One of our big problems in Niguel Shores is tree view blockage. According to NSCA Rule 4371, the Tree View Blockage Committee under our CC%Rs has the responsibility of protecting members from unreasonable view blockage caused by trees or shrubs on private property. This committee has been the arbitrator in disputes to settle these problems.

The biggest problem is the eucalyptus trees that were planted by the developer. The Association has removed a lot of these trees in the common area to avoid view blockage. The best solution is when residents get together with their neighbors and solve this problem peacefully.

I am planning to have an Open Board meeting on this topic after the first of the year. I would like all residents to attend and give their input.



GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

This Association's annual budget is nearing completion. In the next few weeks the budget for 1988's annual assessment will be established by your Board of Directors. Notices are due out approximately November 15, 1987.

Insurance renewal and coverage have been a major consideration as part of the annual budget. Over the past two years the availability and escalating costs of insurance have been of concern. Many if not most of you have no doubt read articles on the why's and why not's and rationales by the industry leaders and others on the

subject. Cities, municipalities and associations have been hit hard by these insurance problems.

This year brings yet another problem to associations, especially those with slopes such as we have in Niguel Shores. The renewal coverage being placed by your Association this year will now exclude any coverage for (or <u>related to) subsidence (slope movement</u> failure). Such coverage is no longer available. Until recently coverage was available for damages caused to a third party but not for repair of the slope itself. new coverage, however, no coverage is for that provided third party. Unfortunately, this reduction coverage does not result in reduction in premium.

It might be important to note that presumably home owners are no longer able to get coverage on their personal policies for subsidence either.

I keep looking for some good news to report — I'll keep trying.



MENS CLUB








COUPLES BRIDGE

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

When we are talking about burglary it is important to keep in mind that prevention starts in our own home. We are the first line of defense. No one can do more — not even our neighbors or the local sheriff's officers.

Here are some things you can do to start your burglary prevention program in your home:

- Be sure that all exterior doors including sliding glass doors have a dead bolt lock operated where possible with a key on both sides of the door.
- Be sure your front door is of solid wood construction.
- Be sure the metal strike plate is solidly attached to the door frame or jamb with 2-1/2 inch screws.
- Be sure your front door is equipped with a door viewer so that you can see the visitor before opening the door.
- Be sure trees are trimmed to prevent access to the second story and that shrubs are trimmed so they don't provide a convenient hiding place.
- Be sure there is good exterior lighting all around your home.
