BOARD ACTIONS TAKEN IN JUNE

- ◆ Authorized staff to reimburse a visitor for damage to his windshield, amounting to \$250, when the Mariner gate visitor gate arm malfunctioned and struck his vehicle.

- ◆ Accepted Redge Griffin's resignation from the Finance Committee and appointed him to the Landscape Committee as the *Villas* representative.

- ◆ Appointed Jerry Milner to the Finance Committee.

- ◆ Authorized Lincoln Security Service to deny resident requests for visitors' entry through Mariner gate if the caller cannot provide a valid Personal Identification Code [PIC]. See article in this issue of the Seashore News.

- ◆ Authorized Lincoln Security Service to tow vehicles parked on common areas that are not displaying a valid pass of any type in plain sight. One hour warning notices will not be placed on the vehicle prior to towing. See article in this issue of the Seashore News.

- ◆ Authorized the use of the MPR for a children's puppet activity to be offered by Shilind Wheaton.

- ◆ Appointed Don Johnston to the Maintenance Committee.

- ◆ Authorized staff to make a change to the center island landscape planter between the swing gates and Niguel Shores Dr. The O.C. Fire Authority has advised that their longest truck has difficulty making the turn when it gets to Niguel Shores Dr. because of the length of the planter. Staff will arrange to have the end of the planter shortened.



LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

The Committee would like to thank Fred Standefer for his generous donation of an African Tulip tree which will be planted at the Mariner Gate near the sentry building.

The Committee has decided to remove every other flax plant on Mariner Drive, behind the gates and around the coral trees, because these thick, tall shrubs obstruct the view of incoming motorists from the intersection. Removing every other plant may open up the view for drivers. The plants will be relocated in appropriate areas throughout the Association. Wendt's current project schedule is as follows:

BERKUS: Add 100 ft. shrub bed along Abalone green belt.

CUSTOM: Renovate slope/corners along Cabrillo Isle and between Magellan Isle and Shackleton Isle.

ATLANTIC: Improve common areas and mask utilities throughout. Please remember this is a three year project; therefore, not all streets will be improved this year.

SHORES: Continue improvements in front yards.

TRAFFIC & SAFETY COMMITTEE

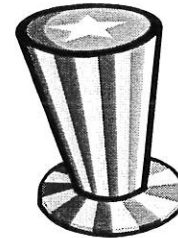
1. **Overnight parking:** Some residents with NSCA decals are obtaining day passes and are using them as authorization to park on the street overnight. These passes are not a waiver and DO NOT override the decals issued to the vehicle. These vehicles will be cited.
2. **Using Garages for Storage During Remodel:** If you plan to use your garage to store equipment and materials during a remodel, you will need a temporary waiver to park a vehicle on the street overnight. The NSCA office can assist you.
3. **Vandalism:** The community continues to be plagued with vandalism. So far this year, over \$500 has been spent in this area. The primary targets so far have been the greenbelt areas, coach lamps and the men's locker room. These are senseless acts that cost everyone time and money.
4. **Safety Reminders:**
 - a. Every bicycle rider under 18 years of age MUST wear an approved safety helmet. It is the law.
 - b. When going to the beach, remember the Vehicle Code prohibits ANYONE from riding in the back of a pick-up truck. This is a very dangerous practice.

"SAVE THE SONGBIRDS"

Over the past several years, we have noticed an ever-increasing number of marauding crows inhabiting our community. Like us, they must know when they have a good thing going. We have called the county/city "Animal Control" people about the problem only to be told they will not do anything about "wild animals." What function they fulfill spending the taxpayers' dollars then remains unclear. In any case, we have noticed on our walks that this band of crows is taking a severe toll on our local songbird population. On many occasions we have watched these crows destroy other bird's nests, eat the eggs, and in some instances eat the live young fledglings themselves.

Recently it has been brought to our attention that a certain resident on Shackleton Isle has been feeding these crows on a regular basis. While we laud anyone taking an interest in ornithology, this resident's actions appear to be somewhat misguided. We would ask therefore, that NSCA request this resident to terminate this practice immediately for the greater good of our local songbirds. Clearly, the crows don't need any help.

In addition, we would request that our association take steps to control these pests; either trap and remove them, or eradicate them before there are no songbird species left in our community to enjoy. According to "animal control," we have to take matters into our own hands.

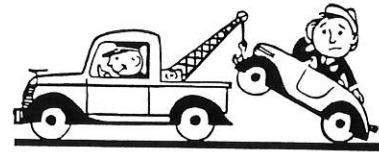
Every resident has either chosen a PIC, or has had a PIC chosen for them by Management. Therefore, use of the PIC is now MANDATORY. Effective Monday, July 10, you must use your PIC when you call the Mariner Drive gate. If you do not use your PIC, the Board of Directors has instructed the Gate Officer to deny access to your guest. You already leave your name and your street name and your guest's name. Now, please also leave your PIC. It's just that simple, but provides an added measure of safety.

BEACH LOT PARKING – JULY 4TH

Rule 6406 was modified in July of 1999, and now your guests can park their vehicles in the Beach Lot on July 4. Parking in the Beach Lot is no longer limited to resident vehicles with decals. However, your guests must park their vehicles in the *upper tiers* of the Beach Lot. If the vehicle has a Day Pass, a Special Entry Permit, or a Guest Parking Permit (Villas / ST2), the vehicle will be directed to the upper tiers of the Beach Lot by the Patrol Officer on duty July 4. A Patrol Officer will be stationed in the Beach Lot all day long. Please inform your guest to follow his instructions and comply with the Rules.

A DAY PASS IS NOT A WAIVER

Per Rule 6405, a vehicle with a decal cannot park on the street overnight (between 11:00 pm and 6:00 am) without a waiver. A Day Pass issued by the Mariner Drive Gate Officer is not a waiver. It does not override the decal on the vehicle. In fact, the Mariner Drive Gate Officer has been directed not to issue a Day Pass to a vehicle with a decal. If you have both a decal and a Day Pass on a vehicle parked on the street overnight, you will receive a Notice of Violation. If you need a waiver, please contact the NSCA Office.

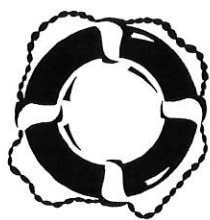


IMMEDIATE TOWING FOR NO ID

Rule 6440 Enforcement Procedures, Section C. Tow-Away Procedure, #5 states: *Removal may be made WITHOUT NOTICE of any vehicle not clearly displaying a valid NSCA decal or permit or pass easily readable through the windshield of the vehicle.* This has become almost as big a problem as vehicles with decals parking on the street overnight. However, we know who owns the vehicle with the decal, but we do not know who owns the vehicle with no id whatsoever. These vehicles are trespassing, and there are quite a few of them in NSCA on a daily basis. The Board will strictly enforce compliance with Rule 6440 C. 5. as of July 5. No warning. No citations. Signs are posted at each gate. The rules are printed on each permit and pass. Please observe and comply.

SUMMER PATROL HOURS

A Patrol Officer will be on duty from 10:00 am to 2:00 am daily through mid-September. The Patrol Officer observes conformance with NSCA Rules and Regulations involving the common areas and he issues violation notices. Common Areas include the streets inside the gates of NSCA. As posted, NSCA enforces the California Vehicle Code. You can help by reporting parking violations, vandalism, fence jumpers, and loud parties to the NSCA Office during business hours, or to the Mariner Drive gate after business hours. Also, it would be helpful if you would resolve neighbor-to-neighbor private property issues without involving the NSCA Office or the Patrol Officer. NSCA does not provide "security" and cannot trespass on private property. If necessary, call the Sheriff.



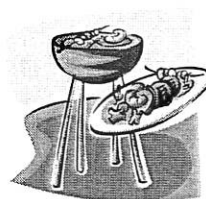
LIFEGUARD ON DUTY

A lifeguard will be on duty at the pool from 1:00 pm to 6:00 pm daily through September 10. When the lifeguard is on duty, children thirteen years of age and younger do not need to be accompanied by an adult, unless the child is six years of age and younger. Children six years of age and younger must be under direct adult (not the lifeguard, but another adult) supervision at all times.

The lifeguard is authorized to enforce our pool and spa rules, including:

1. Adult only swimming before 9:00 am and between 12 noon and 1:00 pm daily.
2. Shoulder length hair must be contained by rubber bands or bathing caps.
3. No food, alcohol, or glass containers are allowed in the pool or spa areas.
4. Floating apparatus (unless strapped to the swimmer), balls, toys, or sticks, are not allowed in the pool.
5. Swim diapers must be worn by all children three years of age and younger, and those who are not potty-trained.

Stay off the rope, and stay out of the lap lane unless you are swimming laps.

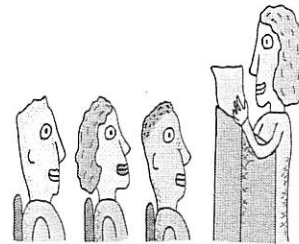
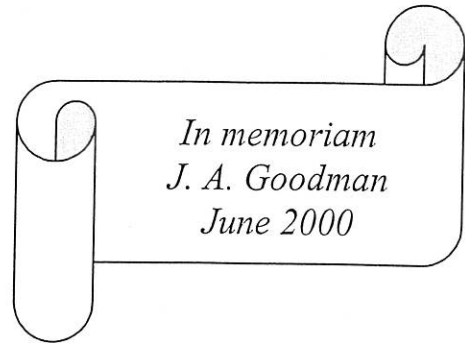

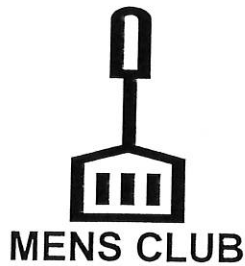

NUISANCE ANIMALS AND CODE ENFORCEMENT

NSCA has rules and regulations regarding animal nuisance – barking, defecation and cleanup, running loose, etc. We enforce the 9100 series of the rules and regulations through a series of letters *after the complaint has been verified*. But, staff is not here seven days a week, nor 24 hours a day, and sometimes we just can't verify the complaint. In addition, the Board is not going to set hearings or impose fines for the time being.

We have been advised that animal control in Dana Point is handled by Coastal Animal Services Authority, which enforces the city's codes. Just one phone call will generate a letter "with bite." Following the letter, a second call from the same individual regarding the same animal will initiate an investigation – is the animal licensed and does it have its shots? A call from another individual regarding the same animal will warrant the issuance of a citation with a fine/penalty attached. Dana Point and Niguel Shores encourages all residents to handle animal nuisance complaints through Coastal Animal Services Authority. Their phone number is 492-1617. Hopefully, enough calls from Niguel Shores' residents will persuade animal control to spend more time in the community on a regular basis.

Warning : White Flies!

Protect your plants, trees and shrubs! Inspect the leaves for white flies. If you have them you are encouraged to remove your plant, tree or shrubs or chemically treat them.

White flies seem to be particularly bad this year. The committee advises you to look carefully for them in your shrubs and flowers, particularly hibiscus. White flies congregate on the underneath side of leaves and are hard to detect from a cursory glance. To eradicate white flies and to keep them from spreading to other plants, Wendt recommends that you either remove deadly infected shrubs or use Ortho brand Orthene, which is a systemic spray. However, if you use Orthene, be sure to **follow instructions carefully**, especially with fruit trees and vegetable plants.

6211 Skateboards (07-15-92)

(07-01-00)

No person shall ride or cause to roll or coast any skateboard, roller skate, roller hockey or other conveyance powered by human power except a bicycle on the roadway portion of any road within Niguel Shores. Does not apply on cul-de-sacs less than 500 feet long.

6212 Skateboard Ramps (07-01-98)

A skateboard ramp is not permitted to be placed or used on sidewalks or through streets at any time, or on cul-de-sacs more than 500 feet long at any time.

Skateboard ramps must be removed from the front yard and stored away from the view of neighboring properties and streets each day by sunset, or when not in use.

6213 Motorized Skateboard (06-07-00)

No motorized skateboard may be propelled on any sidewalk, roadway, or any other common area within Niguel Shores.
