercial Award at the International TV Commercial Festival, and hundreds of runner-up awards.

Magwood was also one of the founders, and first president of the Screen Directors International Guild -- in New York in 1959 -- which later melded into the existing Directors Guild of America.

Born in Grass Valley, Oregon in 1916, he attended Oregon State University, was an Army captain in World War II. Working in early television, he directed such well known shows as Beulah and Omnibus. Later, with his own production company, he helped set the pattern for such pioneering TV commercials as that of the dancing Old Gold cigarette package.

Always active in community affairs wherever he lived -- in New York, in Los Angeles -- he was, at the time of his death, President of the Niguel Shores Community Association.

He leaves his wife Frances, daughter Donna, son Jeff, brother W.S. "Phil" Magwood (former advertising manager of the L.A. Times), and two sisters, Connie Magwood of Santa Barbara and Donna Andersen of Ventura.

BOARD CHANGES

In view of the above, the following Board changes are announced: The Board has elected MR. HARRIE WHITNEY to fill the vacancy in the Presidency through May, 1984.

Further, MR. FORREST OWEN, currently Chairman of the Security Committee, has been asked to join the Board of Directors as Second Vice President to fill the vacancy created by Mr. Magwood's demise, again through May, 1984.

MANAGER'S COLUMN


Within this month's edition of this newsletter are many comments about the President of our Association, Mr. Howard Magwood and his untimely death. I shall only say that the staff and I had the highest regard for Mr. Magwood. We appreciated his support and confidence. It was a pleasure to work with a man of his caliber, dedication and accomplishments. He was businesslike, yet friendly and pleasant at all times - even the difficult times. WE WILL MOST DEFINITELY MISS HIM!

I - Beach Slope Repairs are underway at the time of the preparation of this article. Phase I is an improved repair of the damaged slope and "Rip Rap" which required no coastal permit, hearings, etc. Phase I is limited to a height of thirteen(13) feet above mean sea level. A Phase II improvement, recommended by our consultants, would improve the protection of the beach slopes up to a height of eighteen(18) feet above mean sea level is being considered. It will be submitted to the Coastal Commission for permits, etc. and if permitted, the work would then commence approximately early 1984.

II - A Reminder About Delinquency Of Association Assessments
Members are reminded that under provisions of the Association's governing documents(Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions), the priveleges of use of the Recreation Center(tennis courts, swimming pool, jacuzzi, etc.) facilities may be suspended to any member(s) whose Association Dues are not kept current. Until recently, the option to suspend priveleges had not been invoked. With the increase in delinquency, the Board has invoked its right to do so and this has had a favorable effect on the delinquency problem. Remember, if the unit is leased or rented, the tenant(s) (and guests) privileges are also suspended. Further, if you are experiencing a financial problem and will be late in making your payments, a note or call to the Administration Office may provide information and/or suggestions which may eliminate additional costs.

III - Bathroom: Refurbishing Project
During October, significant repair, clean up and modification is underway within the Community Center Rest Rooms, Dressing Rooms and Showers. These repairs will improve our ability to properly maintain these areas, not to mention make your use of them more pleasant. New floor tile in the dressing rooms and entry is being purchased from the "Paper Recycling" fund and installed by Men's Club Volunteers - MANY THANKS to the Men's Club for their participation in this maintenance project.

IV - A Final Comment
Vandalism of Association property costs you money. A REWARD is offered in connection with this activity. The specifics are noted elsewhere in this newsletter. Make a "buck" by saving the Association "bucks" - Collect a Reward and do your community a service - turn the offender in!

BOARD OF DIRECTORS "ACTIVITY CAP"

DURING OCTOBER, 1983, THE BOARD:

- Entered into a contract with L.S. Hawley Company of Irwindale, to make the Beach Slope Repair (as discussed in last month's issue of Seashore News) and executed the necessary agreement with the County of Orange in connection with the Beach Slope Repair Project.
- Considered the problem(s) of repair of the overhead entry structures in the Garden Home Area and gave direction to staff for follow-up.
- Approved a "Christmas Holiday Camp" program outlined by the summer staff Recreation Director, Kim Gabrielson and approved by the Recreation Committee.
- Authorized expenditures for replacement of certain driveway/walkways and curbs needing repair.
- Reaffirmed operating policies related to multi-purpose room use and class instruction percentage and procedures.
- Heard update reports from General Manager on Shores Gate (entry) remodel, currently anticipated for February/March 1984 to be done by AVCO Community Developer.
- Took under consideration, a request from the Architectural Committee, that a separate Architectural Committee (subcommittee, Architectural) be established to deal specifically with "Tree View Blockage" matters.
- Authorized funds to convert (rear) tennis gates so that they will permit tennis court users to go out to reclaim tennis balls via self locking gates.
- Approved staffs operating policy requiring deposit on member's use of "Small Animal Traps."
- Acted to fill vacancies of Presidency and Board membership created by the death of Mr. Howard Magwood.

HOWARD MAGWOOD - A CLASS ACT

Howard Magwood was my neighbor and my friend. We arrived at the Shores around the same time, came from similar backgrounds, and enjoyed an almost immediate empathy. He often wondered how two "show-biz Democrats" were "allowed" in Orange County - a good question.

Howard was one of those rare men who were secure enough in themselves to be tolerant of others. Although quiet-spoken, he had strong convictions, yet retained an even-tempered objectivity and genuine respect for dissenting opinions. He was a caring man, devoted to his family and concerned about his country and the community in which he lived.

His sense of humor was rich and often turned upon himself, as happened one morning when I walked my dogs past his house. Suddenly, a large Labrador flew out of nowhere, prepared to pounce upon my two dogs. Howard sized up the situation immediately and advanced towards the Labrador. "Run on ahead!" he instructed, "I'll deal with this." He grabbed the dog as I hurried. Looking back, and realizing the Lab's strength, I became anxious. "Be careful, Howard - remember your Pace-maker!" He merely grinned back, "Don't worry, I won't tell the dog about it."

In his retirement, as in his work, he was always the consummate pro. Even at the end, he passed from this vale quickly and quietly, causing the very least amount of inconvenience. It was, as Fran put it, "a class act, all the way." There's only one problem about class acts - they are irreplaceable.

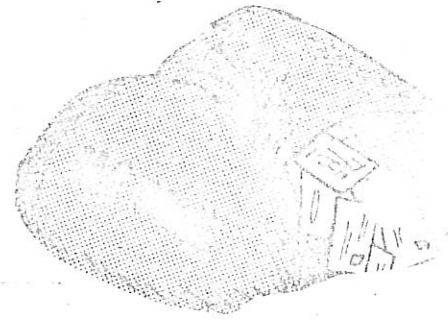

We wish our commendation to be known to the Board on behalf of their ongoing surveillance and successful personal efforts thus far in correcting the above stated problems.

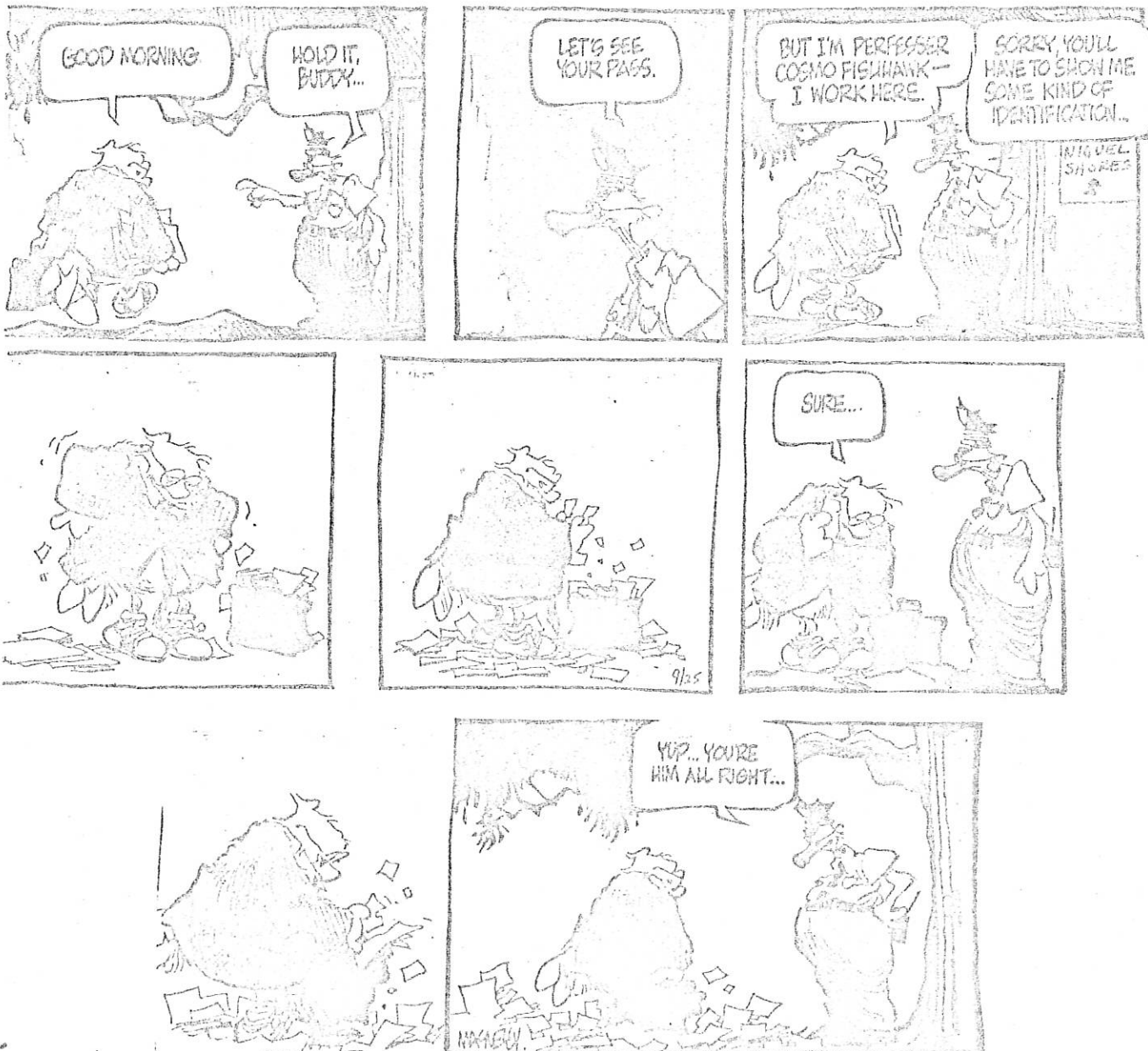

According to Brad Gates, Sheriff of Orange County, this program has helped reduce residential burglaries in some communities over seventy five percent. He is a whole hearted supporter of Neighborhood Watch and has provided much of the printed material being distributed as we initiate Neighborhood Watch in Niguel Shores.

Neighborhood Watch is becoming a reality in the Shores. Nearly 700 sets of materials made up of residence signs, decals, a know your neighbor form, an emergency phone number sticker, and a printed pamphlet have been distributed. Signs are up at all entrances and additional signs will be placed at key locations within the community.

A TRUE STORY ABOUT NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

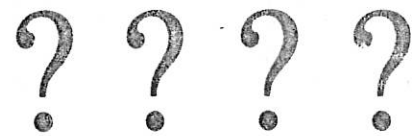
Early in October the Villas neighborhood had already been alerted to the Neighborhood Watch program in Niguel Shores. David Ohrn reports that one of his neighbors on Porto Verde was coming home around midnight when his car headlights caught a stranger heading into another neighbor's yard. Our alert friend jumped out of his car, shouted for the man to stop, and warned the neighbors, many of whom responded at once.

The shirtless, shoeless prowler was cornered at a wall next to Chula Vista Street and, in fact, was threatened with a hastily obtained sword! Other neighbors called the Sheriff, who promptly responded with squad cars, and the suspect was booked for prowling and trespassing and taken away.

Neighbors too numerous to mention living on Porto Verde, Porto Nuevo, and Vista D'Onde participated in a successful conclusion to what might have been a serious robbery attempt and possible violence.

Must have a valid driver's license or instruction permit.

Vehicle license:

All motorized bicycles are now required to be licensed.

Our current rules and regulations require that any vehicle operating within Niguel Shores be licensed and operated by a licensed individual.

Checklist

Dear Customer:

RULES AND REGULATIONS

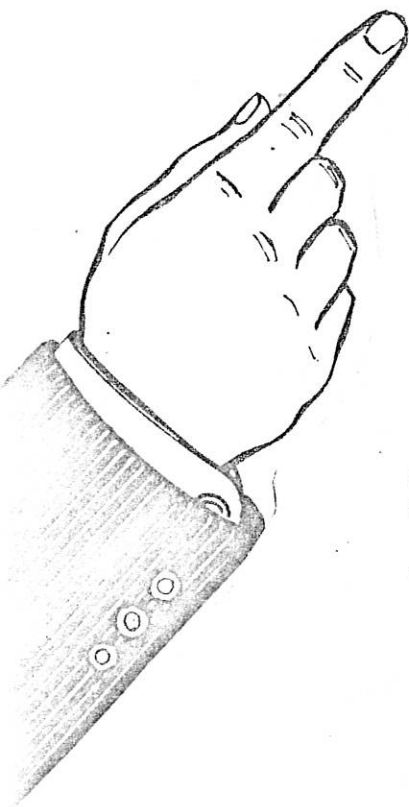
1. Rubbish must be out by 6:00 A.M.
2. Household collection to maximum of (6) 40 gallon containers.
3. Metal or plastic trash cans with handles, or trash bags are legal containers.
4. Boxes, oil drums, and cardboard boxes are not approved containers.
5. Total weight of container and contents must not exceed 50 pounds.
6. No liquids, sod, construction materials, bricks, etc., special arrangements for these items are available.
7. Newspapers must be bundled and tied.
8. Boxes should be flattened and tied.
9. Do not pack contents so tight that it will not fall freely.
10. Do not put broken glass in plastic bags.
11. Put cold ashes and sawdust in separate containers. Containers will be taken.
12. Tree limbs, bush trimmings etc., shall be tied securely in bundles not exceeding 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter and not weigh more than 50 pounds.

HELPFUL HINTS

1. Spraying container with an Amonia solution is a deterrent to animals.
2. Please don't leave toys or other objects near trash area unless you want them removed.

THESE FEW RULES ARE NECESSARY TO SAPEGUARD OUR MEN FROM INJURY AND PROVIDE THE UTMOST IN EFFICIENCY.

WE DO NOT PICK-UP on these holidays, Thanksgiving, Christmas, or New Years Day. If one of these days falls on your scheduled day, your pick-up will be on the following day.

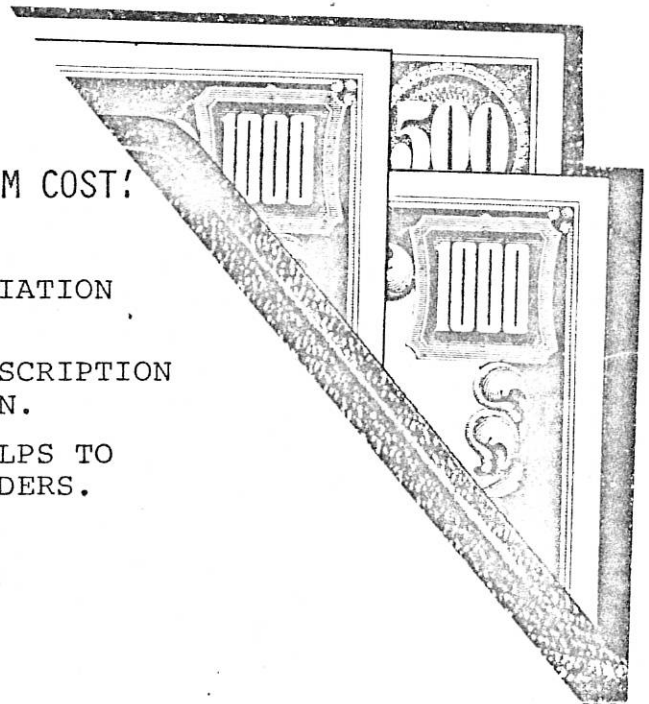

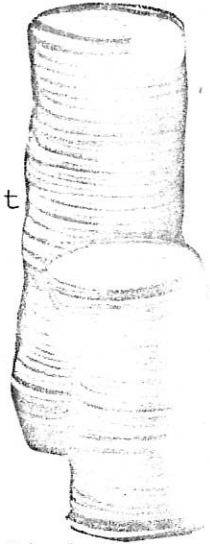

NIGUEL SHORES PAPER RECYCLING PROGRAM

Much has happened since my last report to the Niguel Shores residents.

FIRST - Our new paper storage building has been completed at a net cost to the community of ZERO. The recycling funds paid \$2420.85 which covered mostly materials. Some outside labor was used for framing, charged to us at his cost by Don Maier, our local contractor and Friday night bridge host. The building is provided with an automatic sprinkler system and sturdy double doors, locked at night for safety. Much of the construction and finishing labor was supplied by our Maintenance Staff, headed by genial Dick Elliott!



SECOND - As the result of having a much larger storage area, our recycler is able to pick up fewer, but larger loads, so we are obtaining an additional \$5.00 per ton - now \$30.00 per ton. This is really a big improvement over the \$7.00 per ton a little more than a year ago. Now - more than ever, it is extremely beneficial to our community to bring all your discarded paper to the storage shed, of course at your convenience - every day from 9am to 9pm. In addition to bringing in a nice sum from the sale of the paper, we also help our national conservation of forests and other materials used to manufacture paper.

For the benefit of new residents, we accept all kinds of paper, (newspapers, magazines, catalogs, books, and junk mail), packaged in large grocery bags, tied in bundles or stacked in cardboard cartons.

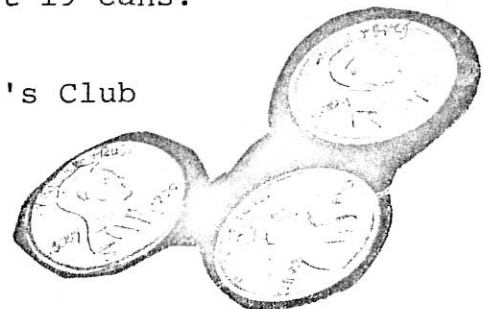
Please help our community salvage effort by joining in the patriotic national salvage program. ALL funds obtained are used for projects useful to the community at large, but for which funds are not budgeted by our Association.

The most recent project approved is the improvement of our two shower and locker rooms, by covering the present cement floors with beautiful beige tile.

Keep the paper coming - Don't "Trash" them - let us "Cash" them!

THIRD - Unfortunately, our Management has determined that storage and handling of aluminum beverage cans costs more than we can obtain from the sale of the cans. In addition, the cans are often delivered with remnants of beverages which attract ants and other insects. Therefore, we regretfully must decline further contributions of aluminum, until further notice. We strongly recommend that you continue collecting beverage cans and when you have a bag full, take them to Safeway Market where they will pay you about 20¢ or more per pound. One pound equals about 19 cans.

It works to slow the resting heart rate and lowers blood pressure. Exercise lowers blood cholesterol and other fats in the blood. Aerobic exercise reduces tension and other effects of stress. Other physical benefits are firmer body muscles and helps in lowering body weight.

A class in aerobic fitness is being offered; a one hour session of stretching, calisthenics and aerobic dance. You will be trained to keep yourself at your training heart rate, monitoring your pulse, learning your body's capabilities while progressing at your own speed.

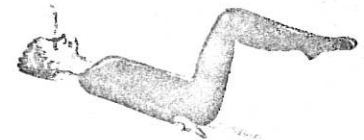
