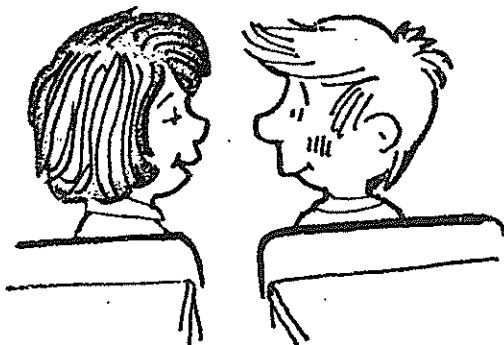
NEW - BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

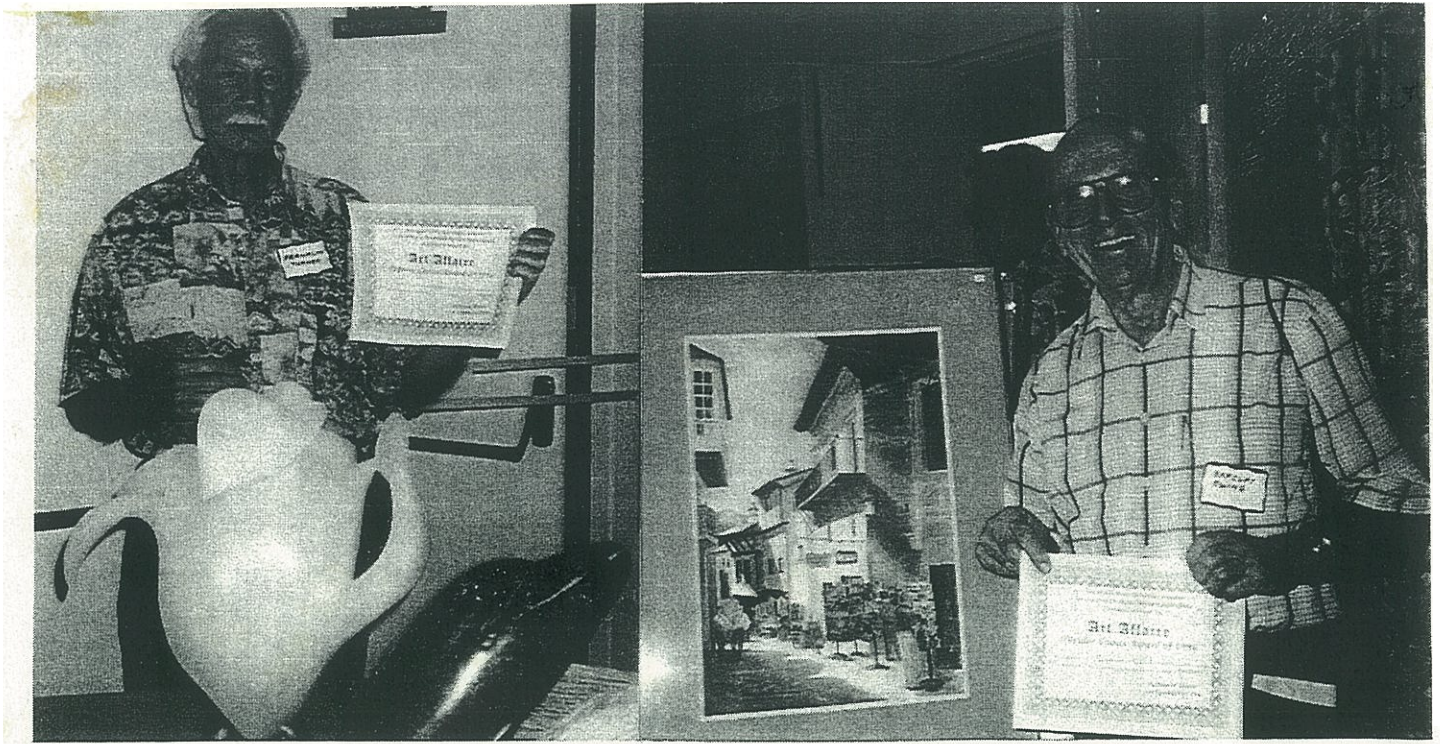
PAGE TURNERS
