You have probably seen such monstrosities on overpasses as you drive the freeways. Unplanned expenditures such as these have an unrelenting tendency to drive up our dues. While I am on the subject of vandalism, you should be aware that since before Christmas we have been averaging at least two to three thefts a week from parked cars in the Shores. Thus far, only unlocked cars have been relieved of key cards, fobs, and whatever other personal valuables are present. PLEASE lock your cars. A few people keep wondering why we need to attempt to limit access to Niguel Shores. The above actions seem to be an explanation - unless, heaven forbid, the vandals are all residents! Wouldn't it be ironic if we were locking the fox inside the henhouse?

JANUARY BOARD ACTIONS

- ♦ Appointed Nick Moffitt to the Traffic & Safety Committee.
- ♦ Accepted the yearly visual slope observation report dated 12/28/99 from Converse Consultants involving the lower Nauticus Isle slope. Staff was also directed to mail a copy of the report to all Nauticus Isle homeowners.
- ♦ Authorized staff to contract with Wendt Landscape Service to remove, then reinstall, an underground drain line in the greenbelt, along Windward Dr. Cost for this work will be \$5,810 for 800 feet of drain line.

- ♦ Directed staff to notify Lincoln Security that they must direct their Mariner gate personnel to ask each and every resident for their P.I.C. [personal identification code] when calling to authorize guest entry.
- ♦ Directed staff to post the drawing for the proposed replacement structure for the wooden torri gate structures that span each Bay street at the Community Center. Homeowners may send comments to the Board.
- ♦ Authorized staff to have the 2000 NSCA information booklet printed and distributed to all residents.
- ♦ Accepted Frank Turner's resignation from the Architectural Committee.
- ♦ Appointed Dave Inglis to the Landscape Committee as the representative for Atlantic Garden Homes.
- ♦ Authorized staff to accept the lowest bid for miscellaneous concrete repair work with cost not to exceed \$5,000.
- ♦ Authorized staff to purchase additional monument marker lettering for the Garibaldi entry and the Selva Rd. wall. Our maintenance staff will install.
- ♦ Authorized staff to obtain bids to remove all remaining torii gate structures.
- ♦ Appointed the 2000 Nominating Committee for the Board of Directors election scheduled in May: Jerry Pearl, Ceacy Johns, Ed Adams, Karl (Skip) Eissfeldt, Forrest Owen, and Harriet Writer. The Committee is chaired by Jerry Milner.

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

The year 2000 Landscape budget has been approved to maintain specific areas, as well as common areas.

Dick Wendt presented the Landscape Committee Project Schedule for 2000. The large *eucalyptus* trees along PCH will be trimmed in February. They will also trim the *eucalyptuses* behind the homes on Coral Bay, along Selva Road.

There were four homeowner requests in January which will be addressed shortly.

It has been suggested that the Committee nsider planting agonis trees, Brazilian peppers, and possibly a third variety to replace the eucalyptus trees on Niguel Road between Mariner Drive and PCH. These trees will provide the following advantages: (1) grow to approximately 25 feet, eliminating view blockages; (2) provide maintenance-free trees for the Association and homeowners; (3) have a large, thick head to block noise and dirt generated from Niguel Road. The eucalyptus trees will be removed after the new trees are planted and established.

If you have a light green cable box in or near your yard, the committee suggests you contact Cox Cable and request they replace the box with a faux rock cable cover, if you do not like the look of the box.

Some of the projects Wendt Landscape will complete this month are as follows:

VILLAS

- 1. Install improvements end of Porto Cristo:
 - a. 15 5-gallon Majestic Beautys
 - b. 1 15-gallon Brazilian Pepper Tree
- 2. Add 15 flats of *vinca major* near Garibaldi at Vista Grande.
- 3. Add between the existing *metrosideros* trees, along Via del Cielo, 13 5-gallon shrubs.
- 4. Expand island beds.

COMMON AREAS

- 1. Add two 24" box pine trees to Mariner Drive on east side, near Niguel Road.
- 2. Add concrete mow strip 750 lin.ft. along Mariner Drive.

CUSTOM HOMES

Add street trees on Magellan Isle. 12 15-gallon size-type to be determined.

SHORES GARDEN HOMES

Along entry side of Ports O'Call gate, replace oleander trees with 4 15-gallon *meleluca* trees.

SEA TERRACE I

Replace underground drain line along windward, from Halyard to Selva Gate. Line is below turf area between windward and Selva wall.

SEA TERRACE II

Along rear yard fences within Manta greenbelt park, add:

- a. 40 flats of vinca major
- b. 50 5-gallon rhaphiolepis
- c. 100 1-gallon agapanthus
- d. 4 15-gallon trees
- e. Demo & removal of two pines



TRAFFIC & SAFETY COMMITTEE

- 1. Membership: Nick Moffitt, a potential new member, attended as a guest.
- 2. Vehicle Gates: Bar code decals are now available to all residents. An application form was attached to the January newsletter. The program for issuance of computer-generated passes has been field-tested. As soon as a current database is available and incorporated into the system, and the staff is trained on the program, it will be on line.
- 3. Disaster Preparedness: The Disaster Preparedness Manual is now available in the office. Everyone is urged to be prepared.
- 4. Speed Trailer: The speed trailer has not been available recently as it was vandalized and is undergoing repairs. It should be back in the community shortly.
- 5. Extra Patrols: The committee has recommended to the Board that during the periods of spring break, Thanksgiving, and the week between Christmas and New Year's, an extra 8-hour patrol shift be added. There is an increase in the number of trespassers and vehicle violations during these periods.
- 6. Guests Lists: Residents are reminded when having a large party not to give the guest list to the officer at Mariner gate the day of the event. This will only cause confusion and possible delay or denial of entry to your guests. Bring the list to the office 48 hours in advance of the event so that passes can be prepared and be ready for your guests when they arrive.

· TREE VIEW BLOCKAGE COMMITTEE

We are approaching the season when tree and shrub pruning can be done while the plants are relatively dormant. Many of our trees and shrubs have become overgrown and misshapen and in need of a "haircut" which not only will enhance their appearance, but also enhance neighbors' views. We ask that you give your garden a good inspection and get your trees down below roof height and shrubs below fence height. Remember how fast they grow, so do more than just meet the height guidelines. Especially if you have received complaints about view blockage in the past, now is a fine time to do the trimming on your own schedule rather than wait to receive a new complaint and be faced with a deadline to get the job done.

THE "SAFE & HEALTHY" AIRPORT ISSUE

Defeating the proposed El Toro International Airport with its planned 24-hour a day usage of air space right over our heads (at 2000 to 3000 feet) ought to be something we are concerned about. So should the presence of 160,000 new car and truck trips per day on the 5 and 405 freeways converging near the El Toro Spectrum (County of Orange EIR).

Passing the Safe and Healthy Communities Act (a "Yes" on measure "F" on the ballot, March 7) will protect the value of your home. But it costs money to pass any ballot initiative. Right now, we have raised about \$20,000 towards a goal of \$40,000. So far, only 14% (137 homes) have contributed. Surely, we can and should do better. All money collected will go toward the estimated \$2,000,000 needed to pass measure "F."





THE IMPORTANCE OF CHIMNEY CAPS

Homeowners who have not installed a chimney cap should consider doing this to prevent burning embers from blowing onto your own roof and/or surrounding roofs. Seek Architectural Control Committee approval prior to installation.

REPLACEMENT STRUCTURE PLAN POSTED AT THE COMMUNITY CENTER

The Board is removing the existing torii gate wood structures that span the entries to the Bay streets because of dry/wet rot, termites, etc. A masonry structure will replace the wood structures that are going to be removed. This structure will be placed on each side of the Bay street, in the same approximate location as the existing wood structures. This masonry structure design is based on the Mariner gate and Breakers Isle gate renovations, and will blend in with the Cabrillo Isle gate renovation plans. A street name plate will be placed on one of the pilasters below the coach lamp so that a small light can be added to illuminate the sign. Comments about this design, either positive or negative, can be sent to the NSCA office for forwarding to the Board of Directors. The deadline to submit written comments is February 18, 2000.

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE .VILLING TO ACCEPT DONATIONS TO PLANT COMMON AREA TREES

In 1994, the Landscape Committee recommended to the Board that they adopt a policy to allow residents who choose to participate to contribute to a fund to purchase trees. The Board accepted the recommendation at their July 20, 1994 meeting.

Residents wishing to participate can send a check to the NSCA office for the current cost to purchase a 15-gallon tree. Our landscape contractor charges \$61 per tree. The committee chooses the tree type and determines where to plant the donated tree (s).

After a tree is planted, the donor will be notified of the tree's location. The committee will gratefully accept the donations.



HOLIDAY DECORATIONS MUST BE REMOVED BY FEBRUARY 7

Management performed a review of the community and noted some homes with holiday decorations still in place.

It is very important that the decorations be removed by February 7. Sometime during that week, management will tour the community and send hearing letters to those who have not removed their decorations.
