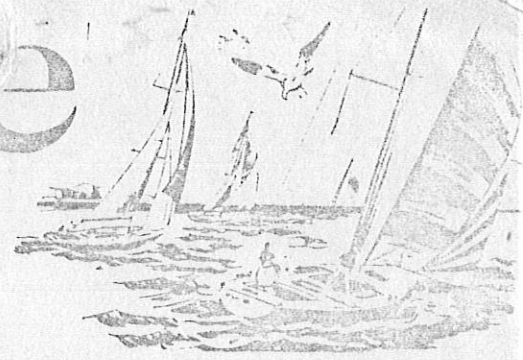
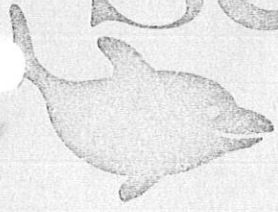

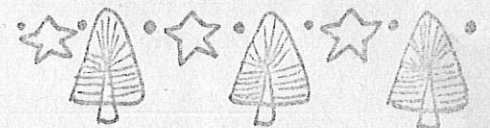

## Manager's Report

Snail Bait Application. Between the period of December 17th and 21st, the Landscape Contractor will apply snail bait to all common areas, or all areas maintained by them in order to properly control the snail population. In order that all areas be covered, we suggest that all residents apply snail bait of their own to the private property areas. By accomplishing this, it will give the entire community full coverage.

Street Sweeping Schedule. The following schedule has been established for the remainder of this year and all of next for sweeping the streets within the community. On these particular days we urge residents not to park on the streets in order that the street sweeper can clean all areas.

Periodically our Landscape Contractor, after cutting down trees, will place logs from these trees along side a curb and any resident desiring these logs for firewood may pick them up at the various curb sides. After a few days, if these logs are not gathered by residents, the landscaping personnel will pick them up and dispose of them.

3-MONTH GUEST PASSES

Before you go to the office to obtain a 3 month guest pass you MUST HAVE THE NEEDED INFORMATION WITH YOU:

1. The MAKE of your guest's car.
2. The COLOR of your guest's car.
3. The LICENSE NUMBER of your guest's car.

These three things are very important.

ALL PASSES MUST BE TURNED IN TO THE OFFICE

When your guest leaves, have him drop the pass off at the office, or leave it with you to bring in.

At the end of the three month period when you go in to renew your passes for regular guests, you must bring in the old pass before we can issue another.

This rule will be STRICTLY ENFORCED on January 1, 1980. Please make this as painless as possible. Your full cooperation with the office staff issuing these passes will be appreciated.

Newspaper pick-ups in December: 10th and 24th

Last month's recycled newspapers totaled 41,040 lbs, (20.52 tons), for a total revenue of \$328.24.

Aluminum was not picked up in October because the bin was not full, reflecting a reduction in consumption of cold beverages, and the passing of hot summer weather.

The pickup of November 12 constituted a record. The total of 26,780 lbs. was the largest ever for a single pickup. Our community is enthusiastically supporting this program and we are all benefiting accordingly.

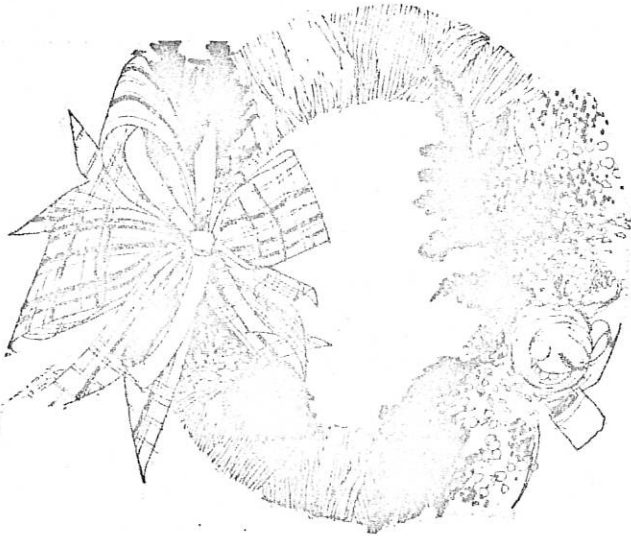
# RECREATION COMMITTEE

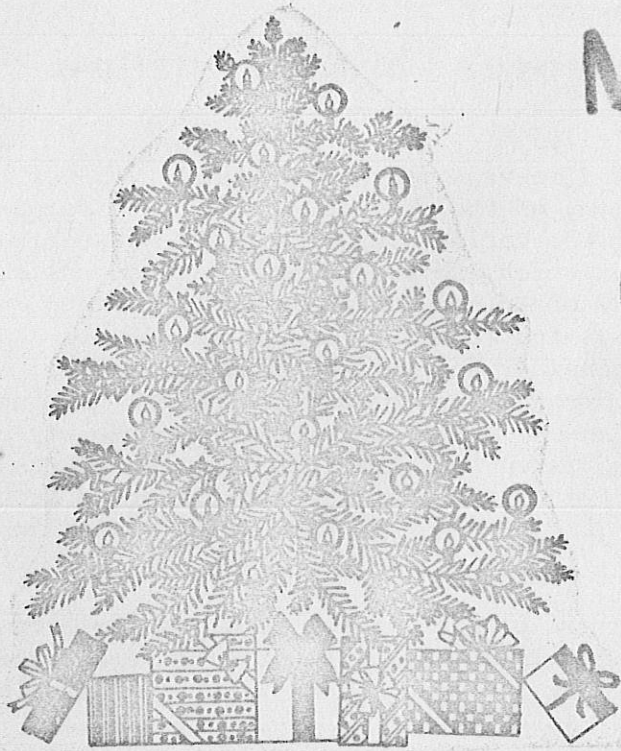

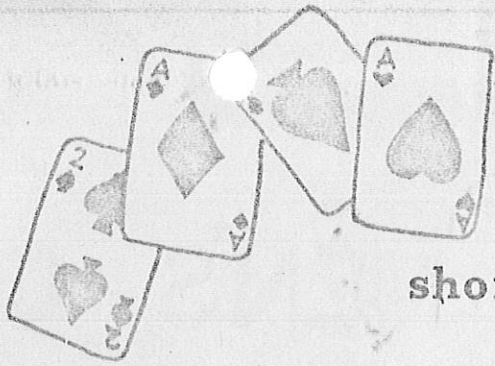

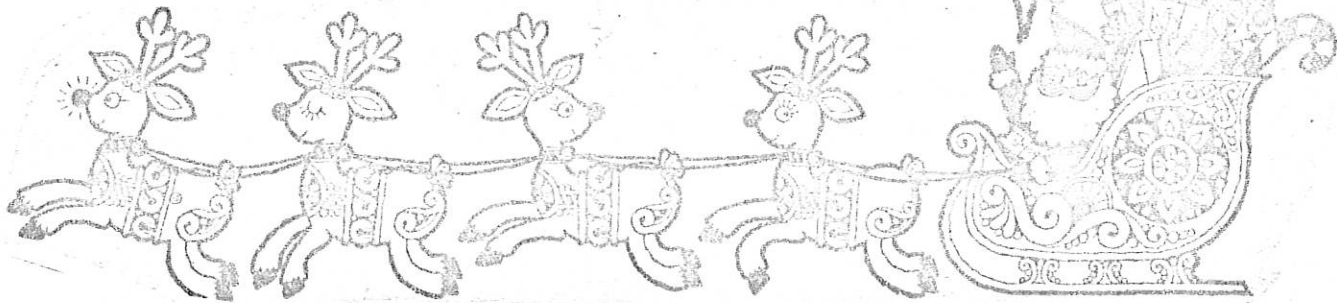


## **—AFTERNOON PROGRESSIVE BRIDGE**

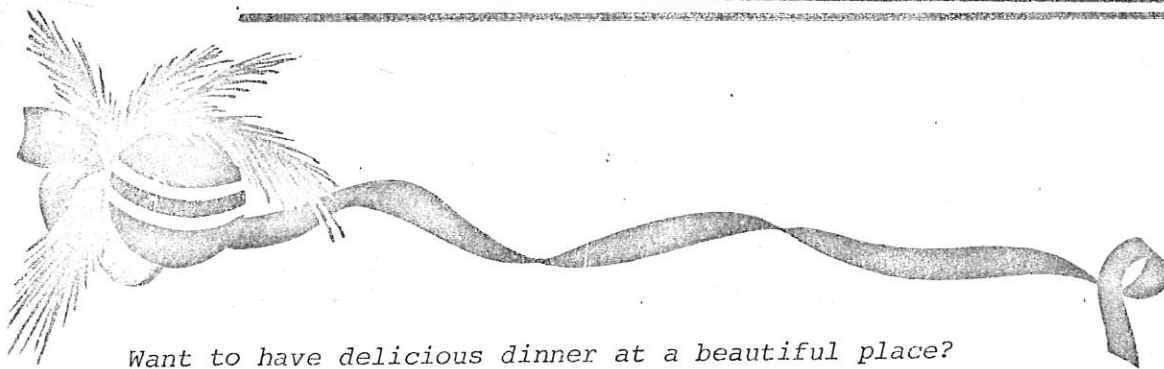

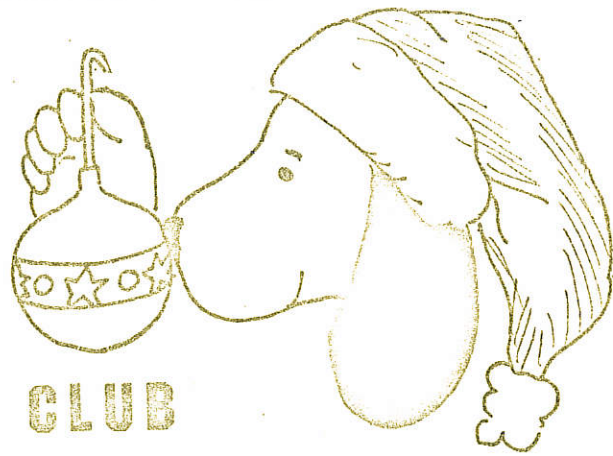

# Shores Cuisine



The following dessert was brought to one of the potlucks and received so many compliments and requests for the recipe, it was decided to share this recipe with the community. A delightful addition to our holiday faire!

## Dessert

### "BLUEBERRY CREAM PIE"

from the kitchen of JACKIE MAIER of  
Windward

Chill at least 2-3 hours or overnight. You can also use other pie fillings, thawed frozen strawberries, lightly sweetened fresh fruit or lemon pudding. Serves 6. For 12 servings or 24 potluck size servings, double the above ingredients putting crumbs on the bottom only of a 7 x 11" pyrex casserole dish.

Here's help for all those with leftover turkey and tired of the same old variations. A very timely recipe!

## Soup

### "TURKEY-OYSTER GUMBO"

from the kitchen of PEG MAYNARD of Dosinia

Cover carcass with approximately 1½-2 gallons water in large pot.  
Add 1 small bunch celery, chopped coarsely including leaves.  
Add 2 med. onions, chopped.  
Salt, black and red pepper to taste.  
Simmer until meat falls off bones. Allow broth to cool and carefully remove any meat clinging to bones. Discard bones and carcass.  
Re-heat, adding 1/3 cup chopped parsley.  
Cook for 20 minutes.  
Just before serving, place ½ cup cooked rice in each individual serving bowl.  
Two minutes before serving, add 3 doz. oysters to the simmering gumbo along with their liquid. (DO NOT OVERCOOK OYSTERS OR THEY WILL BECOME RUBBERY.).  
Pour gumbo over rice, sprinkle 1 T. filé (ground sassafrass) over the mixture.  
Serve and enjoy.
